- *Feeling or showing pleasure and satisfaction, especially at an event or a situation.*
- *Experiencing or manifesting pleasure.*

<u>complacent</u>	Showing smug or uncritical satisfaction with oneself or one's achievements. <i>You can't afford to be complacent about security.</i>
content	Willing to accept a particular thing; satisfied. <i>Not content with being a hugely successful pop star he now intends to venture into movies.</i>
contented	Satisfied or showing satisfaction with things as they are. <i>I was never contented with half measures.</i>
delighted	Filled with wonder and delight. <i>We were delighted to see her.</i>
elated	Ecstatically happy. <i>Dozens of elated fans welcomed the champions home.</i>
<u>glad</u>	Cheerful and bright. <i>I'm really glad to hear that.</i>

like a child with a new toy	Equal in amount or value.
like a dog with two tails	Conforming in every respect.
<u>overjoyed</u>	Extremely happy. <i>All of them were overjoyed at my success.</i>
proud of	Feeling self-respect or pleasure in something by which you measure your self-worth; or being a reason for pride.
proud of oneself	Feeling self-respect or pleasure in something by which you measure your self-worth; or being a reason for pride.
puffed up	Gathered for protruding fullness.
ready	In a suitable state for an action or situation; fully prepared. <i>Dinner is ready.</i>
<u>satisfied</u>	Filled with satisfaction. <i>Satisfied customers.</i>
self-satisfied	Marked by excessive complacency or self-satisfaction.

<u>smug</u>	Having or showing an excessive pride in oneself or one's achievements. <i>A smug glow of self congratulation.</i>
superior	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>Superior wisdom derived from experience.</i>
<u>thankful</u>	Pleased and relieved. <i>An earnest and thankful prayer.</i>
<u>thrilled</u>	Feeling intense pleasurable excitement.
well pleased	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.
<u>willing</u>	Disposed or inclined toward. <i>A willing participant.</i>

delighted	Filled with wonder and delight. <i>A delighted smile.</i>
delightful	Causing delight; charming. <i>A delightful surprise.</i>
ecstasy	An emotional or religious frenzy or trance-like state, originally one involving an experience of mystic self-transcendence. <i>There was a look of ecstasy on his face.</i>
elated	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>The elated winner.</i>
enjoyable	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>They had an enjoyable afternoon.</i>
euphoria	A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation. <i>In his euphoria he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
euphoric	Characterized by or feeling intense excitement and happiness. <i>A euphoric sense of freedom.</i>
exaltation	The elevation of a person (as to the status of a god). <i>The exaltation of the army as a place for brotherhood.</i>
exult	To express great joy. <i>Exulting in her escape Lisa closed the door behind her.</i>
exultant	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the exultant crowds.</i>
exultation	The utterance of sounds expressing great joy. <i>She laughs in exultation.</i>
glad	Willing and eager (to do something). <i>Glad that they succeeded.</i>
grateful	Received or experienced with gratitude; welcome. <i>Grateful for the tree's shade.</i>
indebted	Owing money. <i>Heavily indebted countries.</i>
joyful	Feeling, expressing, or causing great pleasure and happiness. <i>Joyful music.</i>
joyous	Full of or characterized by joy. <i>Joyous laughter.</i>
jubilant	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of jubilant fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
merry	Slightly and good-humouredly drunk. <i>A merry evening.</i>

- pleasurable** Affording satisfaction or pleasure.
*Full of happiness and **pleasurable** excitement.*
- rapture** (according to some millenarian teaching) the transporting of believers to heaven at the Second Coming of Christ.
*Leonora listened with **rapture**.*
- rejoicing** Great joy; jubilation.
*The ban was lifted in 1990 amid general **rejoicing**.*
- relieved** Extending out above or beyond a surface or boundary.
***Relieved** parents who had waited anxiously for news.*
- thanks** An expression of gratitude.
