<b>contented</b>	Satisfied or showing satisfaction with things as they are. <i>I was never <b>contented</b> with half measures.</i>

<b>elated</b>	Ecstatically happy. <i>Dozens of <b>elated</b> fans welcomed the champions home.</i>

<b>grateful</b>	Feeling or showing gratitude. <i>The <b>grateful</b> shade.</i>
<b>gratified</b>	Having received what was desired.
<b>happy</b>	Fortunate and convenient. <i>I'm <b>happy</b> with his performance.</i>
<b>like a child with a new toy</b>	Equal in amount or value.
<b>like a dog with two tails</b>	Conforming in every respect.
<b><u>overjoyed</u></b>	Extremely happy. <i>All of them were <b>overjoyed</b> at my success.</i>
<b>proud of</b>	Feeling self-respect or pleasure in something by which you measure your self-worth; or being a reason for pride.
<b>proud of oneself</b>	Feeling self-respect or pleasure in something by which you measure your self-worth; or being a reason for pride.
<b>puffed up</b>	Gathered for protruding fullness.
<b>ready</b>	In a suitable state for an action or situation; fully prepared. <i>Dinner is <b>ready</b>.</i>
<b><u>satisfied</u></b>	Filled with satisfaction. <i><b>Satisfied</b> customers.</i>
<b>self-satisfied</b>	Marked by excessive complacency or self-satisfaction.

<u>smug</u>	Having or showing an excessive pride in oneself or one's achievements. <i>A <b>smug</b> glow of self congratulation.</i>
<b>superior</b>	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i><b>Superior</b> wisdom derived from experience.</i>
<u>thankful</u>	Pleased and relieved. <i>An earnest and <b>thankful</b> prayer.</i>
<u>thrilled</u>	Feeling intense pleasurable excitement.
<b>well pleased</b>	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.
<u>willing</u>	Disposed or inclined toward. <i>A <b>willing</b> participant.</i>

<b>delighted</b>	Filled with wonder and delight. <i>A <b>delighted</b> smile.</i>
<b><u>delightful</u></b>	Causing delight; charming. <i>A <b>delightful</b> surprise.</i>
<b><u>ecstasy</u></b>	An emotional or religious frenzy or trance-like state, originally one involving an experience of mystic self-transcendence. <i>There was a look of <b>ecstasy</b> on his face.</i>
<b>elated</b>	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>The <b>elated</b> winner.</i>
<b>enjoyable</b>	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>They had an <b>enjoyable</b> afternoon.</i>
<b><u>euphoria</u></b>	A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation. <i>In his <b>euphoria</b> he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
<b><u>euphoric</u></b>	Characterized by or feeling intense excitement and happiness. <i>A <b>euphoric</b> sense of freedom.</i>
<b>exaltation</b>	The elevation of a person (as to the status of a god). <i>The <b>exaltation</b> of the army as a place for brotherhood.</i>
<b>exult</b>	To express great joy. <i><b>Exulting</b> in her escape Lisa closed the door behind her.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
<b>exultation</b>	The utterance of sounds expressing great joy. <i>She laughs in <b>exultation</b>.</i>
<b><u>glad</u></b>	Willing and eager (to do something). <i><b>Glad</b> that they succeeded.</i>
<b>grateful</b>	Received or experienced with gratitude; welcome. <i><b>Grateful</b> for the tree's shade.</i>
<b><u>indebted</u></b>	Owing money. <i>Heavily <b>indebted</b> countries.</i>
<b><u>joyful</u></b>	Feeling, expressing, or causing great pleasure and happiness. <i><b>Joyful</b> music.</i>
<b><u>joyous</u></b>	Full of or characterized by joy. <i><b>Joyous</b> laughter.</i>
<b>jubilant</b>	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of <b>jubilant</b> fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
<b><u>merry</u></b>	Slightly and good-humouredly drunk. <i>A <b>merry</b> evening.</i>

<b><u>pleasurable</u></b>	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>Full of happiness and <b>pleasurable</b> excitement.</i>
<b>rapture</b>	(according to some millenarian teaching) the transporting of believers to heaven at the Second Coming of Christ. <i>Leonora listened with <b>rapture</b>.</i>
<b>rejoicing</b>	Great joy; jubilation. <i>The ban was lifted in 1990 amid general <b>rejoicing</b>.</i>
<b>relieved</b>	Extending out above or beyond a surface or boundary. <i><b>Relieved</b> parents who had waited anxiously for news.</i>
<b>thanks</b>	An expression of gratitude. <i>Many <b>thanks</b>.</i>
