agreed	Discussed or negotiated and then accepted by all parties. All the republics are agreed on the necessity of a common defence policy.
arranged in advance	Deliberately arranged for effect.
established in advance	Introduced from another region and persisting without cultivation.
fated	(usually followed by `to') determined by tragic fate. Fated to be the scene of Kennedy s assassination.
fixed	Of a number having a fixed and unchanging value. A fixed piece of wood.
foreordained	Established or prearranged unalterably. His place in history was foreordained .
prearranged	Arranged or agreed upon in advance. Did she have a prearranged meeting.
predestined	Established or prearranged unalterably. <i>Our predestined end.</i>
preordained	(of an outcome or course of action) decided or determined beforehand; predestined. A divinely preordained plan of creation.
preset	(of a setting on a device) adjusted or applied in advance. The water is heated quickly to a preset temperature.
set	Set down according to a plan. With eyes set in a fixed glassy stare.
settled	Inhabited by colonists. <i>Settled</i> areas.

anticipate	Act as a forerunner or precursor of. It was anticipate d that the rains would slow the military campaign.
bias	Give a bias to. The bias towards younger people in recruitment.
<u>bigot</u>	A prejudiced person who is intolerant of any opinions differing from his own. A racist bigot .
bigotry	The intolerance and prejudice of a bigot. <i>The difficulties of combating prejudice and bigotry.</i>
choice	(of words or language) rude and abusive. He picked some choice early plums.
choose	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. I always choose the fish over the meat courses in this restaurant.
<u>chosen</u>	An exclusive group of people. She was Mama s chosen .
<u>deflection</u>	The amount by which a propagating wave is bent. His volley took a deflection off a United defender.
<u>discriminatory</u>	Containing or implying a slight or showing prejudice. A discriminatory tax.
expectation	A strong belief that something will happen or be the case. I sat down in expectation of a feast of nostalgia.
<u>injustice</u>	The practice of being unjust or unfair. Brooding over life s injustice s.
misinform	Give (someone) false or inaccurate information. I m afraid you have been misinform ed.
narrowed	Made narrow; limited in breadth. A narrowed view of the world.
<u>optional</u>	Available to be chosen but not obligatory. A wide range of optional excursions is offered.
partiality	A predisposition to like something. Miller s partiality for flowering shrubs is evident.
perspective	The appearance of viewed objects with regard to their relative position, distance from the viewer, etc. <i>The theory and practice of perspective</i> .
<u>pick</u>	Attack with or as if with a pickaxe of ice or rocky ground for example. <i>He</i> pick <i>ed a match out of the box</i> .



portend	Indicate by signs. The eclipses portend some major events.
preconception	An opinion formed beforehand without adequate evidence. <i>He did not even try to confirm his preconceptions.</i>
predictive	Of or relating to prediction; having value for making predictions. Predictive typing allows you to type faster.
preferential	Of or involving preference or partiality; constituting a favour or privilege. A preferential shop gives priority or advantage to union members in hiring or promoting.
prejudice	Give rise to prejudice in someone make biased. Prejudice against people from different backgrounds.
prejudiced	Emanating from a person's emotions and prejudices. A prejudiced judge.
prepossess	To cause (a person) to be preoccupied with or by a feeling, notion, etc.; to preoccupy with or by; to imbue, inspire, or affect strongly beforehand. <i>A prepossessing appearance.</i>
<u>prior</u>	The head of a religious order in an abbey the prior is next below the abbot. <i>He had no juvenile record no priors.</i>
prospect	A mental picture of a future or anticipated event. Norwich s unbeaten heavyweight prospect .
scarify	Make shallow incisions in (the skin), especially as a medical procedure or traditional cosmetic practice. <i>Scarify seeds.</i>
<u>sexist</u>	A person with sexist views. I want to make it clear that I m certainly not a sexist .
view	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. Strong political view s.
