Definitions of "Plateau" as a noun

- *Denoting a group of North American peoples of the high plains of western Canada and the US, including the Nez Percé.*
- *A state of little or no change following a period of activity or progress.*
- *An area of fairly level high ground.*
- *A relatively flat highland.*



Synonyms of "Plateau" as a noun (8 Words)

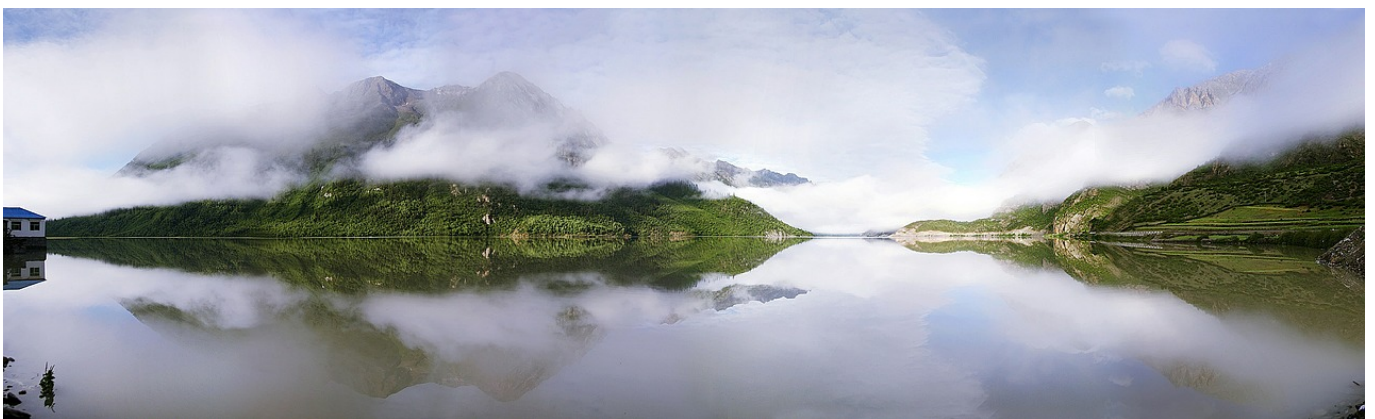
- elevated plain** A railway that is powered by electricity and that runs on a track that is raised above the street level.
- highland** An area of high or mountainous land.
*The **highlands** of Madagascar.*
- level** A structure consisting of a room or set of rooms at a single position along a vertical scale.
*You can easily take a character to **level** 20 in less than 15 hours and finish the campaign.*
- mesa** An isolated flat-topped hill with steep sides, found in landscapes with horizontal strata.
*The tribe was relatively safe on the **mesa** but they had to descend into the valley for water.*
- stage** The theater as a profession usually the stage.
*We went out of town together by **stage** about ten or twelve miles.*

- table** A group seated at table for a meal.
*The whole **table** was in gales of laughter.*
- tableland** A relatively flat highland.
- upland** Elevated (e.g., mountainous) land.
*Conservation of areas of **upland**.*

<u>acme</u>	The point at which something is at its best or most highly developed. <i>His landscapes were deemed the acme of beauty.</i>
altitude	The apparent height of a celestial object above the horizon, measured in angular distance. <i>The altitude gave her a headache.</i>
<u>apex</u>	The point in turning a corner when the vehicle is closest to the edge of the track. <i>The central bank is at the apex of the financial system.</i>
apogee	The highest point in the development of something; a climax or culmination. <i>A film which was the apogee of German expressionist cinema.</i>
crest	(of a wave) form a curling foamy top. <i>Biopsy specimens of the iliac crest were obtained under local anaesthesia.</i>
elevated	Of high moral or intellectual value elevated in nature or style Oliver Franks. <i>An elevated platform.</i>
<u>elevation</u>	A raised or elevated geological formation. <i>Her sudden elevation to the cabinet.</i>
jag	Cut teeth into make a jagged cutting edge. <i>He clutched a jag of the rock.</i>
ladder	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>Employees on their way up the career ladder.</i>
lid	An eyelid. <i>I ve got a lid for you to try on.</i>
<u>lofty</u>	Of a noble or elevated nature. <i>A noble and lofty concept.</i>
meridian	Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>At the end of February Jupiter transits the meridian due south at 6 15 a m.</i>
minaret	A slender tower, typically part of a mosque, with a balcony from which a muezzin calls Muslims to prayer.
nadir	The point below the observer that is directly opposite the zenith on the imaginary sphere against which celestial bodies appear to be projected. <i>Asking that question was the nadir of my career.</i>
<u>peak</u>	To reach the highest point; attain maximum intensity, activity. <i>He was at his peak as a cricketer.</i>
<u>pinnacle</u>	Set on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>He had reached the pinnacle of his career.</i>

raised	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>Raised eyebrows.</i>
rung	A strengthening crosspiece in the structure of a chair. <i>We must ensure that the low skilled do not get trapped on the bottom rung.</i>
<u>soaring</u>	The activity of flying a glider. <i>The soaring spires of the cathedral.</i>
stepladder	A folding portable ladder hinged at the top.
<u>summit</u>	Reach the summit of a mountain or hill. <i>They started climbing at 3 45 a m and summitted at 8 45 p m.</i>
superlative	The superlative form of an adjective or adverb. <i>Least famous is the superlative degree of the adjective famous.</i>
tall	A garment size for a tall person. <i>Tall people.</i>
top	Situated at the top or highest position. <i>He removed the top from his ballpoint.</i>
towering	Of great intensity. <i>His towering anger.</i>
<u>unsurpassed</u>	Better or greater than any other. <i>The quality of workmanship is unsurpassed.</i>
<u>up</u>	Raise or pick up something. <i>From childhood upward.</i>
<u>upper</u>	A central nervous system stimulant that increases energy and decreases appetite; used to treat narcolepsy and some forms of depression. <i>The upper end of the social scale.</i>
uppermost	Highest in place, rank, or importance. <i>The uppermost book in the pile.</i>
<u>zenith</u>	The point in the sky or celestial sphere directly above an observer. <i>In 1977 punk was at its zenith.</i>
