- *A serious (sometimes fatal) infection of rodents caused by *Yersinia pestis* and accidentally transmitted to humans by the bite of a flea that has bitten an infected*

animal.

- *Any contagious disease that spreads rapidly and kills many people.*
- *A thing causing trouble or irritation.*
- *An annoyance.*
- *A swarm of insects that attack plants.*
- *Any epidemic disease with a high death rate.*



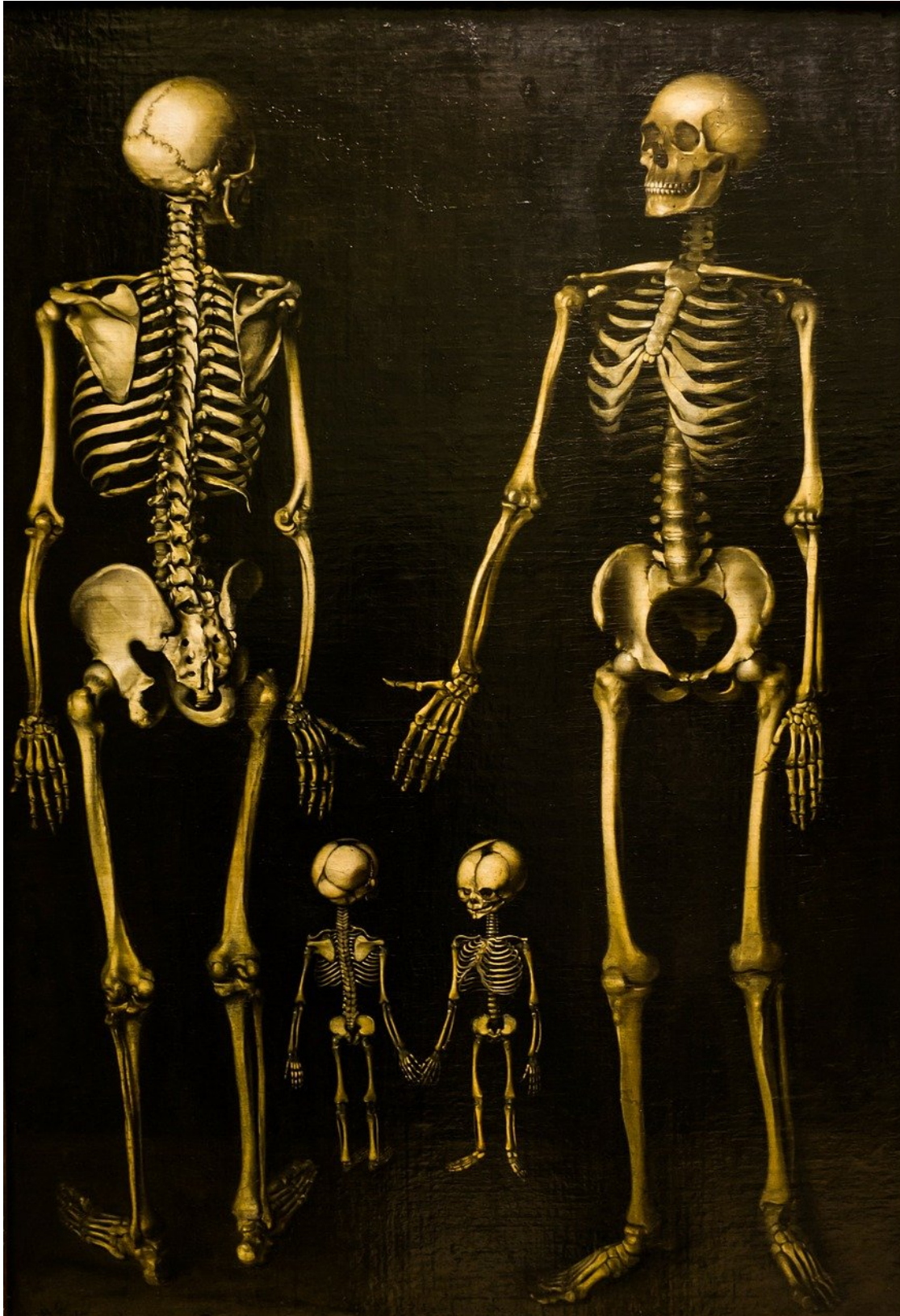

| infestation | The state of being invaded or overrun by parasites. <i>Infestation with head lice is widespread.</i> |
| <u>influx</u> | The process of flowing in. <i>The lakes are fed by influxes of meltwater.</i> |
| invasion | An unwelcome intrusion into another's domain. <i>An invasion of locusts.</i> |
| <u>multitude</u> | A large gathering of people. <i>Placing ultimate political power in the hands of the multitude.</i> |

- diphtheria** Acute contagious infection caused by the bacterium *Corynebacterium diphtheriae* marked by the formation of a false membrane in the throat and other air passages causing difficulty in breathing.

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| disease | A disorder of structure or function in a human, animal, or plant, especially one that produces specific symptoms or that affects a specific location and is not simply a direct result of physical injury. <i>Bacterial meningitis is quite a rare disease.</i> |
| epidemic | Of the nature of an epidemic. <i>An epidemic outbreak of influenza.</i> |
| epizootic | An outbreak of an epizootic disease. <i>A global epizootic of H5N1 bird flu.</i> |
| eruption | A sudden outbreak of something, typically something unwelcome or noisy. <i>Irritable skin eruptions.</i> |
| hookworm | Infestation of the intestines by hookworms which enter the body usually through the skin. |
| illness | Impairment of normal physiological function affecting part or all of an organism. <i>I've never missed a day's work through illness.</i> |
| infect | Contaminate with a disease or microorganism. <i>The water was infected by cholera.</i> |
| infection | The presence of a virus in, or its introduction into, a computer system. <i>Ambitious men are led astray by an infection that is almost unavoidable.</i> |
| infestation | The presence of an unusually large number of insects or animals in a place, typically so as to cause damage or disease. <i>Efforts were made to deal with an infestation of rats in the building.</i> |
| malaria | An intermittent and remittent fever caused by a protozoan parasite which invades the red blood cells and is transmitted by mosquitoes in many tropical and subtropical regions. |
| measles | A disease of pigs and other animals caused by the larvae of the human tapeworm. <i>Women queue to have their children immunized against measles.</i> |
| outbreak | A sudden occurrence of something unwelcome, such as war or disease. <i>The outbreak of hostilities.</i> |
| pandemic | An outbreak of a pandemic disease. <i>Pandemic diseases have occurred throughout history.</i> |
| parasitic | Relating to or caused by parasites. <i>Mortality from parasitic diseases.</i> |
| pathogen | Any disease-producing agent (especially a virus or bacterium or other microorganism). |

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| <u>pest</u> | A serious sometimes fatal infection of rodents caused by <i>Yersinia pestis</i> and accidentally transmitted to humans by the bite of a flea that has bitten an infected animal. <i>The tomato plant attracts a pest called whitefly.</i> |
| pestilence | Any epidemic disease with a high death rate. <i>Racism is a pestilence at the heart of the nation.</i> |
| pestilential | Annoying. <i>A pestilential weed.</i> |
| pox | Smallpox. |
| smallpox | An acute contagious viral disease, with fever and pustules that usually leave permanent scars. It was effectively eradicated through vaccination by 1979. |
| taint | Place under suspicion or cast doubt upon. <i>The lingering taint of creosote.</i> |
| <u>transmission</u> | The fraction of radiant energy that passes through a substance. <i>A three speed automatic transmission.</i> |
| typhoid | An infectious bacterial fever with an eruption of red spots on the chest and abdomen and severe intestinal irritation. |
| typhus | Rickettsial disease transmitted by body lice and characterized by skin rash and high fever. |
| <u>vermin</u> | Any of various small animals or insects that are pests; e.g. cockroaches or rats. <i>He examined the child s head for vermin.</i> |
| virus | An infection or disease caused by a virus. <i>Bigotry is a virus that must not be allowed to spread.</i> |
