remit Consign again to a previous state.

reschedule Change the time of (a planned event.

The concert has been **reschedule**d for September.

**set back** Disappear beyond the horizon.

**shelve** Fit with shelves.

One whole long wall was **shelve**d.

**stand over** Withstand the force of something.

Stay the same remain in a certain state.

**stay** There are some cases the Crown feels so serious they don t want to
