advance	Pay in advance. <i>The building society advanced them a loan.</i>

fix	Decide upon or fix definitely. <i>Fix your eyes on this spot.</i>

locate	Establish oneself or one's business in a specified place. <i>His marketing strategy has been to locate in small towns.</i>

pose	Assume a posture as for artistic purposes. <i>This poses an interesting question.</i>
<u>postulate</u>	Take as a given assume as a postulate or axiom. <i>The chapter was then allowed to postulate the bishop of Bath.</i>
<u>predicate</u>	Make the grammatical predicate in a proposition. <i>Aggression is predicated of those who act aggressively.</i>
<u>propose</u>	Propose or intend. <i>He proposed a new plan for dealing with terrorism.</i>
propound	Put forward, as of an idea. <i>He began to propound the idea of a social monarchy as an alternative to Franco.</i>
put	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>I put my hand out towards her.</i>
put forward	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.
set	Put or set seeds seedlings or plants into the ground. <i>The herb has flowered and started to set seed.</i>
set forth	Equip with sails or masts.
<u>site</u>	Fix or build (something) in a particular place. <i>The rectory is sited behind the church.</i>
situate	Determine or indicate the place, site, or limits of, as if by an instrument or by a survey. <i>The pilot light is usually situated at the front of the boiler.</i>
stand	Have or maintain a position or stand on an issue. <i>Will your cooker stand the strain of the festive season.</i>
state	Present or introduce (a theme or melody) in a composition. <i>Money hasn't changed me she stated firmly.</i>
<u>station</u>	Assign to a station. <i>Troops were stationed in the town.</i>
<u>submit</u>	Refer to another person for decision or judgment. <i>The lawyers submitted the material to the court.</i>
take as a hypothesis	Take by force.

- *Deposit the suitcase on the bench.*

affirm

To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true.
*Good teachers know that students need to be both **affirmed** and challenged.*

assert

Assert to be true.
*He **asserted** his innocence.*

asserting

Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration.

assertion

A declaration that is made emphatically (as if no supporting evidence were necessary).
*The **assertion** of his legal rights.*

aver

Report or maintain.
*He **averred** that he was innocent of the allegations.*

avow

Assert or confess openly.
*He **avowed** his change of faith.*

claim	Lay claim to as of an idea. <i>His claim that he was innocent.</i>
<u>contend</u>	Maintain or assert. <i>Militant groups are contending for control of the country.</i>
declamation	Recitation of a speech from memory with studied gestures and intonation as an exercise in elocution or rhetoric. <i>Declamations of patriotism.</i>
<u>declaration</u>	An act of declaring an innings closed. <i>A declaration of independence.</i>
declarative	Relating to the mood of verbs that is used simple in declarative statements. <i>Declarative statements.</i>
declaratory	Having the function of declaring or explaining something. <i>A declaratory ruling in favour of the applicants.</i>
<u>declare</u>	Declare to be. <i>Do you have anything to declare.</i>
deferment	Act of putting off to a future time. <i>He was granted five deferments from the draft.</i>
emancipation	The freeing of someone from slavery. <i>The social and political emancipation of women.</i>
embedded	(of an object) fixed firmly and deeply in a surrounding mass; implanted. <i>Medical equipment using embedded controllers.</i>
emend	Alter (something that is incorrect). <i>These studies show him collating manuscripts and emending texts.</i>
