Definitions of "Preclude" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "preclude" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- (of a situation or condition) prevent someone from doing something.
- Keep from happening or arising; make impossible.
- Prevent from happening; make impossible.
- Make impossible, especially beforehand.





Synonyms of "Preclude" as a verb (20 Words)

<u>bar</u>	Mark something with bars or stripes. Journalists had been bar red from covering the elections.
block	Shape into a block or blocks. Block a garment.
close out	Bring together all the elements or parts of.
debar	Bar temporarily; from school, office, etc. They were debar red entry to the port.
disqualify	(of a feature or characteristic) make (someone) unsuitable for an office or activity. <i>A heart murmur disqualified him for military service.</i>
exclude	Lack or fail to include. This policy exclude s people who have a criminal record from entering the country.



<u>forbid</u>	Refuse entry to a place or area. I can see why phones were forbid den.
foreclose	Take possession of a mortgaged property when the mortgagor fails to keep up their mortgage payments. <i>The bank was threatening to foreclose on his mortgage</i> .
forestall	Prevent or obstruct (an anticipated event or action) by taking advance action. They will present their resignations to forestall a vote of no confidence.
hinder	Hinder or prevent the progress or accomplishment of. The brace I have to wear is hinder ing my movements.
impede	Be a hindrance or obstacle to. The sap causes swelling which can impede breathing.
inhibit	Limit the range or extent of. Cold inhibit s plant growth.
interdict	Destroy by firepower, such as an enemy's line of communication. I have not been interdict ed from consuming alcoholic beverages.
make it impossible for	Add up to.
make it impracticable for	Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.
prevent	Stop (someone or something) from doing something or being in a certain state. The guards threatened to bar the gates to prevent him leaving.
<u>prohibit</u>	Formally forbid (something) by law, rule, or other authority. <i>He is prohibited from becoming a director</i> .
put a stop to	Attribute or give.
rule out	Mark or draw with a ruler.
stop	Stop and wait as if awaiting further instructions or developments. <i>This harassment has got to be</i> stop <i>ped.</i>

Usage Examples of "Preclude" as a verb

- *His difficulties preclude him from leading a normal life.*
- Your role in the projects precludes your involvement in the competitive project.
- The secret nature of his work precluded official recognition.

<u>bar</u>	Secure with or as if with bars. <i>His face was barred with light.</i>
blockade	Impose a blockade on. They voted to lift the blockade of major railway junctions.
circumvention	The act of evading by going around. <i>Circumvention</i> of the rules undermines any fairness.
contraband	Goods forbidden to be supplied by neutrals to those engaged in war. The salt trade and contraband in it were very active in the town.
<u>deter</u>	Prevent the occurrence of. Strategists think not only about how to deter war but about how war might occur.
embarrass	Cause to be embarrassed cause to feel self conscious. She wouldn t embarrass either of them by making a scene.
firewall	Protect a network or system from unauthorized access with a firewall. <i>A firewalled network.</i>
<u>forbid</u>	Command against. I forbid you to call me late at night.
foreclose	Take possession of a mortgaged property when the mortgagor fails to keep up their mortgage payments. <i>The decision effectively</i> foreclose <i>d any possibility of his early</i> <i>rehabilitation.</i>
forestall	Keep from happening or arising; make impossible. They will present their resignations to forestall a vote of no confidence.
forfend	Protect (something) by precautionary measures. The sacrifice of Mississippi was forfend ed against even the treason of Wilkinson.



hamper	Prevent the progress or free movement of. A Christmas food hamper .
hinder	Hinder or prevent the progress or accomplishment of. Language barriers hinder ed communication between scientists.
illegalize	Declare illegal; outlaw.
impede	Block passage through. The sap causes swelling which can impede breathing.
inhibit	Prohibit, forbid, or prevent from doing something. Cold inhibit s plant growth.
lightproof	Not penetrable by light. A lightproof envelope.
obstruct	Deliberately make (something) difficult. An indirect free kick is awarded for intentionally obstruct ing an opponent.
occlude	(of a solid) absorb and retain (a gas or impurity. Thick make up can occlude the pores.
prevent	Keep from happening or arising; make impossible. The guards threatened to bar the gates to prevent him leaving.
regulate	Fix or adjust the time, amount, degree, or rate of. A hormone which regulate s metabolism.
stonewall	An act of delaying or obstructing a person, request, or process. When she doesn t like to face a problem she simply stonewall s.
<u>stymie</u>	A situation in golf where an opponent's ball blocks the line between your ball and the hole. The changes must not be allowed to stymie new medical treatments.
<u>suppress</u>	Prevent the dissemination of (information. The report had been suppress ed.
<u>thwart</u>	A structural crosspiece forming a seat for a rower in a boat. He never did anything to thwart his father.
