### Definitions of "Practically" as an adverb

- *(degree adverb used before a noun phrase) for all practical purposes but not completely.*
- *Almost; nearly.*
- *Virtually; almost.*
- *In a practical manner.*

### Synonyms of "Practically" as an adverb (21 Words)

**all but**

To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).

<b>almost</b>	(of actions or states) slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>We re <b>almost</b> finished.</i>
<b>as good as</b>	To the same degree (often followed by `as). Used to indicate that a statement summarizes the most important aspects, or gives a roughly accurate account, of a more complex situation.
<b>basically</b>	<i>He is <b>basically</b> dishonest.</i>
<b>close to</b>	In an attentive manner. Used to emphasize the basic, fundamental, or intrinsic nature of a person or thing.
<b>essentially</b>	<i>The argument was <b>essentially</b> a technical one.</i>
<b>in effect</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>just about</b>	And nothing more.
<b>more or less</b>	Comparative of much; to a greater degree or extent.
<b>much</b>	To a great extent; a great deal. <i>She was very <b>much</b> interested.</i>
<b>nearly</b>	Very close to; almost. <i>The person most <b>nearly</b> concerned.</i>
<b>next to</b>	At the time or occasion immediately following.
<b>not far from</b>	To a considerable degree; very much.
<b>pragmatically</b>	In terms of philosophical or political pragmatism. <i>They acted <b>pragmatically</b> in response to circumstances.</i>
<b>rationally</b>	In a sensible or logical manner. <i>He was detached from the conflict and in a position to act <b>rationally</b>.</i>
<b>realistically</b>	In a way that is accurate and true to life. <i>How well can each candidate <b>realistically</b> expect to do.</i>
<b>reasonably</b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>It was assumed <b>reasonably</b> enough that the murder had taken place by the pond.</i>
<b>sensibly</b>	With good sense or in a reasonable or intelligent manner. <i>A <b>sensibly</b> dressed respectable looking woman.</i>
<b>to all intents and purposes</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (`whole' is often used informally for `wholly).
<b>very nearly</b>	Precisely so.

**virtually**                      Nearly; almost.  
*The disease destroyed **virtually** all the vineyards in Orange County.*

- *Practically everything in Hinduism is the manifestation of a god.*
- *The strike lasted practically a fortnight.*
- *The law isn't unreasonable or practically inconvenient.*
- *'He might win,' pointed out Emmeline practically.*

**about**                      In rotation or succession.  
*Dirty clothes lying around or **about**.*

**almost**                      Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but.  
*The baby was **almost** asleep when the alarm sounded.*

**approximate**                      Estimate or calculate (a quantity) fairly accurately.  
*Reality can be **approximated** by computational techniques.*

**approximately**                      Used to show that something is almost, but not completely, accurate or exact; roughly.  
*Lasted **approximately** an hour.*

**around**                      All around or on all sides.  
*There was no one **around**.*

**broadly**                      Without regard to specific details or exceptions.  
*The climate is **broadly** similar in the two regions.*

**candidly**                      (used as intensives reflecting the speaker's attitude) it is sincerely the case that.  
*He **candidly** discussed his efforts to find employment.*

**conceivable**                      Capable of being imagined or grasped mentally.  
*In every **conceivable** way that action was entirely wrong.*

**equidistant**                      At equal distances.  
*The line joins together all points which are **equidistant** from the two axes.*

**every**                      Each and all of the members of a group considered singly and without exception.  
***Every** two hours.*

<b>fractional</b>	Constituting or comprising a part or fraction of a possible whole or entirety. <i>The <b>fractional</b> variance in mass density per unit.</i>
<b>genuinely</b>	Genuinely with authority. <i>A <b>genuinely</b> open society.</i>
<b>honestly</b>	It is sincerely the case that used as intensives reflecting the speaker's attitude honestly adv in an honest manner. <i>In he can't get it <b>honestly</b> he is willing to steal it.</i>
<b>impossible</b>	(of a person) very unreasonable. <i><b>Impossible</b> behavior.</i>
<b>inconceivable</b>	Totally unlikely. <i>It seemed <b>inconceivable</b> that the president had been unaware of what was going on.</i>
<b>levity</b>	Feeling an inappropriate lack of seriousness. <i>As an attempt to introduce a note of <b>levity</b> the words were a disastrous flop.</i>
<b>more</b>	Moreover. <i><b>More</b> than one.</i>
<b>most</b>	Almost. <i>Made the <b>most</b> money he could.</i>
<b>near</b>	At or to a short distance away nearby. <i>The <b>near</b> or nigh horse is the one on the left.</i>
<b>nearly</b>	Closely. <i>The person most <b>nearly</b> concerned.</i>
<b>proximate</b>	Nearly accurate approximate. <i>Interest in <b>proximate</b> rather than ultimate goals.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>A <b>really</b> enjoyable evening.</i>
<b>roughly</b>	With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly. <i>The man picked me up <b>roughly</b>.</i>
<b>some</b>	To some extent quite a lot. <i><b>Some</b> paper.</i>
<b>surprising</b>	Causing surprise or wonder or amazement. <i>She earned a <b>surprising</b> amount of money.</i>

<b>thereabout</b>	Near that place. <i>He stayed in London or <b>thereabouts</b> for several weeks.</i>
<b>unimaginable</b>	Totally unlikely. <i>Lives of almost <b>unimaginable</b> deprivation.</i>
<u><b>unthinkable</b></u>	Incapable of being conceived or considered. <i>It was <b>unthinkable</b> that John could be dead.</i>
<u><b>virtually</b></u>	By means of virtual reality techniques. <i>The college became <b>virtually</b> bankrupt.</i>
