<b>report</b>	An employee who reports to another employee. <i>Press <b>reports</b> suggested that the secret police were helping to maintain public order.</i>
<b>snap</b>	Tender green beans without strings that easily snap into sections. <i>Holiday <b>snaps</b>.</i>
<b>soda</b>	Sodium carbonate, especially as a natural mineral or as an industrial chemical. <i>A can of <b>soda</b>.</i>
<b>soda pop</b>	A sodium salt of carbonic acid; used in making soap powders and glass and paper.
<b>soda water</b>	A sweet drink containing carbonated water and flavoring.
<b>tonic</b>	The first note of a diatonic scale. <i>Being needed is a <b>tonic</b> for someone at my age.</i>

<b><u>lay</u></b>	Lay eggs. <i><b>Lay</b> a responsibility on someone.</i>

<u>singer</u>	United States writer (born in Poland) of Yiddish stories and novels (1904-1991). <i>A pop <b>singer</b>.</i>
<b>soda</b>	Carbonated water (originally made with sodium bicarbonate) drunk alone or mixed with alcoholic drinks or fruit juice. <i>A whisky and <b>soda</b>.</i>
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>The pilgrims broke into <b>song</b>.</i>
<b>soprano</b>	A female or boy singer with a soprano voice. <i><b>Soprano</b> sax.</i>
<b>techno</b>	A style of fast heavy electronic dance music usually without vocals.
<b>tonic</b>	Music the first note of a diatonic scale. <i>A <b>tonic</b> reflex.</i>
<u>tune</u>	A melody, especially one that characterizes a particular piece of music. <i>The animals are finely <b>tuned</b> to life in the desert.</i>
