spill	An instance of a liquid spilling or being spilt. <i>He was absolved from any blame for the oil spill.</i>
stumble	An unsteady uneven gait. <i>He parodied my groping stumble across the stage.</i>
trip	A mistake. <i>Yonder comes Dalinda I know her by her trip.</i>
tumble	A rapid fall in amount or value. <i>I took a tumble in the nettles.</i>

- *The bird has a circular display flight followed by an earthward plummet.*

Definitions of "Plummet" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "plummet" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Decrease rapidly in value or amount.*
- *Fall or drop straight down at high speed.*
- *Drop sharply.*

Synonyms of "Plummet" as a verb (17 Words)

crash	Move with or as if with a crashing noise. <i>Mother crashed the motorbike into the lamppost.</i>
decrease rapidly	Decrease in size, extent, or range.
descend rapidly	Come as if by falling.
dive	Drop steeply. <i>I was afraid to dive from the board into the pool.</i>
drop	Score a goal by a drop kick. <i>He dropped the load off at a dealer s.</i>
drop rapidly	Hang freely.
fall headlong	Be born, used chiefly of lambs.
fall sharply	Drop oneself to a lower or less erect position.

fall steeply	Be cast down.
go down	To be spent or finished.
hurtle	Throw forcefully. <i>The trucks hurtled them through the grassland to the construction sites.</i>
nosedive	Of an aircraft make a nosedive. <i>Massive strikes caused the economy to nosedive.</i>
plump	Make fat or plump. <i>We will plump out that poor starving child.</i>
plunge	Suffer a rapid decrease in value. <i>For a moment the scene was illuminated then it was plunged back into darkness.</i>
sink	Cause a ship to sink. <i>They agreed to sink their differences.</i>
slump	Fall heavily or suddenly; decline markedly. <i>He slumped onto the couch.</i>
tumble	Cause to topple or tumble by pushing. <i>They tumbled the teams with no apparent pattern.</i>

Usage Examples of "Plummet" as a verb

- A climber was killed when he plummeted 300 feet down an icy gully.
- The stock market plummeted.
- Hardware sales plummeted.

cliff	A steep high face of rock. <i>He stood on a high cliff overlooking the town.</i>
declension	The inflection of nouns and pronouns and adjectives in Indo-European languages. <i>The first declension in Latin.</i>
declivity	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i>
descend	Move downward and lower, but not necessarily all the way. <i>She was descended from an old Italian noble family.</i>

descending	Coming down or downward. <i>A rocky descending path.</i>
descent	The act of changing your location in a downward direction. <i>The settlers were of Cornish descent.</i>
dip	Dip into a liquid. <i>A reference work to dip into time and time again.</i>
dive	Plunge into water. <i>Arctic skuas which dive at your head as you walk near their territories.</i>
down	Shoot at and force to come down. <i>Feeling discouraged and downhearted.</i>
downturn	A decline in economic, business, or other activity. <i>A downturn in the housing market.</i>
dribble	The propulsion of a ball by repeated taps or kicks. <i>Dribble oil into the mixture.</i>
drop	A section of theatrical scenery lowered from the flies a drop cloth or drop curtain. <i>The land drops away to the river.</i>
fall	A defeat or downfall. <i>Rain snow and sleet were falling.</i>
falling	Decreasing in number, amount, intensity, or quality. <i>Falling temperature.</i>
headfirst	With the head foremost. <i>A headfirst plunge down the stairs.</i>
immerse	Cause to be immersed. <i>She was still immersed in her thoughts.</i>
longitudinal	Of or relating to lines of longitude. <i>Longitudinal positions.</i>
orthogonal	(of an experiment) having variates which can be treated as statistically independent. <i>Wind and sea may displace the ship's center of gravity along three orthogonal axes.</i>
perpendicular	Perpendicular position or direction. <i>The great perpendicular face of the cliff.</i>
plunge	Fall suddenly and uncontrollably. <i>He plunged his hands into his pockets.</i>
precipitous	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation. <i>A precipitous slide in the government's popularity.</i>

risen	(of e.g. celestial bodies) above the horizon. <i>The risen sun.</i>
sink	Cause a ship to sink. <i>He saw the coffin sink below the surface of the waves.</i>
<u>spill</u>	Liquid that is spilled. <i>The horse was wrenched off course spilling his rider.</i>
<u>submerge</u>	Descend below the surface of an area of water. <i>Houses had been flooded and cars submerged.</i>
<u>trickle</u>	Come, go, or appear slowly or gradually. <i>The first members of the congregation began to trickle in.</i>
upright	An upright piano. <i>The ball sailed between the uprights.</i>
vertical	A vertical line or plane. <i>We need more vertical cooperation between manufacturers and service providers.</i>
