- *The role of the head of a government department.*
- *A range of investments held by a person or organization.*
- *A list of the financial assets held by an individual or a bank or other financial institution.*
- *A varied set of photographs of a model or actor intended to be shown to a potential employer.*
- *A large, flat, thin case for carrying loose papers or drawings or maps; usually leather.*
- *The position and duties of a Minister or Secretary of State.*
- *Denoting or engaged in an employment pattern which involves a succession of short-term contracts and part-time work, rather than the more traditional model of a single job for life.*
- *A large, thin, flat case for loose sheets of paper such as drawings or maps.*
- *A set of pieces of creative work collected to be shown to potential customers or employers.*
- *A range of products or services offered by an organization.*
- *A set of pieces of creative work intended to demonstrate a person's ability to a*

*potential employer.*



## Synonyms of "Portfolio" as a noun (10 Words)

<b>binder</b>	A bookbinder.
<b>bonds</b>	Money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial. <i>Their friendship constitutes a powerful bond between them.</i>
<b>document case</b>	Anything serving as a representation of a person's thinking by means of symbolic marks.
<b>equities</b>	The difference between the market value of a property and the claims held against it.
<b><u>file</u></b>	A set of related records (either written or electronic) kept together. <i>MI5 were keeping a <b>file</b> on him.</i>
<b><u>holdings</u></b>	Something owned; any tangible or intangible possession that is owned by someone.

<b>investments</b>	Outer layer or covering of an organ or part or organism. <i>This job calls for the investment of some hard thinking.</i>
<b>ring binder</b>	A platform usually marked off by ropes in which contestants box or wrestle.
<b>securities</b>	Defense against financial failure; financial independence. <i>His pension gave him security in his old age.</i>
<b>shares</b>	The effort contributed by a person in bringing about a result. <i>He bought 100 <b>shares</b> of IBM at the market price.</i>

### **accounting**

A bookkeeper's chronological list of related debits and credits of a business; forms part of a ledger of accounts.  
*Standard **accounting** practice.*

<b>advertise</b>	Publicize information about (a vacancy). <i>Some prisoners <b>advertised</b> the French of this terrible danger.</i>
<b>advertising</b>	A public promotion of some product or service. <i>Her father was in <b>advertising</b>.</i>
<b>brand</b>	An identifying mark burned on livestock or in former times criminals or slaves with a branding iron. <i>An ointment that <b>branded</b> her with unsightly violet coloured splotches.</i>
<b>business</b>	Business concerns collectively. <i>His goons will go through the ship like a <b>business</b> of ferrets.</i>
<b>clerical</b>	Of or relating to clerks. <i><b>Clerical</b> duties.</i>
<b>commerce</b>	Social exchange, especially of opinions, attitudes, etc. <i>The noise and warmth of human <b>commerce</b>.</i>
<b>commodity</b>	A raw material or primary agricultural product that can be bought and sold, such as copper or coffee. <i>Water is a precious <b>commodity</b>.</i>
<b>document</b>	Support or accompany with documentation. <i>The photographer spent years <b>documenting</b> the lives of miners.</i>
<b>file</b>	Smooth with a file. <i>MI5 were keeping a <b>file</b> on him.</i>
<b>importer</b>	Someone whose business involves importing goods from outside (especially from a foreign country). <i>The EU is the largest <b>importer</b> of agricultural products from developing countries.</i>
<b>infomercial</b>	A television commercial presented in the form of a short documentary.
<b>investment</b>	The act of putting on robes or vestments. <i>A total <b>investment</b> of 50 000.</i>
<b>item</b>	Used to introduce each item in a list. <i>An <b>item</b> of clothing.</i>
<b>management</b>	The people managing a company or organization, regarded collectively. <i>He alleges that staff have been victims of <b>management</b> bullying.</i>
<b>manufacturer</b>	Someone who manufactures something. <i>The <b>manufacturers</b> supply the goods to the distribution centre.</i>
<b>marketable</b>	Being in demand by especially employers. <i><b>Marketable</b> skills.</i>
<b>marketing</b>	Shopping at a market. <i>Does the weekly <b>marketing</b> at the supermarket.</i>

<b>merchandise</b>	Commodities offered for sale. <i>Shops which offered an astonishing range of <b>merchandise</b>.</i>
<b>owned</b>	Having an owner; often used in combination. <i>State <b>owned</b> railways.</i>
<b>product</b>	A chemical substance formed as a result of a chemical reaction. <i>Her perpetual suntan was the <b>product</b> of a solarium.</i>
<b><u>proprietary</u></b>	Behaving as if one owned something or someone. <i>Tylenol is a <b>proprietary</b> drug of which acetaminophen is the generic form.</i>
<b>sale</b>	The exchange of a commodity for money; the action of selling something. <i>They had to complete the <b>sale</b> before the banks closed.</i>
<b>salesclerk</b>	A salesperson in a store.
<b>salesperson</b>	A person employed to represent a business and to sell its merchandise (as to customers in a store or to customers who are visited).
<b><u>sponsorship</u></b>	Financial support received from a sponsor. <i>We raised about 6 000 in <b>sponsorship</b>.</i>
<b><u>trade</u></b>	Be traded at a certain price or under certain conditions. <i>They <b>trade</b> mud shark livers for fish oil.</i>
<b>trading</b>	Buying or selling securities or commodities. <i><b>Trading</b> profits leapt.</i>
<b>warranty</b>	A written guarantee, issued to the purchaser of an article by its manufacturer, promising to repair or replace it if necessary within a specified period of time. <i>As your machine is under <b>warranty</b> I suggest getting it checked.</i>
