#### Definitions of "Polite" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "polite" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Relating to people who regard themselves as more cultured and refined than others.
- Marked by refinement in taste and manners.
- Not rude; marked by satisfactory (or especially minimal) adherence to social usages and sufficient but not noteworthy consideration for others- W.S. Maugham.
- Having or showing behaviour that is respectful and considerate of other people.
- Not rude; marked by satisfactory (or especially minimal) adherence to social usages and sufficient but not noteworthy consideration for others.
- Showing regard for others in manners, speech, behavior, etc.

<u>chivalrous</u>	Being attentive to women like an ideal knight. Shall I be <b>chivalrous</b> and offer you my coat.
<u>civil</u>	Relating to civil law. A <i>civil</i> action.
civilised	Marked by refinement in taste and manners.
<u>civilized</u>	Marked by refinement in taste and manners. A <i>civilized</i> society.
<u>courteous</u>	Characterized by courtesy and gracious good manners-Francis Bacon. If a man be gracious and <b>courteous</b> to strangers it shows he is a citizen of the world.
courtly	Very polite or refined, as befitting a royal court. A <b>courtly</b> gentleman.
cultivated	Prepared for raising crops by plowing or fertilizing. <i>Cultivated</i> speech.



cultured	Characterized by refined taste and manners and good education. <i>Cultured</i> tumour cells.
deferential	Showing deference; respectful. People were always <b>deferential</b> to him.
elegant	Graceful and stylish in appearance or manner. An <b>elegant</b> mathematical solution simple and precise.
<u>gallant</u>	(of a person or their behaviour) brave; heroic. She had made <b>gallant</b> efforts to pull herself together.
genteel	Characterized by exaggerated or affected politeness, refinement, or respectability. <i>A genteel</i> old lady.
gentlemanly	Befitting a man of good breeding. His <b>gentlemanly</b> behaviour.
<u>gracious</u>	A polite epithet used of royalty or their acts. Greig was <b>gracious</b> in defeat.
ladylike	Befitting a woman of good breeding. <i>Ladylike</i> manners.
<u>refined</u>	Precise to a fine degree. <b>Refined</b> sugar.
respectful	Feeling or manifesting veneration. A <b>respectful</b> glance.
<u>sophisticated</u>	Appealing to or frequented by people who are sophisticated. A <b>sophisticated</b> drama.
urbane	Courteous and refined in manner (typically used of a man. <b>Urbane</b> wit was the mark of taste and cultivation.
well behaved	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.
well bred	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.
well brought up	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.
well mannered	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.

# Associations of "Polite" (30 Words)

<u>chivalrous</u>	Relating to the historical concept of chivalry. Shall I be <b>chivalrous</b> and offer you my coat.
<u>chivalry</u>	The medieval principles governing knighthood and knightly conduct. I fought against the cream of French <b>chivalry</b> .
<u>civility</u>	Formal politeness and courtesy in behaviour or speech. I hope we can treat each other with <b>civility</b> and respect.
comity	An association of nations for their mutual benefit. A show of public <b>comity</b> in the White House.
condescendingly	With condescension; in a patronizing manner. <i>He treats his secretary <b>condescendingly</b>.</i>
<u>courteous</u>	Exhibiting courtesy and politeness. She was <b>courteous</b> and obliging to all.



<u>courtesy</u>	A courteous manner. <i>He treated the players with</i> <b>courtesy</b> and good humour.
couth	(used facetiously) refined and well-mannered. It is more <b>couth</b> to hold your shrimp genteelly by the tail when eating.
curtsy	Perform a curtsy. She bobbed a <b>curtsy</b> to him.
<u>decent</u>	Decently clothed. Speech in this circle if not always <b>decent</b> never became lewd.
decorous	According with custom or propriety. The tete a tete was <b>decorous</b> in the extreme.
decorum	Etiquette. He had no idea of funeral <b>decorum</b> .
etiquette	Rules governing socially acceptable behavior. Court <b>etiquette</b> was now familiar to Joan.
<u>gracious</u>	Exhibiting courtesy and politeness. <i>Gracious</i> even to unexpected visitors.
humble	Cause to be unpretentious. <i>He built the business empire from <b>humble</b> beginnings.</i>
humbleness	The state of being humble and unimportant.
humility	A humble feeling. Not everyone regards <b>humility</b> as a virtue.
lowliness	A position of inferior status; low in station or rank or fortune or estimation.
<u>menial</u>	A person with a menial job. <i>Menial factory jobs.</i>
<u>mild</u>	Humble in spirit or manner suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness. The climate was <b>mild</b> and conducive to life or growth.
moderate	A person who holds moderate views especially in politics. The neutrons causing fission are not <b>moderate</b> d but react at high energies.
<u>modest</u>	Relatively moderate, limited, or small. <i>Modest</i> dress means that hemlines must be below the knee.
respectful	Feeling or showing deference and respect. They sit in <b>respectful</b> silence.
respectfully	In a respectful manner. The butler bowed <b>respectfully</b> to them both.



seemly	Conforming to accepted notions of propriety or good taste; decorous. <i>Seemly behavior</i> .
staid	Characterized by dignity and propriety. <i>Staid</i> law firms.
<u>unassuming</u>	Not pretentious or arrogant; modest. <b>Unassuming</b> to a fault skeptical about the value of his work.
unbelievably	To a great degree; extremely. I feel <b>unbelievably</b> tired.
unpretentious	Lacking pretension or affectation. In spite of his fame he was thoroughly <b>unpretentious</b> .
virtue	Any admirable quality or attribute. <i>Patience is a <b>virtue</b>.</i>
