equable	Not varying or fluctuating greatly. <i>An equable climate.</i>

<u>gentle</u>	Soft and mild; not harsh or stern or severe. <i>Gentle rain.</i>
good-tempered	Not easily irritated.
<u>imperturbable</u>	Not easily perturbed or excited or upset; marked by extreme calm and composure. <i>Hitherto imperturbable he now showed signs of alarm.</i>
level-headed	Exercising or showing good judgment.
like a millpond	Having the same or similar characteristics.
<u>mild</u>	Humble in spirit or manner suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness. <i>Mild flulike symptoms.</i>
<u>motionless</u>	Not moving; stationary. <i>An eagle hung almost motionless close to the ground.</i>
pacific	Peaceful in character or intent. <i>A pacific gesture.</i>
peaceable	Free from conflict or dissent; peaceful. <i>Peaceable demonstrations for democratic reform.</i>
peaceful	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i>There were no violent incidents reported and it was a peaceful protest.</i>
phlegmatic	Showing little emotion. <i>The phlegmatic British character.</i>
<u>poised</u>	Having a composed and self-assured manner. <i>Not every day you saw that poised competent kid distressed.</i>
quiet	Carried out discreetly, secretly, or with moderation. <i>Clothes in quiet good taste.</i>
self-possessed	In full control of your faculties.
<u>serene</u>	Not agitated; without losing self-possession. <i>Serene skies and a bright blue sea.</i>

<u>smooth</u>	Smooth and unconstrained in movement. <i>The bill's path through the legislature was smooth and orderly.</i>
<u>steady</u>	Regular, even, and continuous in development, frequency, or intensity. <i>I thought I'd better get a steady job.</i>
still	Free from disturbance by heavy waves. Still mineral water.
stolid	Having or revealing little emotion or sensibility; not easily aroused or excited. <i>Her face showed nothing but stolid indifference.</i>
temperate	Relating to or denoting a region or climate characterized by mild temperatures. <i>A temperate region.</i>
<u>tranquil</u>	Free from disturbance by heavy waves. Tranquil life in the country.
<u>undisturbed</u>	Not disturbed. <i>The tombs had lain undisturbed for 2 500 years.</i>
<u>unemotional</u>	Cool and formal in manner. <i>A flat unemotional voice.</i>
unexcitable	Not easily excited. <i>An unexcitable temperament.</i>
unmoved	Emotionally unmoved. <i>Her opponents were unmoved and plan to return to court.</i>
unperturbed	Free from emotional agitation or nervous tension. <i>Kenneth seems unperturbed by the news.</i>
unruffled	Free from disturbance by heavy waves. <i>Robbie seemed unruffled by her words.</i>

calm	Become quiet or calm especially after a state of agitation. <i>An edgy calm reigned in the capital.</i>
calming	The act of appeasing (as by acceding to the demands of.
<u>calmness</u>	The state or condition of being free from disturbance or violent activity. <i>This relative calmness ended at around 7 a m when the wind picked up speed.</i>

nonviolence	Peaceful resistance to a government by fasting or refusing to cooperate.
nonviolent	Abstaining (on principle) from the use of violence.
pacific	A steam locomotive of 4-6-2 wheel arrangement. <i>A pacific gesture.</i>
<u>pacifist</u>	Holding the belief that war and violence are unjustifiable. <i>She was a committed pacifist all her life.</i>
peaceable	Inclined to avoid conflict or dissent. <i>Peaceable demonstrations for democratic reform.</i>
peaceful	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i>Peaceful times.</i>

peacetime	A period of time during which there is no war. <i>In peacetime regiments were billeted upon towns and villages.</i>
quiescent	(pathology) causing no symptoms. <i>The quiescent level of centimeter wave length solar radiation.</i>
quietude	A state of stillness, calmness, and quiet in a person or place. <i>A moment of quietude.</i>
<u>restful</u>	Affording physical or mental rest. <i>The rooms were cool and restful.</i>
<u>serene</u>	Not agitated; without losing self-possession. <i>Her eyes were closed and she looked very serene.</i>
<u>serenity</u>	The absence of mental stress or anxiety. <i>An oasis of serenity amidst the bustling city.</i>
<u>stillness</u>	Tranquil silence. <i>An eerie stillness engulfed the camp.</i>
<u>tranquil</u>	Not agitated; without losing self-possession. <i>The sea was tranquil.</i>
<u>tranquility</u>	An untroubled state; free from disturbances.
tranquelize	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
tranquillity	The quality or state of being tranquil; calm. <i>Passing cars are the only noise that disturbs the tranquillity of rural life.</i>
unarmed	Not having or using arms. <i>Unarmed vehicles.</i>
unflappable	Having or showing calmness in a crisis. <i>I prided myself on being unflappable even in the most chaotic circumstances.</i>
