## **Possessed as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Possessed" as an adjective**

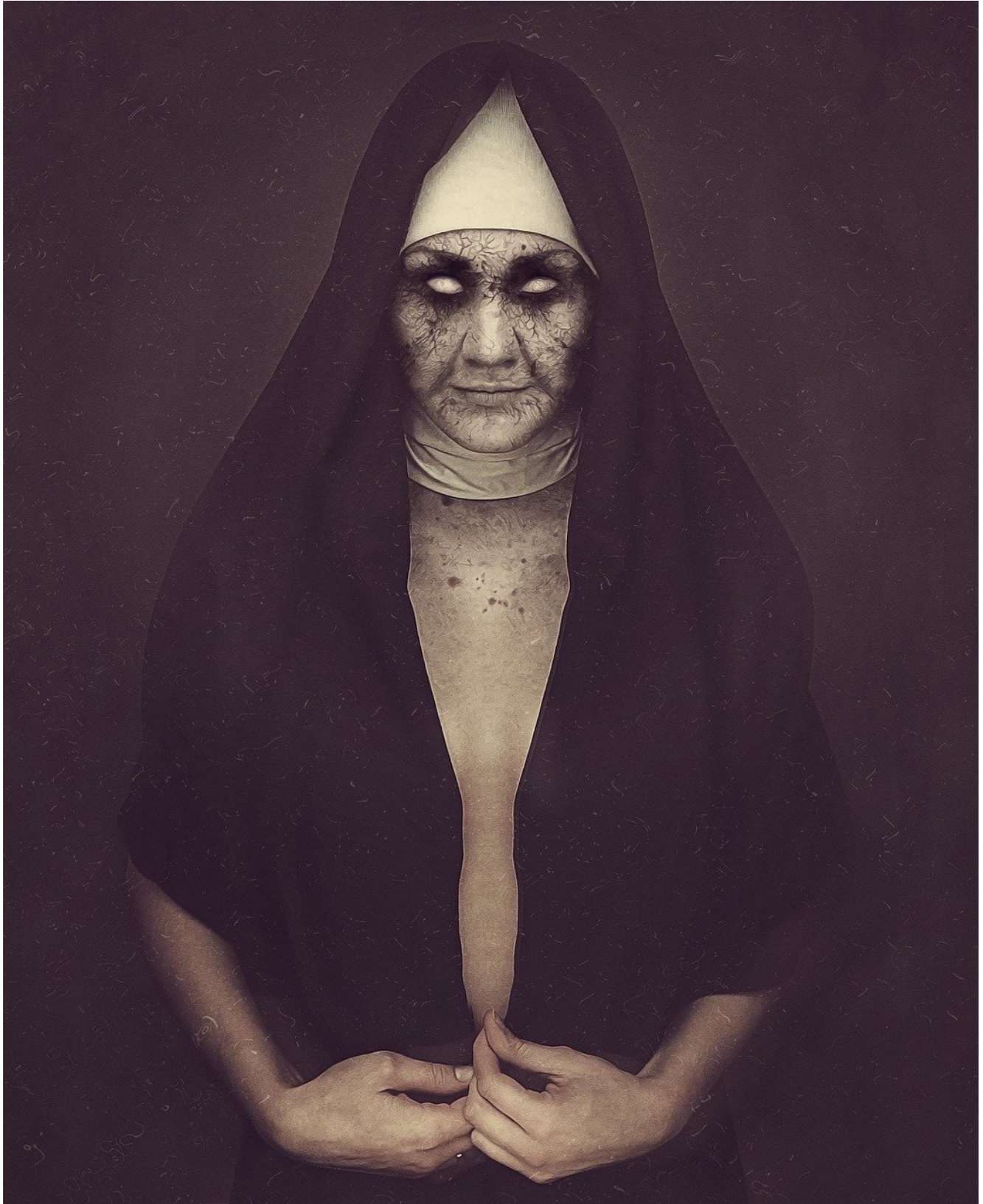
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “possessed” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Of, pertaining to, or like a demon or possession by a demon.*
- *(of a person) completely controlled by an evil spirit.*
- *Influenced or controlled by a powerful force such as a strong emotion.*



### Synonyms of "Possessed" as an adjective (3 Words)

- demonic** Of, pertaining to, or like a demon or possession by a demon.  
***Demonic** rage.*
- demoniacal** Relating to or characteristic of a demon or evil spirit.  
*Towards midnight a **demoniacal** shriek was heard.*
- obsessed** Having or showing excessive or compulsive concern with something.  
*Was absolutely **obsessed** with the girl.*



## Usage Examples of "Possessed" as an adjective

- *She ran like a possessed person.*
- *By love possessed.*



## Associations of "Possessed" (30 Words)

<b>ability</b>	The quality of being able to perform; a quality that permits or facilitates achievement or accomplishment. <i>A man of exceptional <b>ability</b>.</i>
<b>accept</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>I shall have to <b>accept</b> these unpleasant working conditions.</i>
<b>acceptance</b>	The process or fact of being received as adequate, valid, or suitable. <i>He anticipated their <b>acceptance</b> of his offer.</i>
<b>acquire</b>	Learn or develop (a skill, habit, or quality). <i>I've <b>acquired</b> a taste for whisky.</i>

<b>acquisition</b>	The action of acquiring something. <i>The <b>acquisition</b> of self control.</i>
<b>addressee</b>	The person to whom something is addressed. <i>The contents of the letters were calculated to cause distress to the individual <b>addressee</b>.</i>
<b>belong</b>	Be due to. <i>The race <b>belonged</b> completely to Fogarty.</i>
<b>bring</b>	Bring into a different state. <i>She <b>brings</b> a special atmosphere to our meetings.</i>
<b>broach</b>	Raise (a difficult subject) for discussion. <i>Boxed wines will remain in good condition for up to four months once <b>broached</b>.</i>
<b>clutch</b>	A clutch bag. <i>She made a <b>clutch</b> at his body.</i>
<b>dispossess</b>	(in sport) deprive (a player) of the ball. <i>A champion of the poor and the <b>dispossessed</b>.</i>
<b>fetch</b>	The action of fetching. <i>The land could <b>fetch</b> over a million pounds.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>His lying really <b>gets</b> me.</i>
<b>grab</b>	Capture the attention or imagination of. <i>They used the law to effect a land <b>grab</b>.</i>
<b>have</b>	Have a personal or business relationship with someone. <i>Are you going to <b>have</b> a party.</i>
<b>own</b>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>I used to design all my <b>own</b> clothes.</i>
<b>picking</b>	The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc. <i>He sent the first <b>picking</b> of berries to the market.</i>
<b>possession</b>	(sport) the act of controlling the ball (or puck). <i>The landlord wishes to gain <b>possession</b> of the accommodation.</i>
<b>procure</b>	Get by special effort. <i>He haunted railway stations to <b>procure</b> young girls for immoral purposes.</i>
<b>proprietorship</b>	An unincorporated business owned by a single person who is responsible for its liabilities and entitled to its profits. <i>Plenty of new firms especially sole <b>proprietorships</b> don't make money in their first few years of operation.</i>

<b>receive</b>	Receive a specified treatment abstract. <i><b>Receive</b> injuries.</i>
<b>receptiveness</b>	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>He was testing the government s <b>receptiveness</b> to reform.</i>
<b>resignedly</b>	With resignation and acceptance; in a resigned manner.
<b><u>retention</u></b>	The action of absorbing and continuing to hold a substance. <i>The soil s <b>retention</b> of moisture.</i>
<b><u>secure</u></b>	Financially sound. <i>The division <b>secured</b> a major contract.</i>
<b>select</b>	Selected or chosen for special qualifications. <i>The commonest phenotype in a population can be <b>selected</b> against.</i>
<b>sequesterate</b>	Legally place (the property of a bankrupt) in the hands of a trustee for division among the creditors. <i>Two more poll tax rebels were <b>sequestered</b>.</i>
<b>supplant</b>	Take the place or move into the position of. <i>The computer has <b>supplanted</b> the slide rule.</i>
<b>take</b>	Take as an undesirable consequence of some event or state of affairs. <i>Some people found her hard to <b>take</b>.</i>
<b>unavailable</b>	Not available or accessible or at hand. <i>Fresh milk was <b>unavailable</b> during the emergency.</i>
