<b>overture</b>	An independent orchestral composition in one movement. <i>The <b>overture</b> to Mozart's Don Giovanni.</i>
<b>preamble</b>	A preliminary introduction to a statute or constitution (usually explaining its purpose). <i>He could tell that what she said was by way of a <b>preamble</b>.</i>
<b>preface</b>	A short introductory essay preceding the text of a book. <i>It was an abrupt question made without even the <b>preface</b> of a greeting.</i>
<b>prelim</b>	A preliminary round in a sporting competition. <i>The <b>prelims</b> of the 400 meter free relay.</i>
<b>preliminary action</b>	A minor match preceding the main event.
<b>preliminary material</b>	A minor match preceding the main event.
<b>preliminary measure</b>	A minor match preceding the main event.
<b><u>prelude</u></b>	A short piece of music of a style similar to a prelude especially for the piano. <i>A ceasefire had been agreed as a <b>prelude</b> to full peace negotiations.</i>
<b>preparation</b>	The cognitive process of thinking about what you will do in the event of something happening. <i>She continued her <b>preparations</b> for the party.</i>

<b><u>nevertheless</u></b>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually following a concession). <i>While we disliked each other <b>nevertheless</b> we agreed.</i>
<b><u>nonetheless</u></b>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually following a concession). <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was <b>nonetheless</b> attended by some 6 000.</i>
<b><u>notwithstanding</u></b>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually following a concession). <i>I didn't like it. <b>Notwithstanding</b>, I remained calm.</i>
<b><u>overture</u></b>	An introduction to something more substantial. <i>The <b>overture</b> to Mozart's Don Giovanni.</i>
