Planted as an Adjective

Definitions of "Planted" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “planted” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(used especially of ideas or principles) deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held.*
- *Set in the soil for growth.*



Synonyms of "Planted" as an adjective (4 Words)

deep-rooted Deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held.

deep-seated Deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held.

implanted (used especially of ideas or principles) deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held.
***Implanted** convictions.*

ingrained (of a habit, belief, or attitude) firmly fixed or established; difficult to change.
*His deeply **ingrained** Catholic convictions.*

Associations of "Planted" (30 Words)

- arboreal** Of or relating to or formed by trees.
Arboreal apes.
- aster** Star-shaped structure formed in the cytoplasm of a cell having fibers like rays that surround the centrosome during mitosis.
- azalea** A deciduous flowering shrub with clusters of brightly coloured, sometimes fragrant flowers. Azaleas are typically smaller than other rhododendrons and there are numerous cultivars.
- botanical** A drug made from part of a plant (as the bark or root or leaves).
Botanical garden.
- botany** All the plant life in a particular region or period.
The botany of North America.
- bud** Of a plant or animal form a bud.
In certain limbless lizards and snakes a limb bud develops.
- bulrush** Tall rush with soft erect or arching stems found in Eurasia, Australia, New Zealand, and common in North America.
- clover** A herbaceous plant of the pea family, with dense globular flower heads and leaves which are typically three-lobed. It is an important fodder and rotational crop.

daisy	Used in names of other plants of the daisy family e.g Michaelmas daisy Shasta daisy.
dandelion	Any of several herbs of the genus <i>Taraxacum</i> having long tap roots and deeply notched leaves and bright yellow flowers followed by fluffy seed balls.
flora	A living organism lacking the power of locomotion. <i>The flora of southern California.</i>
flower	Induce a plant to produce flowers. <i>The roses were just coming into flower.</i>
flowering	Capable of producing flowers, especially in contrast to a similar plant with the flowers inconspicuous or absent. <i>Winter flowering heathers.</i>
fruit	Bear fruit. <i>I've brought along the fruit of my loins.</i>
garden	Cultivate or work in a garden. <i>They brought us tomatoes from their garden.</i>
gardening	The activity of tending and cultivating a garden, especially as a pastime. <i>Gardening gloves.</i>
grass	Spread out clothes on the grass to let it dry and bleach. <i>The railway tracks were mostly grassed over.</i>
herbaceous	Characteristic of a nonwoody herb or plant part.
horticulture	The cultivation of plants. <i>Maize and manioc horticulture.</i>
leaf	A thing that resembles a leaf in being flat and thin. <i>The trees are still in leaf.</i>
orchard	A piece of enclosed land planted with fruit trees. <i>An apple orchard.</i>
seed	Of a plant produce or drop seeds. <i>The dandelions went to seed.</i>
shrub	A woody plant which is smaller than a tree and has several main stems arising at or near the ground.
sprout	Put forth and grow sprouts or shoots. <i>Many black cats sprout a few white hairs.</i>
stalk	A stalklike support for a sessile animal or for an organ in an animal. <i>Drinking glasses with long stalks.</i>
tare	(in biblical use) an injurious weed resembling corn when young (Matt. 13:24-30).

tree Force a hunted animal to take refuge in a tree.
*Her dog likes to **tree** squirrels.*

vegetable A person who is incapable of normal mental or physical activity, especially through brain damage.
*I thought I d sort of flop back and be a **vegetable** for a bit.*

vegetation Plants considered collectively, especially those found in a particular area or habitat.
*Pleistocene **vegetation**.*
