- Having or showing behaviour that is respectful and considerate of other people.

- Showing regard for others in manners, speech, behavior, etc.

Rules governing socially acceptable behavior.

Court etiquette was now familiar to Joan.

Exhibiting courtesy and politeness.

Gracious even to unexpected visitors.

humble Cause to be unpretentious.

He built the business empire from **humble** beginnings.

humbleness The state of being humble and unimportant.

humility A humble feeling.

Not everyone regards **humility** as a virtue.

lowliness A position of inferior status; low in station or rank or fortune or

estimation.

menial A person with a menial job.
