### Definitions of "Potion" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “potion” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A liquid with healing, magical, or poisonous properties.*
- *A medicinal or magical or poisonous beverage.*



## Synonyms of "Potion" as a noun (7 Words)

- brew** Drink made by steeping and boiling and fermenting rather than distilling.  
*A dangerous **brew** of political turmoil and violent conflict.*
- concoction** The invention of a scheme or story to suit some purpose.  
*She has no peer in the **concoction** of mystery stories.*
- decoction** A concentrated liquor resulting from heating or boiling a substance, especially a medicinal preparation made from a plant.  
***Decoction** is used for woody plant material such as roots and bark.*
- drink** A social gathering at which alcoholic drinks are served.  
*The effects of too much **drink**.*
- elixir** A preparation supposedly able to prolong life indefinitely.  
*At one point during the festivities the river is said to turn into the **elixir** of life.*
- mixture** An event that combines things in a mixture.  
*He drank a **mixture** of beer and lemonade.*
- philtre** A drink supposed to arouse love and desire for a particular person in the drinker; a love potion.  
*His **philtres** and potions.*

| <b>remedy</b>              | Set right (an undesirable situation).<br><i>Shopping became a <b>remedy</b> for personal problems.</i>   |
