
Pleading as a Noun

Definitions of "Pleading" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "pleading" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- The action of making an emotional or earnest appeal to someone.
- (law) a statement in legal and logical form stating something on behalf of a party to a legal proceeding.
- A formal statement of the cause of an action or defence.





Synonyms of "Pleading" as a noun (5 Words)

appeal	A legal proceeding in which the appellant resorts to a higher court for the purpose of obtaining a review of a lower court decision and a reversal of the lower court's judgment or the granting of a new trial. He has 28 days in which to lodge an appeal .
cry from the heart	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition.
<u>petition</u>	Reverent petition to a deity. She was asked to sign a petition against plans to build on the local playing fields.
<u>plea</u>	A claim that a circumstance means that one should not be blamed for or should not be forced to do something. <i>He made a dramatic plea for disarmament.</i>
request	A formal message requesting something that is submitted to an authority. The computer is busy servicing request s from other processes.





Usage Examples of "Pleading" as a noun

- He ignored her pleading.
- Counsel for the plaintiffs wanted to amend the pleadings.






Usage Examples of "Pleading" as an adjective

Associations of "Pleading" (30 Words)

accost	Approach with an offer of sexual favors. Reporters accost ed him in the street.
appeal	Make a serious, urgent, or heartfelt request. An appeal for help.
asking	The verbal act of requesting.
<u>beg</u>	Acquire food or money from someone by begging. They had to beg for food.
<u>beseech</u>	Ask (someone) urgently and fervently to do something; implore; entreat. <i>They</i> beseech ed him to stay.
cadge	Ask for or obtain (something to which one is not strictly entitled. <i>He cadged fivers off old school friends.</i>
<u>conjure</u>	Call (an image) to the mind. She had forgotten how to conjure up the image of her mother s face.



<u>desperately</u>	With great urgency. He desperately needed a drink.
<u>entreat</u>	Ask for or request earnestly. His friends entreat ed him not to go.
entreaty	Earnest or urgent request. An entreaty to stop the fighting.
exhortation	The act of exhorting; an earnest attempt at persuasion. No amount of exhortation had any effect.
implore	Call upon in supplication; entreat. <i>He implored her to change her mind</i> .
<u>invitation</u>	A request (spoken or written) to participate or be present or take part in something. A wedding invitation .
invite	Invite someone to one s house. I invite d them to a restaurant.
lamentation	A cry of sorrow and grief. Scenes of lamentation .
necessary	The money needed. A bag containing my wallet the money the necessary .
perforce	By necessity; by force of circumstance. Amateurs perforce have to settle for less expensive solutions.
<u>petition</u>	Write a petition for something to somebody request formally and in writing. <i>A divorce petition</i> .
<u>plea</u>	A humble request for help from someone in authority. Her plea of a headache was not entirely false.
<u>please</u>	Take only one's own wishes into consideration in deciding how to act or proceed. <i>He could do many things if he pleased.</i>
<u>pray</u>	Address a prayer to God or another deity. I pray ed that James wouldn t notice.
<u>prayer</u>	A religious service, especially a regular one, at which people gather in order to pray together. I ll say a prayer for him.
request	The verbal act of requesting. <i>To have our ideas taken seriously is surely a reasonable request.</i>
<u>solicit</u>	Make a solicitation or petition for something desired. Don t solicit for money.



<u>solicitation</u>	Request for a sum of money. A <i>solicitation</i> to the king for relief.
suppliant	Making or expressing a plea, especially to someone in power or authority. A <i>suppliant</i> sinner seeking forgiveness.
supplicant	Making or expressing a plea, especially to someone in power or authority. A <i>supplicant</i> serf before an ill tempered monarch.
supplicate	Ask humbly (for something. The plutocracy supplicate d to be made peers.
supplication	The act of communicating with a deity (especially as a petition or in adoration or contrition or thanksgiving. <i>He fell to his knees in supplication</i> .
W00	Seek someone's favor. Pop stars are being woo ed by film companies eager to sign them up.
