<b>stumble</b>	An unsteady uneven gait. <i>He parodied my groping <b>stumble</b> across the stage.</i>
<b>trip</b>	A mistake. <i>Yonder comes Dalinda I know her by her <b>trip</b>.</i>
<b>tumble</b>	A rapid fall in amount or value. <i>I took a <b>tumble</b> in the nettles.</i>

## Plummet as a Verb

### Definitions of "Plummet" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "plummet" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Decrease rapidly in value or amount.*
- *Fall or drop straight down at high speed.*
- *Drop sharply.*

### Synonyms of "Plummet" as a verb (17 Words)

<b>crash</b>	Move with or as if with a crashing noise. <i>Mother <b>crashed</b> the motorbike into the lamppost.</i>
<b>decrease rapidly</b>	Decrease in size, extent, or range.
<b>descend rapidly</b>	Come as if by falling.
<b>dive</b>	Drop steeply. <i>I was afraid to <b>dive</b> from the board into the pool.</i>
<b>drop</b>	Score a goal by a drop kick. <i>He <b>dropped</b> the load off at a dealer s.</i>
<b>drop rapidly</b>	Hang freely.
<b>fall headlong</b>	Be born, used chiefly of lambs.
<b>fall sharply</b>	Drop oneself to a lower or less erect position.

<b>fall steeply</b>	Be cast down.
<b>go down</b>	To be spent or finished.
<b>hurtle</b>	Throw forcefully. <i>The trucks <b>hurtled</b> them through the grassland to the construction sites.</i>
<b>nosedive</b>	Of an aircraft make a nosedive. <i>Massive strikes caused the economy to <b>nosedive</b>.</i>
<b>plump</b>	Make fat or plump. <i>We will <b>plump</b> out that poor starving child.</i>
<b>plunge</b>	Suffer a rapid decrease in value. <i>For a moment the scene was illuminated then it was <b>plunged</b> back into darkness.</i>
<b>sink</b>	Cause a ship to sink. <i>They agreed to <b>sink</b> their differences.</i>
<b>slump</b>	Fall heavily or suddenly; decline markedly. <i>He <b>slumped</b> onto the couch.</i>
<b>tumble</b>	Cause to topple or tumble by pushing. <i>They <b>tumbled</b> the teams with no apparent pattern.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Plummet" as a verb

- A climber was killed when he plummeted 300 feet down an icy gully.
- The stock market plummeted.
- Hardware sales plummeted.

## Associations of "Plummet" (30 Words)

<b>cliff</b>	A steep high face of rock. <i>He stood on a high <b>cliff</b> overlooking the town.</i>
<b>declension</b>	The inflection of nouns and pronouns and adjectives in Indo-European languages. <i>The first <b>declension</b> in Latin.</i>
<b>declivity</b>	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded <b>declivity</b>.</i>
<b>descend</b>	Move downward and lower, but not necessarily all the way. <i>She was <b>descended</b> from an old Italian noble family.</i>

<b>descending</b>	Coming down or downward. <i>A rocky <b>descending</b> path.</i>
<b>descent</b>	The act of changing your location in a downward direction. <i>The settlers were of Cornish <b>descent</b>.</i>
<b>dip</b>	Dip into a liquid. <i>A reference work to <b>dip</b> into time and time again.</i>
<b>dive</b>	Plunge into water. <i>Arctic skuas which <b>dive</b> at your head as you walk near their territories.</i>
<b>down</b>	Shoot at and force to come down. <i>Feeling discouraged and <b>downhearted</b>.</i>
<b>downturn</b>	A decline in economic, business, or other activity. <i>A <b>downturn</b> in the housing market.</i>
<b>dribble</b>	The propulsion of a ball by repeated taps or kicks. <i><b>Dribble</b> oil into the mixture.</i>
<b>drop</b>	A section of theatrical scenery lowered from the flies a drop cloth or drop curtain. <i>The land <b>drops</b> away to the river.</i>
<b>fall</b>	A defeat or downfall. <i>Rain snow and sleet were <b>falling</b>.</i>
<b>falling</b>	Decreasing in number, amount, intensity, or quality. <i><b>Falling</b> temperature.</i>
<b>headfirst</b>	With the head foremost. <i>A <b>headfirst</b> plunge down the stairs.</i>
<b>immerse</b>	Cause to be immersed. <i>She was still <b>immersed</b> in her thoughts.</i>
<b>longitudinal</b>	Of or relating to lines of longitude. <i><b>Longitudinal</b> positions.</i>
<b>orthogonal</b>	(of an experiment) having variates which can be treated as statistically independent. <i>Wind and sea may displace the ship's center of gravity along three <b>orthogonal</b> axes.</i>
<b>perpendicular</b>	Perpendicular position or direction. <i>The great <b>perpendicular</b> face of the cliff.</i>
<b>plunge</b>	Fall suddenly and uncontrollably. <i>He <b>plunged</b> his hands into his pockets.</i>
<b>precipitous</b>	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation. <i>A <b>precipitous</b> slide in the government's popularity.</i>

<b>risen</b>	(of e.g. celestial bodies) above the horizon. <i>The <b>risen</b> sun.</i>
<b>sink</b>	Cause a ship to sink. <i>He saw the coffin <b>sink</b> below the surface of the waves.</i>
<u><b>spill</b></u>	Liquid that is spilled. <i>The horse was wrenched off course <b>spilling</b> his rider.</i>
<u><b>submerge</b></u>	Descend below the surface of an area of water. <i>Houses had been flooded and cars <b>submerged</b>.</i>
<u><b>trickle</b></u>	Come, go, or appear slowly or gradually. <i>The first members of the congregation began to <b>trickle</b> in.</i>
<b>upright</b>	An upright piano. <i>The ball sailed between the <b>uprights</b>.</i>
<b>vertical</b>	A vertical line or plane. <i>We need more <b>vertical</b> cooperation between manufacturers and service providers.</i>
