<b>bearing</b>	Characteristic way of bearing one's body. <i>Armorial <b>bearings</b>.</i>
<b>carriage</b>	A small vehicle with four wheels in which a baby or child is pushed around. <i>A typewriter <b>carriage</b>.</i>
<b>comportment</b>	Dignified manner or conduct. <i>He displayed precisely the <b>comportment</b> expected of the rightful king.</i>
<b>countenance</b>	The appearance conveyed by a person's face. <i>A pleasant <b>countenance</b>.</i>
<b>demeanour</b>	The way a person behaves toward other people. <i>His happy <b>demeanour</b>.</i>
<b>expression</b>	Expression without words. <i>His manner of <b>expression</b> showed how much he cared.</i>
<b>exterior</b>	The outer side or surface of something. <i>An ideal spot to film <b>exteriors</b>.</i>
<b>face</b>	A vertical surface of a building or cliff. <i>We can often see the dark <b>face</b> of the moon by earthshine.</i>
<b>false display</b>	A visual representation of something.
<b>frame of mind</b>	One of nine divisions of play during which each team has a turn at bat.
<b>look</b>	An expression of a feeling or thought by looking. <i>A <b>look</b> of triumph.</i>
<b>manner</b>	A style in literature or art. <i>Taking notes in an unobtrusive <b>manner</b>.</i>
<b>mien</b>	A person's appearance or manner, especially as an indication of their character or mood. <i>He has a cautious academic <b>mien</b>.</i>
<b>military capability</b>	The military forces of a nation.
<b>military posture</b>	The military forces of a nation.

<b>military strength</b>	The military forces of a nation.
<b>opinion</b>	An estimation of the quality or worth of someone or something. <i>The area's residents share vociferous <b>opinions</b> about the future.</i>
<b>outlook</b>	A habitual or characteristic mental attitude that determines how you will interpret and respond to situations. <i>The pleasant <b>outlook</b> from the club window.</i>
<b>perspective</b>	A particular attitude towards or way of regarding something; a point of view. <i>A <b>perspective</b> drawing.</i>
<b>point of view</b>	Any of 32 horizontal directions indicated on the card of a compass.
<b>pose</b>	A posture assumed by models for photographic or artistic purposes. <i>Photographs of boxers in ferocious <b>poses</b>.</i>
<b>position</b>	A condition or position in which you find yourself. <i>The company's financial <b>position</b> is grim.</i>
<b>pretence</b>	The act of giving a false appearance. <i>They have always avoided preciousness and <b>pretence</b>.</i>
<b>show</b>	An outward appearance or display of a quality or feeling. <i>Now don't make a <b>show</b> of yourself in front of him.</i>
<b>slant</b>	A biased way of looking at or presenting something. <i>A new <b>slant</b> on science.</i>
<b>stance</b>	A ledge or foothold on which a belay can be secured. <i>The party is changing its <b>stance</b> on Europe.</i>
<b>stand</b>	The place where someone typically stands or sits. <i>The <b>stand</b> of pheasants has been better this year than for many years.</i>
<b>standpoint</b>	An attitude to a particular issue. <i>She writes on religion from the <b>standpoint</b> of a believer.</i>
<b>strength</b>	The number of people comprising a group, typically a team or army. <i>The peacetime <b>strength</b> of the army was 415 000.</i>
<b>veneer</b>	An ornamental coating to a building. <i>A fine grained <b>veneer</b>.</i>
<b>view</b>	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>An aerial <b>view</b> of the military earthworks.</i>
<b>viewpoint</b>	A person's opinion or point of view. <i>From a purely aesthetic <b>viewpoint</b> I must say that I dislike the design.</i>
<b>way of sitting</b>	Space for movement.
<b>way of standing</b>	Doing as one pleases or chooses.

- attitudinize** Adopt or express a particular attitude or attitudes, typically just for effect.  
*Her column is an exercise in smug attitudinizing.*
- behave affectedly** Behave well or properly.
- model** Construct a model of.  
*The research method will be **modelled** on previous work.*
- pose** Assume a posture as for artistic purposes.  
*An armed gang **posed** as policemen to ambush a postman.*
- put on airs** Cause (someone) to undergo something.
- sit** Adopt or be in a position in which one's weight is supported by one's buttocks rather than one's feet and one's back is upright.  
*I cannot baby **sit** tonight I have too much homework to do.*
- strike an attitude** Deliver a sharp blow, as with the hand, fist, or weapon.

Brace something with a strut or struts.  
*Peacocks **strut** through the grounds.*

- armchair** Lacking or not involving practical or direct experience of a particular subject or activity.

<b>couch</b>	Lower (a spear) to the position for attack. <i>I sat in an armchair and they sat on the <b>couch</b>.</i>
<b>cringe</b>	Bend one's head and body in fear or apprehension or in a servile manner. <i>I <b>cringed</b> at the fellow's stupidity.</i>
<b>crouch</b>	A crouching stance or posture. <i>We <b>crouched</b> down in the trench.</i>
<b>gait</b>	The rate of moving (especially walking or running). <i>The easy <b>gait</b> of an athlete.</i>
<b>genuflect</b>	Lower one's body briefly by bending one knee to the ground, typically in worship or as a sign of respect. <i>Politicians had to <b>genuflect</b> to the far left to advance their careers.</i>
<b>kneel</b>	Be in or assume a position in which the body is supported by a knee or the knees, as when praying or showing submission. <i>In church you have to <b>kneel</b> during parts of the service.</i>
<b>lay</b>	The laying of eggs or the period during which they are laid. <i>I'm going to <b>lay</b> a course for Ibiza harbour.</i>
<b>lean</b>	Cause to lean to the side. <i>The vehicle has a definite <b>lean</b> to the left.</i>
<b>pause</b>	Interrupt action or speech briefly. <i>She had <b>paused</b> a tape on the VCR.</i>
<b>perch</b>	Cause to perch or sit. <i>A herring gull <b>perched</b> on the rails.</i>
<b>preside</b>	Act as president. <i><b>Preside</b> over companies and corporations.</i>
<b>recline</b>	Cause to recline. <i>All the seats <b>recline</b>.</i>
<b>recumbent</b>	(of a plant) growing close to the ground. <i><b>Recumbent</b> statues.</i>
<b>repose</b>	Put in a horizontal position. <i>Many of the qualities of the great Piero della Francesca's sense of grand stasis of timeless <b>repose</b> seem strongly reincarnated in this work.</i>
<b>sit</b>	Cause someone to sit. <i>He was about to <b>sit</b> for his Cambridge entrance exam.</i>
<b>sitting</b>	In a seated position. <i>A special <b>sitting</b> of Basildon magistrates.</i>
<b>slouch</b>	Assume a drooping posture or carriage. <i>He was <b>slouched</b> in his chair.</i>

<b>squat</b>	A squatting position. A <b>squatty</b> red smokestack.
<b>stance</b>	The way in which someone stands, especially when deliberately adopted (as in cricket, golf, and other sports); a person's posture. <i>She altered her <b>stance</b> resting all her weight on one leg.</i>
<b>stationary</b>	Standing still. <b>Stationary</b> machinery.
<b>stoop</b>	Carry oneself, often habitually, with head, shoulders, and upper back bent forward. <i>He <b>stooped</b> down and reached towards the coin.</i>
<b>succumb</b>	Die from the effect of a disease or injury. <i>After a few blows there the porcupine <b>succumbs</b>.</i>
<b>supine</b>	A Latin verbal noun used only in the accusative and ablative cases, especially to denote purpose (e.g. mirabile dictu 'wonderful to relate'). <i>No other colony showed such <b>supine</b> selfish helplessness in allowing her own border citizens to be mercilessly harried.</i>
<b>tempter</b>	The Devil. <i>Satan is the great <b>tempter</b> of mankind.</i>
<b>unmoving</b>	Not arousing emotions. <i>Claudia sat <b>unmoving</b> behind her desk.</i>
<b>upright</b>	An upright piano. <i>An <b>upright</b> freezer.</i>
<b>wince</b>	A reflex response to sudden pain. <i>He <b>winc</b>ed at the disgust in her voice.</i>
<b>yoga</b>	A system of physical, breathing and meditation exercises practiced to promote control of the body and mind. <b>Yoga</b> classes.
