person in the street	A human body (usually including the clothing).
pleb	One of the common people.
proletarian	A member of the working class (not necessarily employed). <i>They are true proletarians.</i>
woman in the street	A human female employed to do housework.
worker	A member of the working class (not necessarily employed). <i>Workers of the world unite.</i>
working person	A mine or quarry that is being or has been worked.
working-class person	A human body (usually including the clothing).

ignoble	Of humble origin or social status. <i>Something cowardly and ignoble in his attitude.</i>
<u>low</u>	Very low in volume. <i>A low bow.</i>
low-class	Occupying the lowest socioeconomic position in a society.
lowbrow	Characteristic of a person who is not cultivated or does not have intellectual tastes. <i>Lowbrow tastes.</i>

philistine	Smug and ignorant and indifferent or hostile to artistic and cultural values. <i>There were displays to inspire even the most philistine of visitors.</i>
proletarian	Belonging to or characteristic of the proletariat. <i>A proletarian ideology.</i>
<u>provincial</u>	Of or concerning the regions outside the capital city of a country, especially when regarded as unsophisticated or narrow-minded. <i>Provincial elections.</i>
<u>rustic</u>	Having a simplicity and charm that is considered typical of the countryside. <i>Rustic pottery.</i>
uncultivated	(of land) not used for growing crops. <i>Uncultivated land.</i>
<u>uncultured</u>	Not characterized by good taste, manners, or education. <i>To my uncultured palate most of the wines were good.</i>
undistinguished	Not worthy of notice. <i>An undistinguished career.</i>
uneducated	Not having a good education. <i>Women from uneducated backgrounds.</i>
unpolished	Not carefully reworked or perfected or made smooth by polishing. <i>His work is unpolished and sometimes incoherent.</i>
<u>unrefined</u>	Not processed to remove impurities or unwanted elements. <i>Unrefined sugar.</i>

unwashed	Not having been washed. <i>The unwashed masses.</i>
working-class	Working for hourly wages rather than fixed (e.g. annual) salaries.

citizen	A legally recognized subject or national of a state or commonwealth, either native or naturalized. <i>A British citizen.</i>
civil	Relating to civil law. <i>They try to work out their differences in a civil manner.</i>
civilian	Relating to civilians. <i>Civilian clothing.</i>
common	Having no special distinction or quality widely known or commonly encountered average or ordinary or usual. <i>We spent the morning tramping over the common looking for flowers.</i>
commoner	A person who has a right over another's land, e.g. for pasturage or mineral extraction. <i>Commoners centuries old grazing rights.</i>
commonplace	A notable passage in a work copied into a commonplace book. <i>Unemployment was commonplace in his trade.</i>
consular	Relating to the ancient Roman consuls, two annually elected chief magistrates who jointly ruled the republic. <i>Rome once again held consular elections.</i>

customary	Commonly used or practiced; usual. <i>It is customary to mark an occasion like this with a toast.</i>
inveterate	(of a feeling or habit) long-established and unlikely to change. <i>An inveterate gambler.</i>
leader	A person who rules or guides or inspires others. <i>A leader in the use of video conferencing.</i>
legion	A vast multitude. <i>Her fans are legion.</i>
legionary	Of an ancient Roman legion. <i>The legionary fortress of Isca.</i>
mundane	Relating to or denoting the branch of astrology that deals with the prediction of earthly events. <i>Not a fairy palace yet a mundane wonder of unimagined kind.</i>
nonentity	Non-existence. <i>A political nonentity.</i>
normal	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Her temperature was above normal.</i>
ordinary	Any of several conventional figures used on shields. <i>Not out of the ordinary.</i>
populous	Densely populated. <i>The populous city of Shanghai.</i>
prevail	Be larger in number, quantity, power, status or importance. <i>He prevailed upon her to visit his parents.</i>
prevalent	Predominant; powerful. <i>The social ills prevalent in society today.</i>
quotidian	Of or occurring every day; daily. <i>His story is an aching human one mired in quotidian details.</i>
resident	A person who lives somewhere permanently or on a long-term basis. <i>An intangible computer program resident on a magnetic disk.</i>
routine	Organize according to a routine. <i>I settled down into a routine of work and sleep.</i>
tribune	The apse of a Christian church that contains the bishop's throne.
unexceptional	Not special in any way; lacking distinction. <i>An unexceptional movie.</i>
usual	Commonly encountered. <i>Their room was a shambles as usual.</i>
