
Plea as a Noun

Definitions of "Plea" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "plea" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A request made in an urgent and emotional manner.
- A claim that a circumstance means that one should not be blamed for or should not be forced to do something.
- A defendant's answer by a factual matter (as distinguished from a demurrer.
- An answer indicating why a suit should be dismissed.
- A humble request for help from someone in authority.
- (law) a defendant's answer by a factual matter (as distinguished from a demurrer.
- A formal statement by or on behalf of a defendant or prisoner, stating guilt or innocence in response to a charge, offering an allegation of fact, or claiming that a point of law should apply.







Synonyms of "Plea" as a noun (10 Words)

appeal	A serious, urgent, or heartfelt request. <i>His smile was part of his appeal to her.</i>
claim	A demand especially in the phrase. <i>He staked his claim</i> .
defence	The case presented by or on behalf of the party accused of a crime or being sued in a civil lawsuit. He spoke in defence of a disciplined approach.
entreaty	An earnest or humble request. An entreaty to stop the fighting.
explanation	A statement that makes something comprehensible by describing the relevant structure or operation or circumstances etc. <i>The explanation</i> was very simple.
justification	The act of defending or explaining or making excuses for by reasoning. There is no justification for an increase in charges.
<u>petition</u>	Reverent petition to a deity. A divorce petition .
<u>prayer</u>	The act of communicating with a deity (especially as a petition or in adoration or contrition or thanksgiving. The peace of God is ours through prayer .
supplication	The act of communicating with a deity (especially as a petition or in adoration or contrition or thanksgiving. <i>He fell to his knees in supplication.</i>
vindication	The action of clearing someone of blame or suspicion. Democratic vindication s of freedom of choice as a basic principle.





Usage Examples of "Plea" as a noun

- He made a dramatic plea for disarmament.
- *He changed his plea to not guilty.*
- Her plea of a headache was not entirely false.

Associations of "Plea" (30 Words)

appeal	Entreaty. Appeal to somebody for help.
asking	The verbal act of requesting.
<u>beg</u>	Acquire food or money from someone by begging. I beg to second the motion.
<u>beseech</u>	Ask for or request earnestly. You have got to believe me Violet beseech ed him.



cadge	Obtain or seek to obtain by cadging or wheedling. <i>He cadged fivers off old school friends.</i>
clemency	Leniency and compassion shown toward offenders by a person or agency charged with administering justice. An appeal for clemency .
<u>conjure</u>	Engage in plotting or enter into a conspiracy, swear together. <i>He conjured wild birds in the air.</i>
<u>crave</u>	Feel a powerful desire for (something. <i>If only she had shown her daughter the love she craved.</i>
<u>desperately</u>	In a way that shows despair. <i>He looked around desperately.</i>
<u>entreat</u>	Ask someone earnestly or anxiously to do something. The King I fear hath ill entreat ed her.
entreaty	An earnest or humble request. An entreaty to stop the fighting.
exhortation	The act of exhorting; an earnest attempt at persuasion. Exhortation s to consumers to switch off electrical appliances.
implore	Beg earnestly for. I implore mercy.
<u>invitation</u>	The action of inviting someone to go somewhere or to do something. An invitation to lunch.
invocation	An incantation used to invoke a deity or the supernatural. His invocation of the ancient powers of Callanish.
necessary	The basic requirements of life, such as food and warmth. It s not necessary for you to be here.
perforce	By necessity; by force of circumstance. Amateurs perforce have to settle for less expensive solutions.
<u>petition</u>	Write a petition for something to somebody request formally and in writing. <i>A steady stream of petitions to Allah were audible.</i>
<u>plead</u>	Make an allegation in an action or other legal proceeding especially answer the previous pleading of the other party by denying facts therein stated or by alleging new facts. <i>The youth pleaded guilty to murdering the girl.</i>
<u>please</u>	Cause to feel happy and satisfied. She was quiet and eager to please .
<u>pray</u>	Address a deity a prophet a saint or an object of worship say a prayer. After several days of rain we were pray ing for sun.



<u>prayer</u>	Reverent petition to a deity. 500 people were detained as they attended Friday prayer s.
request	The verbal act of requesting. A request for information.
<u>solicit</u>	Make a solicitation or entreaty for something request urgently or persistently. The young man was caught solicit ing in the park.
solicitation	Request for a sum of money. A solicitation to the king for relief.
suppliant	Making or expressing a plea, especially to someone in power or authority. <i>Their faces were wary and suppliant</i> .
supplicant	Humbly entreating. A supplicant serf before an ill tempered monarch.
supplicate	Make a humble, earnest petition. <i>Supplicate</i> for permission.
supplication	The act of communicating with a deity (especially as a petition or in adoration or contrition or thanksgiving. <i>He fell to his knees in supplication.</i>
W00	Seek the favour, support, or custom of. <i>He wooed her with quotes from Shakespeare.</i>
