<b>benefit</b>	Financial assistance in time of need. <i>Part time jobs supplemented by means tested <b>benefits</b>.</i>
<b>bonus</b>	An additional payment (or other remuneration) to employees as a means of increasing output. <i>Good weather is an added <b>bonus</b> but the real appeal is the landscape.</i>
<b>dividend</b>	An individual's share of a dividend. <i>Buying a rail pass may still pay <b>dividends</b>.</i>
<b>extra</b>	A person engaged temporarily to fill out a crowd scene in a film or play. <i>The price includes all major charges there are no hidden <b>extras</b>.</i>
<b>fringe benefit</b>	The outside boundary or surface of something.
<b>good point</b>	Benefit.
<b>perk</b>	An incidental benefit awarded for certain types of employment (especially if it is regarded as a right).
<b>plus point</b>	A useful or valuable quality.
<b>pro</b>	A prostitute. <i>A tennis <b>pro</b>.</i>
<b><u>summation</u></b>	The arithmetic operation of summing; calculating the sum of two or more numbers. <i>Their value is no mere <b>summation</b> of the values of their component parts.</i>

<b>addition</b>	The process of calculating the total of two or more numbers or amounts. <i>The <b>addition</b> of cinnamon improved the flavor.</i>

<b>beneficial</b>	Promoting or enhancing well-being. <i>The appellant had no <b>beneficial</b> interest in the house.</i>
<b>enumeration</b>	The action of mentioning a number of things one by one. <i>Detailed <b>enumeration</b> of the income of the household.</i>
<b>except</b>	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are <b>excepted</b> from control.</i>
<b>excess</b>	Excessive indulgence. <i>Trying to lose <b>excess</b> weight.</i>
<b>extra</b>	Excessive or extravagant. <i>Breakfast is <b>extra</b> but there are tea and coffee facilities.</i>
<b>gainful</b>	Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit. <i>He soon found <b>gainful</b> employment.</i>
<b>pluralism</b>	A political theory or system of power-sharing among a number of political parties.
<b>pro</b>	Of a person or an event professional. <i>A <b>pro</b> golfer.</i>
<b>redundance</b>	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.

<b><u>rundown</u></b>	(especially of a building or area) in a poor or neglected state after having been prosperous. <i>He gave his teammates a <b>rundown</b> on the opposition.</i>
<b>scads</b>	A large number or amount. <i>They raised <b>scads</b> of children.</i>
<b><u>secondary</u></b>	A secondary coil or winding in an electrical transformer. <i>A <b>secondary</b> infection.</i>
<b><u>spare</u></b>	Elegantly simple. <i>A <b>spare</b> tire.</i>
<b>subsidiary</b>	(of a company) controlled by a holding or parent company. <i>Many argue that the cause of animal rights is <b>subsidiary</b> to that of protecting the environment.</i>
<b><u>summation</u></b>	The final aggregate. <i>The <b>summation</b> of four and three gives seven.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>supererogatory</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>It was <b>supererogatory</b> of her to gloat.</i>
<b>superfluity</b>	The state of being superfluous. <i>They thought the garrison a <b>superfluity</b>.</i>
<b>superfluous</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for <b>superfluous</b> information.</i>
<b>supernumerary</b>	A supernumerary person or thing. <i>As a <b>supernumerary</b> he was given a variety of jobs.</i>
<b>supplementary</b>	A supplementary person or thing. <i>Produced <b>supplementary</b> volumes.</i>
<b><u>surplus</u></b>	Denoting a shop selling excess or outdated military equipment or clothing. <i>She had picked up her boots in an army <b>surplus</b> store.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	Unnecessary things. <i>Good construction is essential to avoid <b>unnecessary</b> waste.</i>
