### Definitions of "Possibly" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “possibly” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Used in polite requests.*
- *In accordance with what is likely or achievable.*
- *Perhaps (used to indicate doubt or hesitancy).*
- *To a degree possible of achievement or by possible means.*
- *By chance.*
- *Used to emphasize that one feels that something is surprising, or bewildering.*
- *Used to emphasize that someone has or will put all their effort into something.*



## Synonyms of "Possibly" as an adverb (14 Words)

**by any means**

In reserve; not for immediate use.

**conceivably**

It is conceivable or imaginable that.

*It may **conceivably** cause liver disease.*

**feasibly**

In a way that possible or practical to do or achieve.

*We take customer feedback very seriously and strive to make additional improvements that can be met **feasibly**.*

**for all one knows**

To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent ('whole' is often used informally for 'wholly').

**in any way**

To or toward the inside of.

**kindly**

In a kind manner or out of kindness.

*Never mind she said **kindly**.*


<a href="#">maybe</a>	Perhaps; possibly. <i><b>Maybe</b> I won't go back.</i>
mayhap	By chance.
peradventure	Perhaps. <i><b>Peradventure</b> I'm not as wealthy as he is.</i>
perchance	By some chance; perhaps. <i>We dare not go ashore lest <b>perchance</b> we should fall into some snare.</i>
perhaps	Used to express uncertainty or possibility. <i><b>Perhaps</b> she will call tomorrow.</i>
<a href="#">please</a>	Used to ask someone to stop doing something of which the speaker disapproves. <i>Would you like a drink Yes <b>please</b>.</i>
under any circumstances	Below some quantity or limit.
very likely	Used as intensifiers; 'real' is sometimes used informally for 'really'; 'rattling' is informal.



## Usage Examples of "Possibly" as an adverb

- *Could you possibly pour me another cup of tea?*

- *We may possibly run into them at the concert.*
- *What can you possibly mean?*
- *Be as noisy as you possibly can.*
- *He found himself alone, possibly the only survivor.*



## Associations of "Possibly" (30 Words)

### [able](#)

Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence.  
An **able** seaman.

### [anyway](#)

Used to indicate that a statement explains or supports a previous statement.  
*I don't know what happened to it **anyway** it's gone.*

### [appreciably](#)

To a noticeable degree.  
*Profits have grown **appreciably** over the last four years.*

### [chance](#)

Occurring or appearing or singled out by chance.  
*He met his brother by **chance**.*

<b><u>equally</u></b>	To the same degree (often followed by `as. <i>Not all who live in inner cities are poor <b>equally</b> many poor people live outside inner cities.</i>
<b><u>fairly</u></b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>They played <b>fairly</b>.</i>
<b><u>frequently</u></b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>They go abroad <b>frequently</b>.</i>
<b>importantly</b>	In a manner designed to draw attention to one's importance. <i>A non drinking non smoking and <b>importantly</b> non political sportsman.</i>
<b>impracticable</b>	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>It was <b>impracticable</b> to widen the road here.</i>
<b>instead</b>	On the contrary. <i>Do not use lotions but put on a clean dressing <b>instead</b>.</i>
<b>likely</b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>Sales are <b>likely</b> to drop further.</i>
<b><u>maybe</u></b>	A mere possibility or probability. <i>He was standing <b>maybe</b> 20 or 30 feet away.</i>
<b><u>moderately</u></b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>Both hotels are <b>moderately</b> priced.</i>
<b>much</b>	(degree adverb used before a noun phrase) for all practical purposes but not completely. <i>Not <b>much</b> rain.</i>
<b>noticeably</b>	In a noticeable manner. <i>He changed <b>noticeably</b> over the years.</i>
<b>often</b>	Frequently or in great quantities. <i>Vocabulary <b>often</b> reflects social standing.</i>
<b>oftentimes</b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>Sensory processing is <b>oftentimes</b> a challenge for someone with ASD.</i>
<b>percent</b>	A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred.
<b>perceptibly</b>	In a noticeable manner.
<b>perhaps</b>	Used to express uncertainty or possibility. <i>Would you <b>perhaps</b> consent to act as our guide.</i>
<b>potential</b>	Existing in possibility. <i>A young broadcaster with great <b>potential</b>.</i>
<b>preferably</b>	More readily or willingly. <i>He would like a place of his own <b>preferably</b> outside the town.</i>

<u>pretty</u>	Make pretty or attractive. <i><b>Pretty</b> room.</i>
<u>probably</u>	With considerable certainty; without much doubt. <i>He will <b>probably</b> win the election.</i>
<u>quite</u>	To a degree (not used with a negative). <i>He s <b>quite</b> an attractive man.</i>
<u>rather</u>	Used to express a recommended alternative, but without a than clause and used with verbs other than would; instead. <i>I walked or <b>rather</b> limped the two miles home.</i>
<u>reasonably</u>	To certain extent or degree. <i>A constable who <b>reasonably</b> believes a breach of the peace is about to take place.</i>
<u>significantly</u>	In a statistically significant way. <i>Their situation is <b>significantly</b> different from ours.</i>
<u>somewhat</u>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>His arguments were <b>somewhat</b> self contradictory.</i>
<u>whatever</u>	One or some or every or all without specification. <i>We told him we d back him <b>whatever</b>.</i>
