According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "premature" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Occurring or done before the usual or proper time; too early.
- Too soon or too hasty.
- (of a baby) born before the end of the full term of gestation, especially three or more weeks before.
- Born after a gestation period of less than the normal time.
- Uncommonly early or before the expected time.

His **untimely** death in military action.






Usage Examples of "Premature" as an adjective
