
Precarious as an Adjective

Definitions of "Precarious" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "precarious" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Fraught with danger.
- Not secure; beset with difficulties.
- Affording no ease or reassurance.
- Not securely held or in position; dangerously likely to fall or collapse.
- Dependent on chance; uncertain.





Synonyms of "Precarious" as an adjective (24 Words)

dangerous	Causing fear or anxiety by threatening great harm. A dangerous animal.
<u>deceptive</u>	Designed to deceive or mislead either deliberately or inadvertently. <i>He put the question with deceptive casualness.</i>
delicate	Of an instrument or device; capable of registering minute differences or changes precisely. A delicate sweet flavour.
doubtful	Not known with certainty. I was doubtful of my judgement.



<u>dubious</u>	Morally suspect. What one found uncertain the other found dubious or downright false.
<u>hazardous</u>	Risky; dangerous. It is hazardous to personal safety.
<u>insecure</u>	Not firm or fixed; liable to give way or break. A top model who is notoriously insecure about her looks.
on a slippery slope	Not to be trusted- James Agee.
on thin ice	Lacking resonance or volume.
parlous	Fraught with danger. A parlous journey on stormy seas.
<u>perilous</u>	Exposed to imminent risk of disaster or ruin. A perilous voyage across the Atlantic in a small boat.
problematic	Constituting or presenting a problem. <i>The situation was problematic for teachers.</i>
<u>risky</u>	Full of the possibility of danger, failure, or loss. It was much too risky to try to disarm him.
<u>shaky</u>	Not secure; beset with difficulties. Thoroughly shaky evidence.
touch-and-go	Functioning correctly and ready for action.
treacherous	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>Memory is particularly treacherous.</i>
<u>tricky</u>	Not to be trusted- James Agee. A tricky recipe to follow.
<u>uncertain</u>	Not established beyond doubt; still undecided or unknown. Moving with uncertain or unsure steps.
undependable	Liable to be erroneous or misleading. An undependable generalization.
<u>unpredictable</u>	Not occurring at expected times. The unpredictable weather of the Scottish islands.
unreliable	Dangerously unstable and unpredictable. <i>He s lazy and unreliable</i> .
unsafe	Not safe from attack. Because the confession was unreliable the verdict was unsafe and unsatisfactory.



unstable Prone to psychiatric problems or sudden changes of mood. An **unstable** government.

<u>unsure</u>

Lacking or indicating lack of confidence or assurance. *A very unsure young man.*

anxiety	Strong desire or concern to do something or for something to happen. <i>The housekeeper s eager anxiety to please.</i>
chill	Chilly. He was confined to bed with a severe chill .
danger	A dangerous place. <i>He moved out of danger.</i>
dangerous	Involving or causing danger or risk; liable to hurt or harm. A dangerous criminal.
dicey	Unpredictable and potentially dangerous. An extremely dicey future on a brave new world of liquid nitrogen tar and smog.
<u>hazardous</u>	Involving risk or danger. Skydiving is a hazardous sport.



<u>insecure</u>	Not firm or firmly fixed; likely to fail or give way. Badly paid and insecure jobs.
<u>insecurity</u>	The state of being open to danger or threat; lack of protection. <i>Growing job insecurity</i> .
<u>insidious</u>	Working or spreading in a hidden and usually injurious way. Sexual harassment is a serious and insidious problem.
parlous	Full of danger or uncertainty; precarious. A parlous journey on stormy seas.
<u>perilous</u>	Exposed to imminent risk of disaster or ruin. The economy is in a perilous state.
rickety	Lacking bodily or muscular strength or vitality. A rickety table.
risk	Take a risk in the hope of a favorable outcome. All risk s insurance for professional photographers.
<u>risky</u>	Not financially safe or secure. Anything that promises to pay too much can t help being risky .
<u>shaky</u>	Inclined to shake as from weakness or defect. She managed a shaky laugh.
shivering	The action of shaking slightly and uncontrollably as a result of being cold, frightened, or excited. <i>Sparkling light from the shivering crystals of the chandelier.</i>
straddle	Stand, walk, or sit with one's legs wide apart. A sideways on stance such as a straddle .
threatened	Likely in the near future to become endangered. The spotted owl is a threatened species not yet an endangered one.
<u>uncertain</u>	(of a person) not completely confident or sure of something. <i>I was uncertain how to proceed.</i>
<u>uncertainty</u>	The state of being uncertain. <i>Times of uncertainty and danger.</i>
<u>uneasy</u>	(of a situation or relationship) not settled; liable to change. She lived in a state of uneasy truce with her strict father.
<u>unrest</u>	A feeling of disturbance and dissatisfaction in a person. <i>Years of industrial unrest</i> .
unsafe	Involving or causing danger or risk; liable to hurt or harm. Drinking water in some areas may be unsafe .
unsettled	Worried and uneasy. A spell of unsettled weather.



<u>unsound</u>	Physically unsound or diseased. This line of argument is unsound .
<u>unstable</u>	Likely to change or fail; not firmly established. Sensitive and highly unstable compounds.
<u>unsteady</u>	Not firmly or solidly positioned. <i>Her unsteady walk.</i>
<u>volatile</u>	A volatile substance. A passionate volatile young man.
volatility	Liability to display rapid changes of emotion. A week of historic stock market volatility .
<u>vulnerable</u>	(of a partnership) liable to higher penalties, either by convention or through having won one game towards a rubber. <i>We were in a vulnerable position.</i>
