## Podium as a Noun

### Definitions of "Podium" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “podium” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *(in some sporting events) a structure consisting of three adjacent platforms of different heights, on which the competitors finishing in first, second, and third places receive their awards.*
- *A lectern.*
- *A small platform on which a person may stand to be seen by an audience, as when making a speech or conducting an orchestra.*
- *A platform raised above the surrounding level to give prominence to the person on it.*
- *A continuous projecting base or pedestal under a building.*
- *A projecting lower structure around the base of a tower block.*
- *A raised platform surrounding the arena in an ancient amphitheatre.*



## Synonyms of "Podium" as a noun (21 Words)

<b>ambo</b>	A platform raised above the surrounding level to give prominence to the person on it.
<b><u>base</u></b>	A known line used as a geometrical base for trigonometry. <i>Everything she cooked seemed to have rice as the <b>base</b>.</i>
<b>bed</b>	A place on the seabed where shellfish especially oysters or mussels breed or are bred. <i>The unit has 20 geriatric <b>beds</b>.</i>
<b>bottom</b>	The fleshy part of the human body that you sit on. <i>Whatever his faults he possesses that old fashioned quality <b>bottom</b>.</i>
<b><u>column</u></b>	Anything that approximates the shape of a column or tower. <i>I ve been reading your <b>column</b> for five years.</i>
<b>dais</b>	A low platform for a lectern or throne.
<b>foot</b>	A member of a surveillance team who works on foot or rides as a passenger. <i>The <b>foot</b> of the page.</i>

<b>foundation</b>	The basis on which something is grounded. <i>A <b>foundation</b> brush.</i>
<b>mounting</b>	The action of mounting something. <i>He pulled the curtain rail from its <b>mounting</b>.</i>
<b>pier</b>	The pillar of an arch or supporting a bridge.
<b>pillar</b>	Something shaped like a pillar. <i>Science eroded the <b>pillars</b> of superstition.</i>
<b>platform</b>	A document stating the aims and principles of a political party. <i>Their candidate simply ignored the party <b>platform</b>.</i>
<b>plinth</b>	An architectural support or base (as for a column or statue). <i>Busts of the King and Queen on marble <b>plinths</b>.</i>
<b>pulpit</b>	A raised enclosed platform in a church or chapel from which the preacher delivers a sermon. <i>Many ministers delivered political guidance from their <b>pulpits</b>.</i>
<b>rostrum</b>	A raised platform on which a person stands to make a public speech, receive an award or medal, play music, or conduct an orchestra. <i>The composer moved from keyboard to <b>rostrum</b>.</i>
<b>soapbox</b>	Used with reference to a situation in which someone expresses strong opinions about a particular subject. <i>A <b>soapbox</b> orator.</i>
<b>stage</b>	A stagecoach. <i>I was in the early <b>stages</b> of pregnancy.</i>
<b>stand</b>	The position where a thing or person stands. <i>A taxi <b>stand</b>.</i>
<b>stump</b>	Used in relation to political campaigning. <i>His jibes at his opponents may have won him some support on the <b>stump</b> early in his campaign.</i>
<b>substructure</b>	The basic structure or features of a system or organization. <i>Here is a Roman theatre built over barrel vaulted <b>substructures</b>.</i>
<b>support</b>	A musical part vocal or instrumental that supports or provides background for other musical parts. <i>She's been through a bad time and needs our <b>support</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Podium" as a noun

- *A six columned portico raised on a podium.*
- *He was at the podium facing an expectant conference crowd.*
- *I took the score out of my briefcase and put it on the podium.*
- *It was more than I could imagine to be up on the podium and singing the national anthem.*





## Associations of "Podium" (30 Words)

<b>altar</b>	A table or flat-topped block used as the focus for a religious ritual, especially for making sacrifices or offerings to a deity.
<b>baptismal</b>	Of or relating to baptism. <i><b>Baptismal</b> rites.</i>
<b>chalice</b>	A bowl-shaped drinking vessel; especially the Eucharistic cup.
<b>confessional</b>	Relating to religious confession. <i>Tabloid <b>confessionals</b>.</i>
<b>course</b>	A pursuit of game (especially hares) with greyhounds by sight rather than scent. <i>The <b>course</b> of history.</i>
<b>dais</b>	A platform raised above the surrounding level to give prominence to the person on it.
<b>goblet</b>	A drinking glass with a foot and a stem. <i>A beautifully engraved crystal <b>goblet</b>.</i>
<b>homework</b>	Schoolwork that a pupil is required to do at home. <i>He always helps his daughter with her <b>homework</b>.</i>
<b>homiletics</b>	The art of preaching.
<b>homily</b>	A sermon on a moral or religious topic. <i>She delivered her <b>homily</b> about the need for patience.</i>
<b>lear</b>	The hero of William Shakespeare's tragedy who was betrayed and mistreated by two of his scheming daughters.
<b>lectern</b>	A tall stand with a sloping top to hold a book or notes, from which someone, typically a preacher or lecturer, can read while standing up.
<b>lecture</b>	Deliver an educational lecture or lectures. <i>In each course there are supporting <b>lectures</b> and tutorials.</i>
<b>monitory</b>	Serving to warn. <i>The chill <b>monitory</b> wail of an air raid siren.</i>
<b>oratory</b>	Addressing an audience formally (usually a long and rhetorical address and often pompous). <i>He loved the sound of his own <b>oratory</b>.</i>
<b>preach</b>	Used to affirm one's approval of or support for a stated opinion, advocated course of action, etc. <i>Our pastor will <b>preach</b> the sermon.</i>

<b>pulpit</b>	A guard rail enclosing a small area at the bow of a yacht. <i>The movies could rival the <b>pulpit</b> as an agency moulding the ideas of the mass public.</i>
<b>read</b>	Of a piece of writing convey a specified impression to the reader. <i>It s the best novel I ve ever <b>read</b>.</i>
<b>reliquary</b>	A container for holy relics.
<b>rostrum</b>	A raised platform supporting a film or television camera. <i>Speaker after speaker stepped up to the <b>rostrum</b>.</i>
<b>sacrifice</b>	An animal person or object offered in the act of sacrifice. <i>He had to sell his car at a considerable <b>sacrifice</b>.</i>
<b>sacrificial</b>	Designed to be used up or destroyed in fulfilling a purpose or function. <i>An altar for <b>sacrificial</b> offerings.</i>
<b><u>sermon</u></b>	An address of a religious nature (usually delivered during a church service). <i>I preached my first <b>sermon</b> on original sin.</i>
<b>speech</b>	The expression of or the ability to express thoughts and feelings by articulate sounds. <i>She wouldn t accept his correction of her <b>speech</b>.</i>
<b><u>stage</u></b>	Perform a play especially on a stage. <i>I ve always wanted to go on the <b>stage</b>.</i>
<b>stand</b>	The position where a thing or person stands. <i>The hotel <b>stands</b> in three acres of gardens.</i>
<b>stump</b>	Remove tree stumps from. <i>This problem <b>stumped</b> her.</i>
<b>teach</b>	A teacher. <i>She came to say Hi to her old <b>teach</b>.</i>
<b>uproot</b>	Move (someone) from their home or a familiar location. <i>A revolution is necessary to <b>uproot</b> the social order.</i>
<b>valedictorian</b>	(in North America) a student who delivers the valedictory at a graduation ceremony.
