According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “possible” as a noun can have the following definitions:

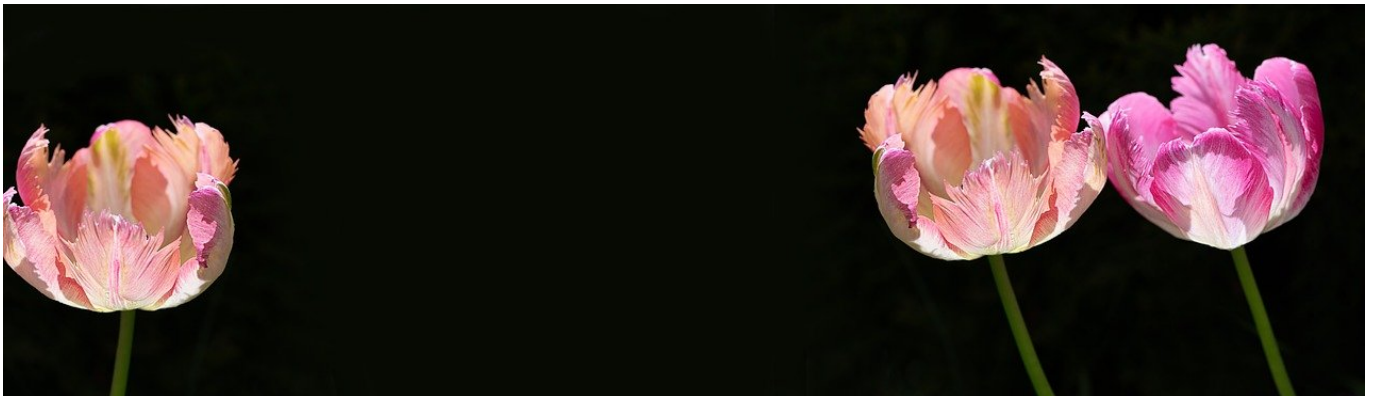
- *Something that can be done.*

## Synonyms of "Possible" as a noun (2 Words)

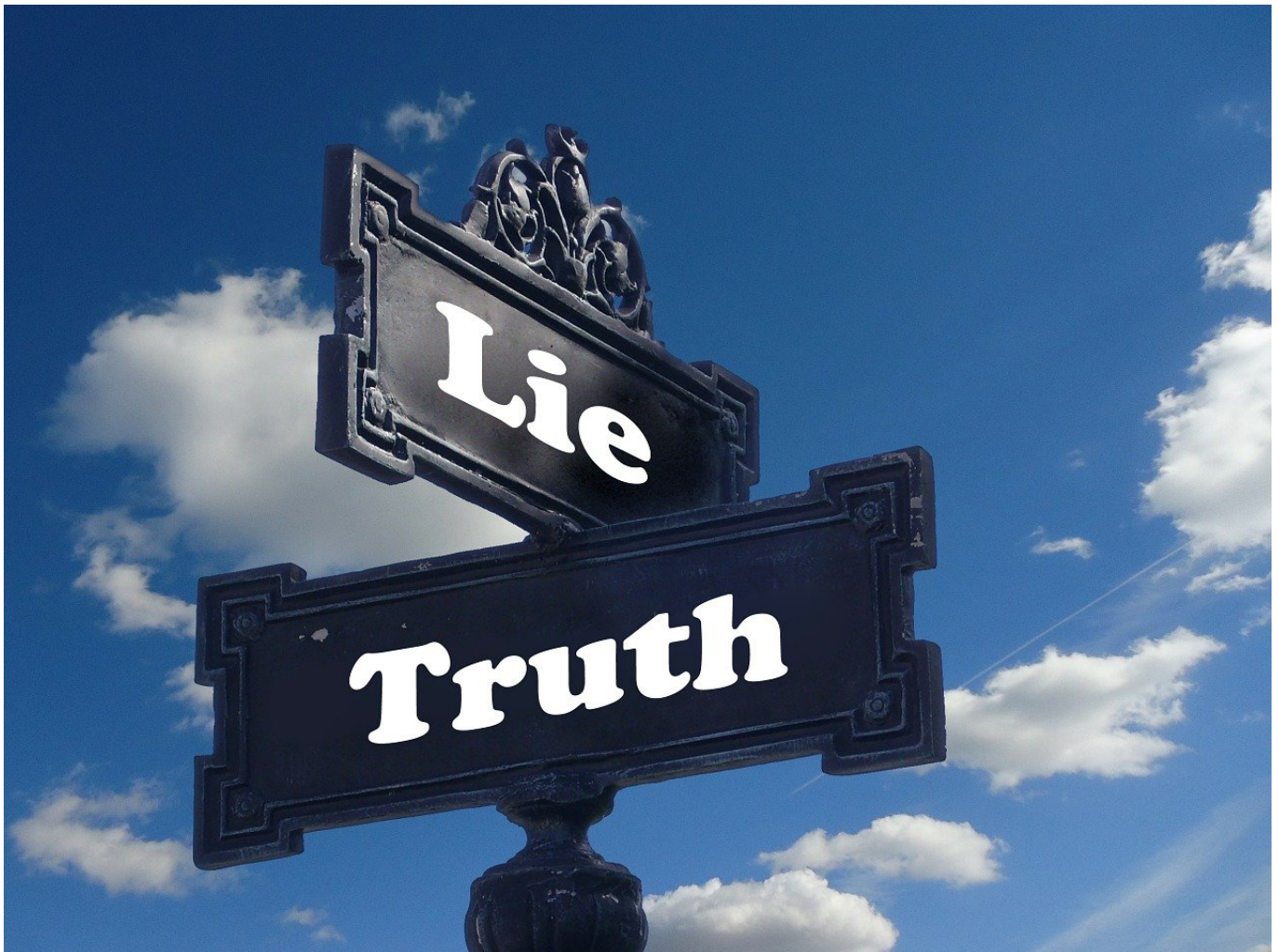
**applicant** A person who requests or seeks something such as assistance or employment or admission.  
*Applicants for the degree course.*

**job applicant** A program application that may consist of several steps but is a single logical unit.

## Possible as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Possible" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "possible" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *That may exist or happen, but that is not certain or probable.*
- *Capable of happening or existing.*
- *Able to be done or achieved.*
- *Existing in possibility.*
- *Having as much or as little of a specified quality as can be achieved.*
- *Able to be or become; potential.*
- *(of a number or score) as high as is achievable in a test, competition, or game.*



## Synonyms of "Possible" as an adjective (23 Words)

**able to be done** Having inherent physical or mental ability or capacity.

**achievable** Able to be brought about or reached successfully.  
*He broke the climb into small **achievable** stages.*

**aspiring** Desiring or striving for recognition or advancement.  
*An **aspiring** artist.*

<b><u>attainable</u></b>	Capable of being attained or accomplished. <i>Choose an <b>attainable</b> goal.</i>
<b><u>believable</u></b>	Able to be believed; credible. <i>She felt that Dawn s story was not quite <b>believable</b>.</i>
<b><u>conceivable</u></b>	Capable of being imagined. <i>A mass uprising was entirely <b>conceivable</b>.</i>
<b><u>credible</u></b>	Capable of being believed. <i>Few people found his story <b>credible</b>.</i>
<b>feasible</b>	Likely; probable. <i>The most <b>feasible</b> explanation.</i>
<b>imaginable</b>	Capable of being imagined. <i>The most spectacular views <b>imaginable</b>.</i>
<b>likely</b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>She is <b>likely</b> to forget.</i>
<b><u>manageable</u></b>	Capable of being managed or controlled. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and <b>manageable</b>.</i>
<b>odds-on</b>	Having a better than even chance of success.
<b>plausible</b>	Apparently reasonable and credible, and therefore convincing. <i>A <b>plausible</b> liar.</i>
<b>potential</b>	Having or showing the capacity to develop into something in the future. <i>A <b>potential</b> problem.</i>
<b>practicable</b>	Capable of being done with means at hand and circumstances as they are. <i>A <b>practicable</b> solution.</i>
<b><u>probable</u></b>	Likely to happen or be the case. <i>It is <b>probable</b> that the economic situation will deteriorate further.</i>
<b>prospective</b>	Likely to happen at a future date. <i>A <b>prospective</b> mother.</i>
<b>realizable</b>	Capable of existing or taking place or proving true; possible to do. <i>The need to define <b>realizable</b> targets.</i>
<b>tenable</b>	Based on sound reasoning or evidence. <i>A scholarship of 200 per annum <b>tenable</b> for three years.</i>
<b>thinkable</b>	Capable of being conceived or imagined or considered. <i>Something that was barely <b>thinkable</b> just 70 years ago.</i>
<b>viable</b>	(of a plant, animal, or cell) capable of surviving or living successfully, especially under particular environmental conditions. <i>The proposed investment was economically <b>viable</b>.</i>

**workable**

Able to be worked, fashioned, or manipulated.  
A **workable** peace settlement.

**would-be**

Unfulfilled or frustrated in realizing an ambition.

<b>feasible</b>	Possible to do easily or conveniently. <i>The most <b>feasible</b> explanation.</i>
<b>feasibly</b>	In a way that possible or practical to do or achieve. <i>I've learned a huge amount about what I could <b>feasibly</b> achieve in my next race.</i>
<b>likelihood</b>	The state or fact of something's being likely; probability. <i>Situations where there is a <b>likelihood</b> of violence.</i>
<b>likely</b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>Rain is <b>likely</b>.</i>
<b>logically</b>	According to logical reasoning. <i>These suggestions are <b>logically</b> impossible.</i>
<b>plausible</b>	(of a person) skilled at producing persuasive arguments, especially ones intended to deceive. <i>It seems <b>plausible</b> that one of two things may happen.</i>
<b>possibility</b>	Unspecified qualities of a promising nature; potential. <i>Bankruptcy is always a <b>possibility</b>.</i>



<b>potential</b>	The quantity determining the energy of mass in a gravitational field or of charge in an electric field. <i>A young broadcaster with great <b>potential</b>.</i>
<b>potentiality</b>	The possibility of something happening or of someone doing something in the future. <i>There is concern over the <b>potentiality</b> of violence.</i>
<b>potentially</b>	With a possibility of becoming actual. <i>Newly available oil might <b>potentially</b> create a drop in prices.</i>
<b>practicable</b>	Usable for a specific purpose. <i>The measures will be put into effect as soon as is reasonably <b>practicable</b>.</i>
<b>presumable</b>	Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.
<b><u>probable</u></b>	Likely to happen or be the case. <i>Merson and Wright are <b>probables</b>.</i>
<b>real</b>	Coinciding with reality F A Olafson. <i>Meat and potatoes I call that a <b>real</b> meal.</i>
