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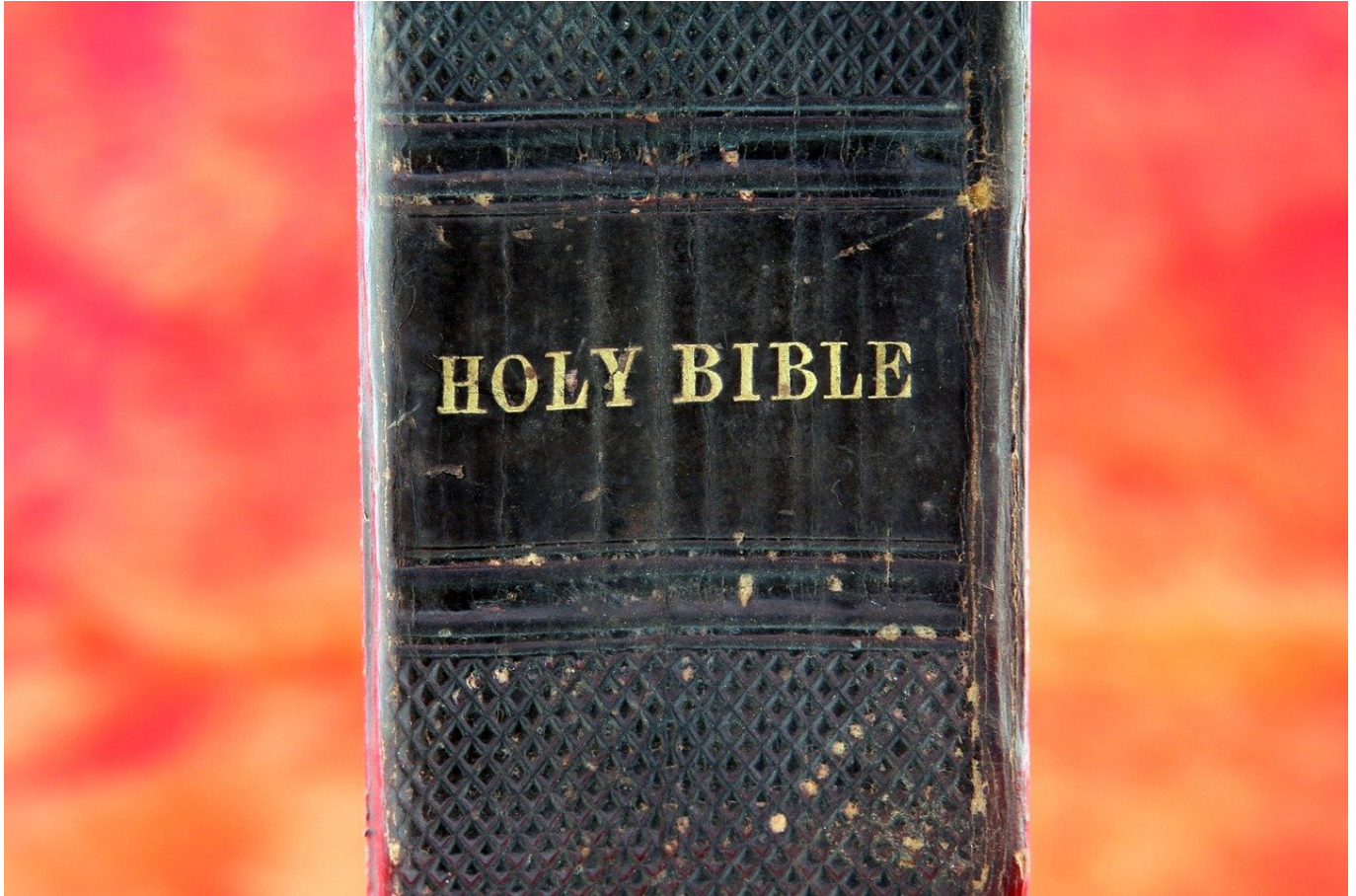

## Preaching as a Noun

### Definitions of "Preaching" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “preaching” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The giving of moral advice in a pompously self-righteous way.*
- *An address of a religious nature (usually delivered during a church service).*
- *A moralistic rebuke.*
- *The delivery of a sermon or religious address to an assembled group of people, typically in church.*



## Synonyms of "Preaching" as a noun (5 Words)

<b><u>discourse</u></b>	An address of a religious nature (usually delivered during a church service). <i>The language of political <b>discourse</b>.</i>
<b>instruction</b>	Directions to a solicitor or counsel, or to a jury. <i>He issued <b>instructions</b> to the sheriff.</i>
<b>message</b>	A television or radio advertisement. <i>If I m not there leave a <b>message</b> on the answerphone.</i>
<b>religious teaching</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
<b><u>sermon</u></b>	A long or tedious piece of admonition or reproof; a lecture. <i>He understood that if he said any more he would have to listen to another lengthy <b>sermon</b>.</i>

<b>altar</b>	The table in Christian churches where communion is given.
<b>apostle</b>	Each of the twelve chief disciples of Jesus Christ. <i>A man once known as the <b>apostle</b> of free market economics.</i>
<b>baptismal</b>	Relating to the Christian rite of baptism. <i><b>Baptismal</b> rites.</i>
<b>catholic</b>	Including a wide variety of things; all-embracing. <i><b>Catholic</b> in one's tastes.</i>
<b>christian</b>	Following the teachings or manifesting the qualities or spirit of Jesus Christ.
<b>confessional</b>	A booth where a priest sits to hear confessions. <i>The priest leaned forward in his best <b>confessional</b> manner.</i>
<b>dais</b>	A low platform for a lectern or throne.
<b>doctrine</b>	A belief (or system of beliefs) accepted as authoritative by some group or school. <i>The <b>doctrine</b> of predestination.</i>
<b>epistle</b>	A specially long, formal letter. <i>Activists firing off angry <b>epistles</b>.</i>
<b>evangelist</b>	A preacher of the Christian gospel. <i>He has become an <b>evangelist</b> for the European Union.</i>
<b>exposition</b>	A collection of things (goods or works of art etc.) for public display. <i>A systematic <b>exposition</b> of the idea of biodiversity.</i>
<b>foretell</b>	Foreshadow or presage. <i>A seer had foretold that the earl would assume the throne.</i>
<b>homiletics</b>	The branch of theology that deals with sermons and homilies.
<b>homily</b>	A sermon on a moral or religious topic. <i>She delivered her <b>homily</b> about the need for patience.</i>
<b>lectern</b>	Desk or stand with a slanted top used to hold a text at the proper height for a lecturer.
<b>martyr</b>	Torture and torment like a martyr. <i>The first Christian <b>martyr</b>.</i>
<b>missionary</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a missionary or a religious mission. <i><b>Missionary</b> work.</i>
<b>oratory</b>	Addressing an audience formally (usually a long and rhetorical address and often pompous). <i>He loved the sound of his own <b>oratory</b>.</i>

<b>ordination</b>	The action of ordaining someone in holy orders. <i>The <b>ordination</b> of women.</i>
<b>podium</b>	Of a competitor in a sporting event finish first second or third so as to appear on a podium to receive an award. <i>I took the score out of my briefcase and put it on the <b>podium</b>.</i>
<b>priesthood</b>	The body of ordained religious practitioners. <i>The ordination of women to the <b>priesthood</b>.</i>
<b>prophecy</b>	Deliver a sermon. <i>Jacques was <b>prophesying</b> a bumper harvest.</i>
<b>prophet</b>	In Christian use the books of Isaiah Jeremiah Ezekiel Daniel and the twelve minor prophets. <i>The prime minister ignored the <b>prophets</b> of doom.</i>
<b>pulpit</b>	A raised platform in the bows of a fishing boat or whaler. <i>The movies could rival the <b>pulpit</b> as an agency moulding the ideas of the mass public.</i>
<b>recitation</b>	The repetition of a list of facts. <i>The history of an organization is more important than the <b>recitation</b> of details like this.</i>
<b>rostrum</b>	A platform raised above the surrounding level to give prominence to the person on it. <i>The winner s <b>rostrum</b>.</i>
<b>seer</b>	An expert who provides forecasts of the economic or political future. <i>Our <b>seers</b> have grown gloomier about prospects for growth.</i>
<b>seminary</b>	A college that trains students to be priests, rabbis, or ministers.
<b>sermon</b>	A long or tedious piece of admonition or reproof; a lecture. <i>He understood that if he said any more he would have to listen to another lengthy <b>sermon</b>.</i>
<b>stump</b>	Use a stump on a drawing line etc. <i>He <b>stumped</b> away on short thick legs.</i>
