## Predictable as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Predictable" as an adjective

- *Always behaving or occurring in the way expected.*

### Synonyms of "Predictable" as an adjective (8 Words)

<b>characteristic</b>	Typical or distinctive. <i>Red and gold are the <b>characteristic</b> colors of autumn.</i>
<b><a href="#">expected</a></b>	Regarded as likely; anticipated. <i>Prepared for the <b>expected</b> attack.</i>
<b>foreseeable</b>	Able to be foreseen or predicted. <i>The situation is unlikely to change in the <b>foreseeable</b> future.</i>
<b>in character</b>	Holding office.
<b>in keeping</b>	Directed or bound inward.

<b>normal</b>	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i><b>Normal</b> diplomatic relations.</i>
<b>only to be expected</b>	Exclusive of anyone or anything else.
<b>usual</b>	Commonly encountered. <i>Their room was a shambles as <b>usual</b>.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Predictable" as an adjective

- *The characters are stereotyped and extremely predictable.*
- *The market is volatile and never predictable.*

## Associations of "Predictable" (30 Words)

<b>anticipate</b>	Come or take place before (an event or process expected or scheduled for a later time. <i>This composition <b>anticipates</b> Impressionism.</i>
<b>anticipation</b>	The action of anticipating something; expectation or prediction. <i>They manned the telephones in <b>anticipation</b> of a flood of calls.</i>
<b>aspiring</b>	Desiring or striving for recognition or advancement. <i>An <b>aspiring</b> artist.</i>
<b>clairvoyance</b>	The supposed faculty of perceiving things or events in the future or beyond normal sensory contact. <i>She stared at the card as if she could contact its writer by <b>clairvoyance</b>.</i>
<b>controllable</b>	Capable of being controlled. <i>The glider was fully <b>controllable</b>.</i>
<b>divination</b>	The practice of seeking knowledge of the future or the unknown by supernatural means. <i>The mediums are hired to perform <b>divinations</b>.</i>
<b>expectation</b>	A belief that someone will or should achieve something. <i>Reality had not lived up to <b>expectations</b>.</i>
<b>forebode</b>	(of a situation or occurrence) act as an advance warning of (something bad). <i>I <b>foreboded</b> mischief the moment I heard.</i>
<b>forecast</b>	Judge to be probable. <i>Coal consumption in Europe is <b>forecast</b> to increase.</i>
<b>forecaster</b>	Someone who makes predictions of the future (usually on the basis of special knowledge). <i>Economic <b>forecasters</b> are predicting a downturn.</i>

<b>foresee</b>	Realize beforehand. <i>We did not <b>foresee</b> any difficulties.</i>
<b>foreseeable</b>	Capable of being anticipated. <i><b>Foreseeable</b> costs were well within the budget.</i>
<b>foreshadow</b>	Indicate by signs. <i>Other new measures are <b>foreshadowed</b> in the White Paper.</i>
<b>foresight</b>	The ability to predict what will happen or be needed in the future. <i>He had the <b>foresight</b> to check that his escape route was clear.</i>
<b>foretell</b>	Make a prediction about; tell in advance. <i>A seer had foretold that the earl would assume the throne.</i>
<b>future</b>	Effective in or looking toward the future. <i>Some <b>future</b> historian will evaluate him.</i>
<b>hereafter</b>	At some time in the future. <i>The hope of life <b>hereafter</b>.</i>
<b>manageable</b>	Capable of existing or taking place or proving true; possible to do. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and <b>manageable</b>.</i>
<b>permanence</b>	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration. <i>The clarity and <b>permanence</b> of the dyes.</i>
<b>permanency</b>	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration.
<b>prefigure</b>	Imagine or consider beforehand. <i>The Hussite movement <b>prefigured</b> the Reformation.</i>
<b>presuppose</b>	Take for granted or as a given; suppose beforehand. <i>I <b>presuppose</b> that you have done your work.</i>
<b>prognosis</b>	A forecast of the likely outcome of a situation. <i>The disease has a poor <b>prognosis</b>.</i>
<b>prognosticate</b>	Indicate by signs. <i>The economists were prognosticating financial Armageddon.</i>
<b>prophecy</b>	Knowledge of the future (usually said to be obtained from a divine source). <i>The gift of <b>prophecy</b>.</i>
<b>prophecy</b>	Say that (a specified thing) will happen in the future. <i>Jacques was <b>prophecy</b>ing a bumper harvest.</i>
<b>soothsayer</b>	Someone who makes predictions of the future (usually on the basis of special knowledge).
<b>stable</b>	Shelter in a stable. <i>A <b>stable</b> peace.</i>
<b>supposition</b>	The cognitive process of supposing. <i>Their outrage was based on <b>supposition</b> and hearsay.</i>
