<b>distressing</b>	Bad; unfortunate. <i>Some very <b>distressing</b> news.</i>
<b>disturbing</b>	Causing anxiety; worrying. <i>Distressing or <b>disturbing</b> news.</i>
<b><u>dreadful</u></b>	Very unpleasant. <i>You're a <b>dreadful</b> flirt.</i>
<b><u>feeble</u></b>	Lacking strength of character. <i><b>Feeble</b> efforts.</i>
<b><u>forlorn</u></b>	Pitifully sad and abandoned or lonely. <i>The last <b>forlorn</b> attempt.</i>
<b>grievous</b>	Of great gravity or crucial import; requiring serious thought. <i><b>Grievous</b> bodily harm.</i>
<b>hapless</b>	(especially of a person) unfortunate. <i>The <b>hapless</b> victims of the disaster.</i>
<b><u>heartbreaking</u></b>	Causing or marked by grief or anguish. <i>Her sigh was <b>heartbreaking</b>.</i>

<b>hopeless</b>	Very bad or incompetent. <i>Jess looked at him in mute <b>hopeless</b> appeal.</i>
<b><u>inadequate</u></b>	Not sufficient to meet a need. <i><b>Inadequate</b> funding.</i>
<b><u>insignificant</u></b>	Meaningless. <i>A minor <b>insignificant</b> bureaucrat.</i>
<b><u>insufficient</u></b>	Of a quantity not able to fulfill a need or requirement. <i>There was <b>insufficient</b> evidence to convict him.</i>
<b>lamentable</b>	(of circumstances or conditions) very bad; deplorable. <i>The industry is in a <b>lamentable</b> state.</i>
<b><u>laughable</u></b>	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>A contribution so small as to be <b>laughable</b>.</i>
<b>meagre</b>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>A tall <b>meagre</b> man.</i>
<b><u>miserable</u></b>	Of very poor quality or condition. <i>Horribly wet and <b>miserable</b> conditions.</i>
<b>misfortunate</b>	Deserving or inciting pity.
<b>moving</b>	Used of a series of photographs presented so as to create the illusion of motion. <i>The <b>moving</b> parts of the machine.</i>
<b><u>negligible</u></b>	Not worth considering. <i>The effect was <b>negligible</b>.</i>
<b>paltry</b>	Petty; trivial. <i>A <b>paltry</b> wage.</i>
<b><u>pathetic</u></b>	Inspiring scornful pity- Dashiell Hammett. <i>He s a <b>pathetic</b> excuse for a man.</i>
<b>piteous</b>	Deserving or inciting pity- Galsworthy. <i><b>Piteous</b> appeals for help.</i>
<b>pitiable</b>	Deserving or inciting pity- Galsworthy. <i><b>Pitiable</b> lack of character.</i>
<b><u>plaintive</u></b>	Expressing sorrow. <i>A <b>plaintive</b> cry.</i>
<b><u>poignant</u></b>	Keenly distressing to the mind or feelings. <i><b>Poignant</b> anxiety.</i>
<b>poor</b>	(of a person) deserving of pity or sympathy. <i>The proverbial <b>poor</b> artist living in a garret.</i>

<b>sad</b>	Of things that make you feel sad. <i><b>Sad</b> news.</i>
<b><u>sorry</u></b>	Feeling sad or distressed through sympathy with someone else's misfortune. <i>He looks a <b>sorry</b> sight with his broken jaw.</i>
<b>terrible</b>	Used to emphasize the extent of something unpleasant or bad. <i>The stranger gave a <b>terrible</b> smile.</i>
<b>touching</b>	Arousing affect. <i>His gratitude was simple and <b>touching</b>.</i>
<b><u>tragic</u></b>	Relating to tragedy in a literary work. <i>The <b>tragic</b> parents reached the end of their tether.</i>
<b>trifling</b>	Not worth considering. <i>A <b>trifling</b> sum.</i>
<b>well below par</b>	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.
<b>woeful</b>	Of very poor quality or condition. <i><b>Woeful</b> treatment of the accused.</i>
<b>worthless</b>	Having no real value or use. <i>Joan had been deserted by a <b>worthless</b> husband.</i>
<b>wretched</b>	Deserving or inciting pity- Galsworthy. <i><b>Wretched</b> prisoners huddled in stinking cages.</i>
