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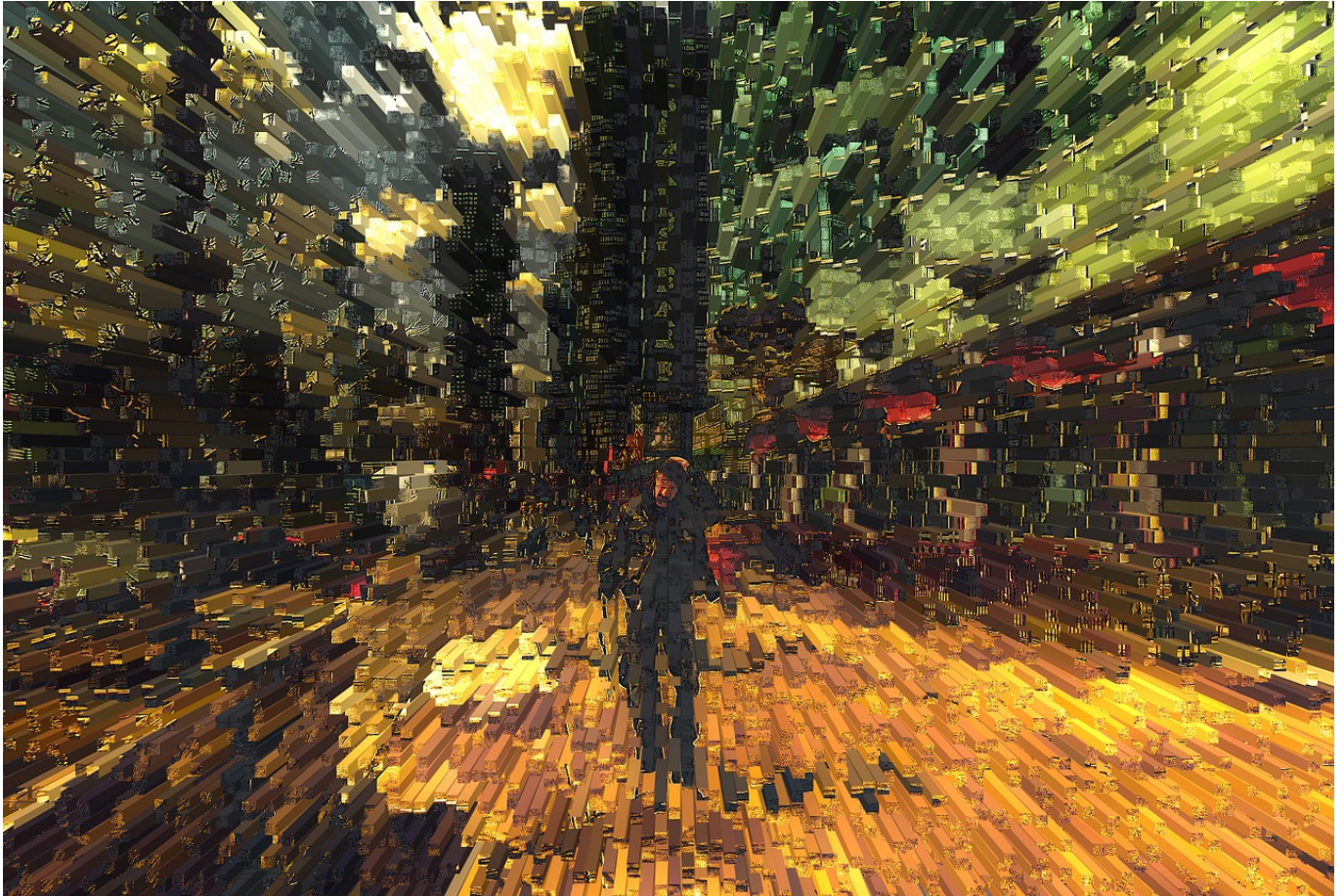
The synonyms of “Plethora” are: embarrassment, overplus, superfluity, abundance, lot, mass, host, plenitude, cornucopia, riot

Plethora as a Noun

Definitions of "Plethora" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “plethora” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An excess of a bodily fluid, particularly blood.*
- *Extreme excess.*
- *A large or excessive amount of something.*



Synonyms of "Plethora" as a noun (10 Words)

abundance	The state or condition of having a copious quantity of something; plentifulness. <i>The tropical island boasts an abundance of wildlife.</i>
cornucopia	The property of being extremely abundant. <i>The festival offers a cornucopia of pleasures.</i>
embarrassment	A person or thing causing feelings of embarrassment. <i>An embarrassment of riches.</i>
host	A person who acts as host at formal occasions makes an introductory speech and introduces other speakers. <i>Innsbruck once played host to the Winter Olympics.</i>
lot	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>Has a happy lot.</i>
mass	A large number of people or objects crowded together. <i>Multiply the mass of the payload by the distance travelled.</i>

overplus	A surplus or excess. <i>An overplus of one ingredient.</i>
plenitude	A full supply. <i>The plenitude of the Pope's powers.</i>
riot	A state of disorder involving group violence. <i>The garden was a riot of colour.</i>
superfluity	The state of being superfluous. <i>A superfluity of unoccupied time.</i>

- *Allen won a plethora of medals during his illustrious career.*
- *A plethora of committees and subcommittees.*

Associations of "Plethora" (30 Words)

abundant	Present in great quantity. <i>An abundant supply of water.</i>
bountiful	Large in quantity; abundant. <i>Bountiful compliments.</i>
bountifulness	The property of copious abundance.
bounty	A sum paid by the state to encourage trade. <i>They do not qualify for their bounty because they have spent insufficient time at summer camp.</i>
cloy	Disgust or sicken (someone) with an excess of sweetness, richness, or sentiment. <i>A curious bitter sweetness that cloyed her senses.</i>
copious	Affording an abundant supply. <i>She took copious notes.</i>
excess	Excessive indulgence. <i>Trying to lose excess weight.</i>
galore	In abundance. <i>Whiskey galore.</i>
glut	An excessively abundant supply of something. <i>There is a glut of cars on the market.</i>
lavishly	In a rich and lavish manner. <i>Lavishly decorated.</i>

lot	Divide items into lots for sale at an auction. <i>Nineteen lots failed to sell.</i>
luxuriant	(of hair) thick and healthy. <i>She tossed her luxuriant dark hair.</i>
many	The majority of people. <i>Many directions.</i>
mellowness	Kindheartedness through maturity or old age. <i>The cheap wine had no body no mellowness.</i>
<u>myriad</u>	(chiefly in classical history) a unit of ten thousand. <i>The myriad political scene.</i>
outnumber	Be more numerous than. <i>Women outnumbered men by three to one.</i>
oversupply	Supply with too much or too many. <i>Oversupply causes prices to fall.</i>
plenitude	A full supply. <i>An ancient Celtic god thought to bring a plenitude of wealth or food.</i>
plenteous	Affording an abundant supply. <i>A plenteous grape harvest.</i>
plentiful	Existing in or yielding great quantities; abundant. <i>Food is plentiful.</i>
plentitude	A full supply.
<u>plenty</u>	A situation in which food and other necessities are available in sufficiently large quantities. <i>I ve had plenty thanks.</i>
<u>profuse</u>	(of a person) extravagant. <i>They are profuse in hospitality.</i>
prosperity	The state of being prosperous. <i>A long period of peace and prosperity.</i>
replete	Deeply filled or permeated. <i>I went out into the sun drenched streets again replete and relaxed.</i>
repletion	The state of being satisfactorily full and unable to take on more.
superfluity	An unnecessarily or excessively large amount or number of something. <i>Servants who had nothing to do but to display their own superfluity.</i>
surfeit	Supply or feed to surfeit. <i>I am surfeited with shopping.</i>
<u>surplus</u>	The excess value of a company's assets over the face value of its stock. <i>Surplus cheese distributed to the needy.</i>

voluminous (of clothes) very loose or full; having much fabric.
*He sank into a **voluminous** armchair.*
