<b><u>postulate</u></b>	Take as a given assume as a postulate or axiom. <i>The chapter was then allowed to <b>postulate</b> the bishop of Bath.</i>
<b><u>predicate</u></b>	Make the grammatical predicate in a proposition. <i>Aggression is <b>predicated</b> of those who act aggressively.</i>
<b><u>propose</u></b>	Propose or intend. <i>He <b>proposed</b> a new plan for dealing with terrorism.</i>
<b>propound</b>	Put forward, as of an idea. <i>He began to <b>propound</b> the idea of a social monarchy as an alternative to Franco.</i>
<b>put</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>I <b>put</b> my hand out towards her.</i>
<b>put forward</b>	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.
<b>set</b>	Put or set seeds seedlings or plants into the ground. <i>The herb has flowered and started to <b>set</b> seed.</i>
<b>set forth</b>	Equip with sails or masts.
<b><u>site</u></b>	Fix or build (something) in a particular place. <i>The rectory is <b>sited</b> behind the church.</i>
<b>situate</b>	Determine or indicate the place, site, or limits of, as if by an instrument or by a survey. <i>The pilot light is usually <b>situated</b> at the front of the boiler.</i>
<b>stand</b>	Have or maintain a position or stand on an issue. <i>Will your cooker <b>stand</b> the strain of the festive season.</i>
<b>state</b>	Present or introduce (a theme or melody) in a composition. <i>Money hasn't changed me she <b>stated</b> firmly.</i>
<b><u>station</u></b>	Assign to a station. <i>Troops were <b>stationed</b> in the town.</i>
<b><u>submit</u></b>	Refer to another person for decision or judgment. <i>The lawyers <b>submitted</b> the material to the court.</i>
<b>take as a hypothesis</b>	Take by force.

### **affirm**

To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true.

*Good teachers know that students need to be both **affirmed** and challenged.*

### **assert**

Assert to be true.

*He **asserted** his innocence.*

### **asserting**

Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration.

### **assertion**

A declaration that is made emphatically (as if no supporting evidence were necessary).

*The **assertion** of his legal rights.*

### **aver**

Report or maintain.

*He **averred** that he was innocent of the allegations.*

### **avow**

Assert or confess openly.

*He **avowed** his change of faith.*

<b>claim</b>	Lay claim to as of an idea. <i>His <b>claim</b> that he was innocent.</i>
<b><u>contend</u></b>	Maintain or assert. <i>Militant groups are <b>contending</b> for control of the country.</i>
<b>declamation</b>	Recitation of a speech from memory with studied gestures and intonation as an exercise in elocution or rhetoric. <i><b>Declamations</b> of patriotism.</i>
<b><u>declaration</u></b>	An act of declaring an innings closed. <i>A <b>declaration</b> of independence.</i>
<b>declarative</b>	Relating to the mood of verbs that is used simple in declarative statements. <i><b>Declarative</b> statements.</i>
<b>declaratory</b>	Having the function of declaring or explaining something. <i>A <b>declaratory</b> ruling in favour of the applicants.</i>
<b><u>declare</u></b>	Declare to be. <i>Do you have anything to <b>declare</b>.</i>
<b>deferment</b>	Act of putting off to a future time. <i>He was granted five <b>deferments</b> from the draft.</i>

<b>emend</b>	Alter (something that is incorrect). <i>These studies show him collating manuscripts and <b>emending</b> texts.</i>
<b>fix</b>	Decide upon or fix definitely. <i>She <b>fixed</b> her gaze on the man.</i>
<b>fixing</b>	Restraint that attaches to something or holds something in place. <i>Problems in need of <b>fixing</b>.</i>
<b>locate</b>	Discover the location of; determine the place of; find by searching or examining. <i>The company <b>located</b> some of their agents in Los Angeles.</i>
<b>locus</b>	The scene of any event or action (especially the place of a meeting). <i>A parabola is the <b>locus</b> of a point that moves so as to be equidistant from a fixed point and a straight line.</i>
<b>place</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>He would always have a special <b>place</b> in her heart.</i>



<b><u>postulate</u></b>	Take as a given assume as a postulate or axiom. <i>Perhaps the <b>postulate</b> of Babylonian influence on Greek astronomy is incorrect.</i>
<b>put</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>That song <b>put</b> me in awful good humor.</i>
<b>set</b>	Set down according to a plan. <i>My book will be types<b>set</b> nicely.</i>
<b>situate</b>	Situated. <i>The petty sessions area in which it is <b>situate</b>.</i>
<b>south</b>	The southern part of the world or of a specified country region or town. <i>He was staying in the <b>south</b> of France.</i>
<b>statement</b>	(music) the presentation of a musical theme. <i>Pure white walls and floors allow her <b>statement</b> furniture to take centre stage.</i>
<b><u>submit</u></b>	Hand over formally. <i>I <b>submit</b> to you that the accused is guilty.</i>
<b>unsubstantiated</b>	Unsupported by other evidence. <i><b>Unsubstantiated</b> claims.</i>
