forethought	Careful consideration of what will be necessary or may happen in the future. <i>Jim had the forethought to book in advance.</i>
<u>former</u>	Denoting the first or first mentioned of two people or things. <i>Our former glory.</i>
formerly	In the past; in earlier times. <i>The building formerly housed the National Assembly.</i>
<u>front</u>	The part of a garment covering a person's front. <i>The west front of the Cathedral.</i>
guard	The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team. <i>An insurance policy is a good safeguard.</i>
helmet	The arched upper part (galea) of the corolla in some flowers, especially those of the mint and orchid families.
hiding	A physical beating. <i>They caught him and gave him a hiding.</i>
hinderance	Something immaterial that interferes with or delays action or progress.
precaution	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>He put an ice pack on the injury as a precaution.</i>
precedent	A system of jurisprudence based on judicial precedents rather than statutory laws. <i>There are substantial precedents for using interactive media in training.</i>
preclusive	Preventing something from happening; restrictive. <i>Grounds for preclusive intervention.</i>
predate	Be earlier in time; go back further. <i>Here parish boundaries seem clearly to predate Roman roads.</i>

prefatory	Serving as an introduction; introductory. <i>In his prefatory remarks the author claims that.</i>
prematurely	Before the end of the normal period of gestation. <i>I spoke prematurely.</i>
premeditation	Planning or plotting in advance of acting. <i>The defendant said there was no planning or premeditation.</i>
preventive	Preventing or contributing to the prevention of disease. <i>Quinine was used as a malaria preventive.</i>
prior	The head of a religious order in an abbey the prior is next below the abbot. <i>He has a prior engagement this evening.</i>
prohibitory	Tending to discourage (especially of prices).
prophylactic	A condom. <i>I took malaria prophylactics.</i>
protective	A condom. <i>An effectual protective against the midge.</i>
safe	Financially safe. <i>They had returned safe and sound.</i>
safety	The state of being certain that adverse effects will not be caused by some agent under defined conditions. <i>He ran to safety.</i>
sanctuary	A consecrated place where sacred objects are kept. <i>The inner sanctuary where the reliquary was kept.</i>
