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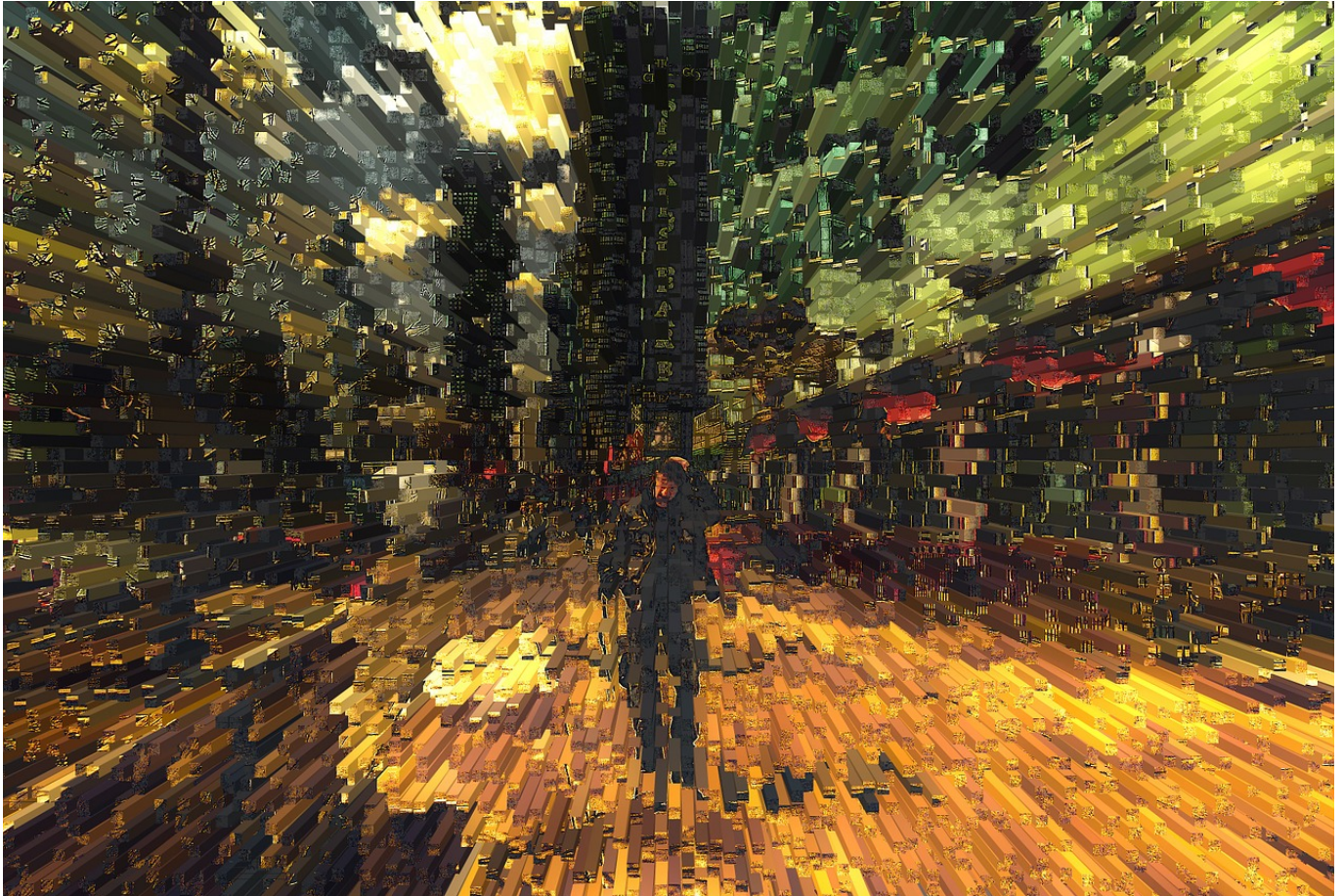

## **Plethora as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Plethora" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “plethora” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An excess of a bodily fluid, particularly blood.*
- *Extreme excess.*
- *A large or excessive amount of something.*



## Synonyms of "Plethora" as a noun (10 Words)

- abundance** The state or condition of having a copious quantity of something; plentifulness.  
*The tropical island boasts an **abundance** of wildlife.*
- cornucopia** The property of being extremely abundant.  
*The festival offers a **cornucopia** of pleasures.*
- embarrassment** A person or thing causing feelings of embarrassment.  
*An **embarrassment** of riches.*
- host** A person who acts as host at formal occasions makes an introductory speech and introduces other speakers.  
*Innsbruck once played **host** to the Winter Olympics.*
- lot** A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use.  
*Has a happy **lot**.*
- mass** A large number of people or objects crowded together.  
*Multiply the **mass** of the payload by the distance travelled.*

<b>overplus</b>	A surplus or excess. <i>An <b>overplus</b> of one ingredient.</i>
<b>plenitude</b>	A full supply. <i>The <b>plenitude</b> of the Pope's powers.</i>
<b>riot</b>	A state of disorder involving group violence. <i>The garden was a <b>riot</b> of colour.</i>
<b>superfluity</b>	The state of being superfluous. <i>A <b>superfluity</b> of unoccupied time.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Plethora" as a noun

- *Allen won a plethora of medals during his illustrious career.*
- *A plethora of committees and subcommittees.*

## Associations of "Plethora" (30 Words)

<b>abundant</b>	Present in great quantity. <i>An <b>abundant</b> supply of water.</i>
<b>bountiful</b>	Large in quantity; abundant. <i><b>Bountiful</b> compliments.</i>
<b>bountifulness</b>	The property of copious abundance.
<b>bounty</b>	A sum paid by the state to encourage trade. <i>They do not qualify for their <b>bounty</b> because they have spent insufficient time at summer camp.</i>
<b>cloy</b>	Disgust or sicken (someone) with an excess of sweetness, richness, or sentiment. <i>A curious bitter sweetness that <b>cloyed</b> her senses.</i>
<b>copious</b>	Affording an abundant supply. <i>She took <b>copious</b> notes.</i>
<b>excess</b>	Excessive indulgence. <i>Trying to lose <b>excess</b> weight.</i>
<b>galore</b>	In abundance. <i>Whiskey <b>galore</b>.</i>
<b>glut</b>	An excessively abundant supply of something. <i>There is a <b>glut</b> of cars on the market.</i>
<b>lavishly</b>	In a rich and lavish manner. <i><b>Lavishly</b> decorated.</i>

<b>lot</b>	Divide items into lots for sale at an auction. <i>Nineteen <b>lots</b> failed to sell.</i>
<b>luxuriant</b>	(of hair) thick and healthy. <i>She tossed her <b>luxuriant</b> dark hair.</i>
<b>many</b>	The majority of people. <i><b>Many</b> directions.</i>
<b>mellowness</b>	Kindheartedness through maturity or old age. <i>The cheap wine had no body no <b>mellowness</b>.</i>
<b><u>myriad</u></b>	(chiefly in classical history) a unit of ten thousand. <i>The <b>myriad</b> political scene.</i>
<b>outnumber</b>	Be more numerous than. <i>Women <b>outnumbered</b> men by three to one.</i>
<b>oversupply</b>	Supply with too much or too many. <i><b>Oversupply</b> causes prices to fall.</i>
<b>plenitude</b>	A full supply. <i>An ancient Celtic god thought to bring a <b>plenitude</b> of wealth or food.</i>
<b>plenteous</b>	Affording an abundant supply. <i>A <b>plenteous</b> grape harvest.</i>
<b>plentiful</b>	Existing in or yielding great quantities; abundant. <i>Food is <b>plentiful</b>.</i>
<b>plentitude</b>	A full supply.
<b><u>plenty</u></b>	A situation in which food and other necessities are available in sufficiently large quantities. <i>I've had <b>plenty</b> thanks.</i>
<b><u>profuse</u></b>	(of a person) extravagant. <i>They are <b>profuse</b> in hospitality.</i>
<b>prosperity</b>	The state of being prosperous. <i>A long period of peace and <b>prosperity</b>.</i>
<b>replete</b>	Deeply filled or permeated. <i>I went out into the sun drenched streets again <b>replete</b> and relaxed.</i>
<b>repletion</b>	The state of being satisfactorily full and unable to take on more.
<b>superfluity</b>	An unnecessarily or excessively large amount or number of something. <i>Servants who had nothing to do but to display their own <b>superfluity</b>.</i>
<b>surfeit</b>	Supply or feed to surfeit. <i>I am <b>surfeited</b> with shopping.</i>
<b><u>surplus</u></b>	The excess value of a company's assets over the face value of its stock. <i><b>Surplus</b> cheese distributed to the needy.</i>

**voluminous** (of clothes) very loose or full; having much fabric.  
*He sank into a **voluminous** armchair.*
