Synonyms of "Predetermined" as an adjective (12 Words)

agreed	Discussed or negotiated and then accepted by all parties. <i>All the republics are agreed on the necessity of a common defence policy.</i>
arranged in advance	Deliberately arranged for effect.
established in advance	Introduced from another region and persisting without cultivation.
fated	(usually followed by `to') determined by tragic fate. <i>Fated to be the scene of Kennedy's assassination.</i>
fixed	Of a number having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>A fixed piece of wood.</i>
foreordained	Established or prearranged unalterably. <i>His place in history was foreordained.</i>
prearranged	Arranged or agreed upon in advance. <i>Did she have a prearranged meeting.</i>
predestined	Established or prearranged unalterably. <i>Our predestined end.</i>
preordained	(of an outcome or course of action) decided or determined beforehand; predestined. <i>A divinely preordained plan of creation.</i>
preset	(of a setting on a device) adjusted or applied in advance. <i>The water is heated quickly to a preset temperature.</i>
set	Set down according to a plan. <i>With eyes set in a fixed glassy stare.</i>
settled	Inhabited by colonists. <i>Settled areas.</i>

anticipate	Act as a forerunner or precursor of. <i>It was anticipated that the rains would slow the military campaign.</i>
bias	Give a bias to. <i>The bias towards younger people in recruitment.</i>
bigot	A prejudiced person who is intolerant of any opinions differing from his own. <i>A racist bigot.</i>
bigotry	The intolerance and prejudice of a bigot. <i>The difficulties of combating prejudice and bigotry.</i>
choice	(of words or language) rude and abusive. <i>He picked some choice early plums.</i>
choose	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>I always choose the fish over the meat courses in this restaurant.</i>

deflection	The amount by which a propagating wave is bent. <i>His volley took a deflection off a United defender.</i>
discriminatory	Containing or implying a slight or showing prejudice. <i>A discriminatory tax.</i>
expectation	A strong belief that something will happen or be the case. <i>I sat down in expectation of a feast of nostalgia.</i>
injustice	The practice of being unjust or unfair. <i>Brooding over life s injustices.</i>
misinform	Give (someone) false or inaccurate information. <i>I m afraid you have been misinformed.</i>
narrowed	Made narrow; limited in breadth. <i>A narrowed view of the world.</i>
optional	Available to be chosen but not obligatory. <i>A wide range of optional excursions is offered.</i>
partiality	A predisposition to like something. <i>Miller s partiality for flowering shrubs is evident.</i>
perspective	The appearance of viewed objects with regard to their relative position, distance from the viewer, etc. <i>The theory and practice of perspective.</i>
pick	Attack with or as if with a pickaxe of ice or rocky ground for example. <i>He picked a match out of the box.</i>

portend	Indicate by signs. <i>The eclipses portend some major events.</i>
preconception	An opinion formed beforehand without adequate evidence. <i>He did not even try to confirm his preconceptions.</i>
predictive	Of or relating to prediction; having value for making predictions. <i>Predictive typing allows you to type faster.</i>
preferential	Of or involving preference or partiality; constituting a favour or privilege. <i>A preferential shop gives priority or advantage to union members in hiring or promoting.</i>
prejudice	Give rise to prejudice in someone make biased. <i>Prejudice against people from different backgrounds.</i>
prejudiced	Emanating from a person's emotions and prejudices. <i>A prejudiced judge.</i>
prepossess	To cause (a person) to be preoccupied with or by a feeling, notion, etc.; to preoccupy with or by; to imbue, inspire, or affect strongly beforehand. <i>A prepossessing appearance.</i>
prior	The head of a religious order in an abbey the prior is next below the abbot. <i>He had no juvenile record no priors.</i>
prospect	A mental picture of a future or anticipated event. <i>Norwich s unbeaten heavyweight prospect.</i>
scarify	Make shallow incisions in (the skin), especially as a medical procedure or traditional cosmetic practice. <i>Scarify seeds.</i>
sexist	A person with sexist views. <i>I want to make it clear that I m certainly not a sexist.</i>
view	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>Strong political views.</i>
