According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “possible” as a noun can have the following definitions:

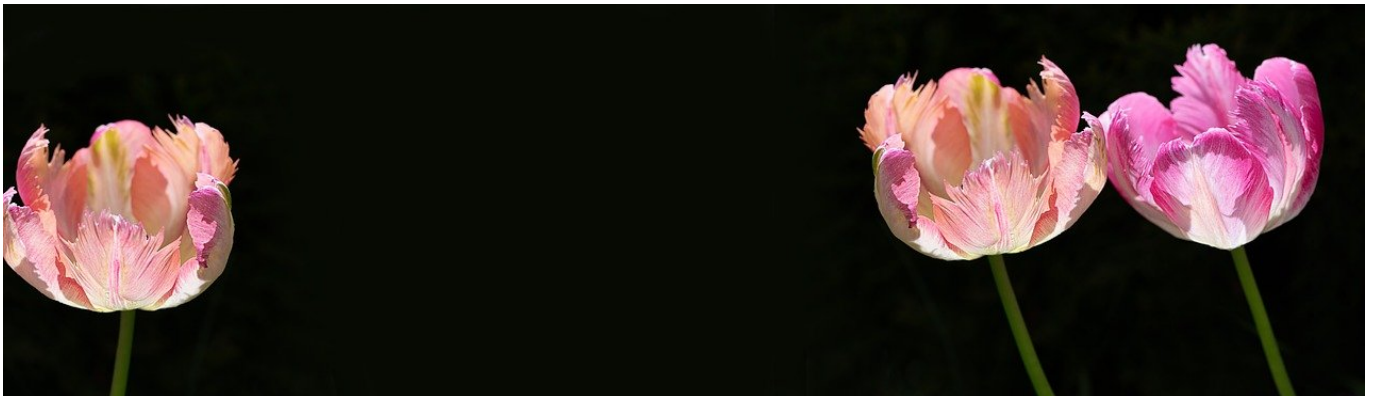
- *Something that can be done.*

Synonyms of "Possible" as a noun (2 Words)

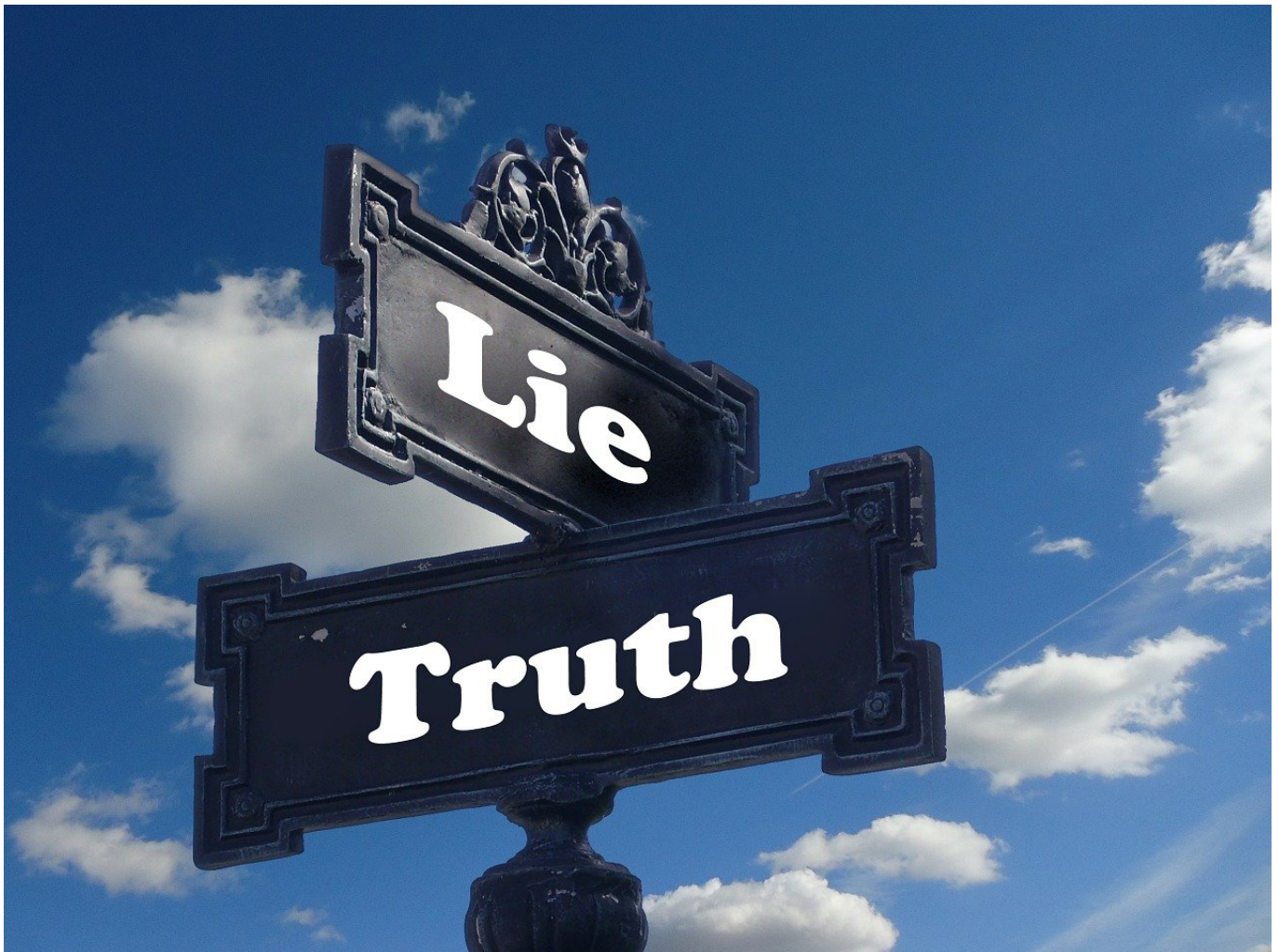
applicant A person who requests or seeks something such as assistance or employment or admission.

job applicant A program application that may consist of several steps but is a single logical unit.

Definitions of "Possible" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "possible" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *That may exist or happen, but that is not certain or probable.*
- *Capable of happening or existing.*
- *Able to be done or achieved.*
- *Existing in possibility.*
- *Having as much or as little of a specified quality as can be achieved.*
- *Able to be or become; potential.*
- *(of a number or score) as high as is achievable in a test, competition, or game.*



Synonyms of "Possible" as an adjective (23 Words)

able to be done Having inherent physical or mental ability or capacity.

achievable Able to be brought about or reached successfully.
*He broke the climb into small **achievable** stages.*

aspiring Desiring or striving for recognition or advancement.
*An **aspiring** artist.*

plausible	Apparently reasonable and credible, and therefore convincing. <i>A plausible liar.</i>
potential	Having or showing the capacity to develop into something in the future. <i>A potential problem.</i>
practicable	Capable of being done with means at hand and circumstances as they are. <i>A practicable solution.</i>
<u>probable</u>	Likely to happen or be the case. <i>It is probable that the economic situation will deteriorate further.</i>
prospective	Likely to happen at a future date. <i>A prospective mother.</i>
realizable	Capable of existing or taking place or proving true; possible to do. <i>The need to define realizable targets.</i>
tenable	Based on sound reasoning or evidence. <i>A scholarship of 200 per annum tenable for three years.</i>
thinkable	Capable of being conceived or imagined or considered. <i>Something that was barely thinkable just 70 years ago.</i>
viable	(of a plant, animal, or cell) capable of surviving or living successfully, especially under particular environmental conditions. <i>The proposed investment was economically viable.</i>

workable

Able to be worked, fashioned, or manipulated.
A **workable** peace settlement.

would-be

Unfulfilled or frustrated in realizing an ambition.
