
Planet as a Noun

Definitions of "Planet" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "planet" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- Any of the nine large celestial bodies in the solar system that revolve around the sun and shine by reflected light; Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune, and Pluto in order of their proximity to the.
- A person who follows or serves another.
- A celestial body distinguished from the fixed stars by having an apparent motion of its own (including the moon and sun), especially with reference to its supposed influence on people and events.
- (astronomy) any of the nine large celestial bodies in the solar system that revolve around the sun and shine by reflected light; Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune, and Pluto in order of their proximity to the sun; viewed from the constellation Hercules, all the planets rotate around the sun in a counterclockwise direction.
- A celestial body moving in an elliptical orbit round a star.
- The earth.
- Any celestial body (other than comets or satellites) that revolves around a star.
