<b>affluence</b>	Abundant wealth. <i>A sign of our growing <b>affluence</b>.</i>
<b>batch</b>	A collection of things or persons to be handled together. <i>This should be run as a <b>batch</b> program from the process directory.</i>
<b>comfort</b>	A freedom from financial difficulty that promotes a comfortable state. <i>He is a man who enjoys his <b>comfort</b>.</i>
<b>deal</b>	The set of hands dealt to the players. <i>A <b>deal</b> of trouble.</i>
<b><u>flock</u></b>	A large number or crowd of people. <i>A <b>flock</b> of sheep.</i>
<b>good deal</b>	That which is pleasing or valuable or useful.
<b>great deal</b>	A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field.
<b>hatful</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent.

<b>heap</b>	An untidy collection of objects placed haphazardly on top of each other. <i>We have <b>heaps</b> of room.</i>
<b>lot</b>	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>An inefficient <b>lot</b> our Council.</i>
<b>luxury</b>	Something that is an indulgence rather than a necessity. <i>They actually had the <b>luxury</b> of a whole day together.</i>
<b>mass</b>	A musical setting for a Mass. <i>The masterly distribution of <b>masses</b>.</i>
<b>mess</b>	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>The economy is still in a terrible <b>mess</b>.</i>
<b>mickle</b>	A large amount.
<b>mint</b>	The leaves of a mint plant used fresh or candied. <i>He made a <b>mint</b> on the stock market.</i>
<b>mountain</b>	A large natural elevation of the earth's surface rising abruptly from the surrounding level; a large steep hill. <i>We set off down the <b>mountain</b>.</i>
<b>muckle</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent.
<b>opulence</b>	Great wealth or luxuriousness. <i>Rooms of spectacular <b>opulence</b>.</i>
<b>passel</b>	A large group of people or things. <i>A <b>passel</b> of journalists.</i>
<b>peck</b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>A fatherly <b>peck</b> on the cheek.</i>
<b>pile</b>	Fine soft dense hair (as the fine short hair of cattle or deer or the wool of sheep or the undercoat of certain dogs). <i>A Victorian Gothic <b>pile</b>.</i>
<b>plenitude</b>	The condition of being full or complete. <i>The <b>plenitude</b> of the Pope's powers.</i>
<b>plenteousness</b>	A full supply.
<b>plentiffulness</b>	A large number or amount or extent.
<b>plentitude</b>	A full supply.
<b>prosperity</b>	An economic state of growth with rising profits and full employment. <i>A long period of peace and <b>prosperity</b>.</i>
<b>raft</b>	A foundation (usually on soft ground) consisting of an extended layer of reinforced concrete. <i>Great <b>rafts</b> of cormorants often 5 000 strong.</i>

<b>sight</b>	A person or thing having a ridiculous, repulsive, or dishevelled appearance. <i>She offered to show me the <b>sights</b>.</i>
<b>slew</b>	A violent or uncontrollable sliding movement. <i>A <b>slew</b> of journalists.</i>
<b>spate</b>	A sudden flood in a river. <i>A <b>spate</b> of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
<b>stack</b>	A set of storage locations that store data in such a way that the most recently stored item is the first to be retrieved. <i>A <b>stack</b> of boxes.</i>
<b>tidy sum</b>	Receptacle that holds odds and ends (as sewing materials).
<b>wealth</b>	The state of being rich and affluent; having a plentiful supply of material goods and money. <i>Great <b>wealth</b> is not a sign of great intelligence.</i>
<b>well-being</b>	A contented state of being happy and healthy and prosperous.

## Synonyms of "Plenty" as an adverb (13 Words)

<b>appreciably</b>	To an appreciable extent; considerably. <i>An <b>appreciably</b> higher risk.</i>
<b>by a considerable amount</b>	In reserve; not for immediate use.
<b>considerably</b>	By a notably large amount or to a notably large extent; greatly. <i>A <b>considerably</b> higher density.</i>
<b>enough</b>	To a moderate degree; fairly. <i>I can get there easily <b>enough</b>.</i>
<b>markedly</b>	To an extent which is clearly noticeable; significantly. <i>New diagnoses have increased <b>markedly</b> since 1998.</i>

In a significant way; considerably.  
*A **materially** and culturally rich area.*

**much**

To a very great degree or extent.  
*She was very **much** interested.*

**profoundly**

To a profound extent; extremely.  
*He **profoundly** altered the whole course of my life.*

**seriously**

To a degree that is significant or worrying.  
*Do you **seriously** believe that I would jeopardize my career by such acts.*

**signally**

In a signal manner.  
***Signally** inappropriate methods.*

**significantly**

In a sufficiently great or important way as to be worthy of attention.  
*He paused **significantly**.*

**substantially**

In a strong substantial way.  
*Profits grew **substantially**.*

**very much**

Precisely so.

<b>galore</b>	In abundance. Daffodils <b>galore</b> .
<b>lavishly</b>	In a wasteful manner. A <b>lavishly</b> decorated room.
<b>lot</b>	Divide into lots as of land for example. Nineteen <b>lots</b> failed to sell.
<b><u>luxurious</u></b>	Displaying luxury and furnishing gratification to the senses. A <b>luxurious</b> wallow in a scented bath.
<b>many</b>	The majority of people. A good <b>many</b> .
<b>mellowness</b>	Kindheartedness through maturity or old age. A <b>mellowness</b> of light and shade not attainable in marble.
<b>much</b>	To a great extent; a great deal. I m not there <b>much</b> .
<b>multiplicity</b>	The property of being multiple. The demand for higher education depends on a <b>multiplicity</b> of factors.
<b><u>opulent</u></b>	Wealthy. His more <b>opulent</b> tenants.
<b>outnumber</b>	Be more numerous than. Women <b>outnumbered</b> men by three to one.
<b>overflow</b>	Overflow with a certain feeling. The waiting area was <b>overflowing</b> .
<b>plenitude</b>	An abundance. The <b>plenitude</b> of the Pope s powers.
<b>plenteous</b>	Plentiful. A <b>plenteous</b> grape harvest.
<b>plentiful</b>	Existing in or yielding great quantities; abundant. Rhinoceroses were once <b>plentiful</b> here.

<b>profusion</b>	An abundance or large quantity of something. <i>The <b>profusion</b> of detail.</i>
<b>prosperity</b>	The state of being prosperous. <i>A long period of peace and <b>prosperity</b>.</i>
<b>richness</b>	The quality of having high intrinsic value. <i>He praised the <b>richness</b> of the soil.</i>
<b><u>stacked</u></b>	Having a large bosom and pleasing curves. <i>An operating system that allows for <b>stacked</b> jobs.</i>
<b>substantially</b>	In a strong substantial way. <i>The price went up <b>substantially</b>.</i>
