hardheaded	Unreasonably rigid in the face of argument or entreaty or attack. <i>A hardheaded appraisal of our position.</i>
helpful	Useful. <i>Helpful staff.</i>
in effect	Directed or bound inward.
in the field	Currently fashionable.
nimble-fingered	Having nimble fingers literally or figuratively; especially for stealing or picking pockets- Harry Hansen.
no-nonsense	Not tolerating irrelevancies.
ordinary	Not interesting or exceptional; commonplace. <i>Ordinary decency.</i>

<u>applied</u>	Concerned with concrete problems or data rather than with fundamental principles. <i>Technical problems in medicine engineering economics and other applied disciplines.</i>

functional	Relating to the way in which something works or operates. <i>The museum will be fully functional from the opening of the festival.</i>
illiteracy	An inability to read. <i>The ineffective educational system meant that illiteracy was widespread.</i>
knowable	Capable of being known. <i>The full extent of the damage isn't knowable in advance.</i>

<u>likelihood</u>	The state or fact of something's being likely; probability. <i>Situations where there is a likelihood of violence.</i>
positivistic	Of or relating to positivism.
