### Definitions of "Prerogative" as a noun

- *A right reserved exclusively by a particular person or group (especially a hereditary or official right).*
- *A faculty or property distinguishing a person or class.*
- *The right of the sovereign, which in British law is theoretically subject to no restriction.*
- *A right or privilege exclusive to a particular individual or class.*

<b>birthright</b>	A right or privilege that you are entitled to at birth. <i>Free public education is the <b>birthright</b> of every American child.</i>
<b>due</b>	A payment that is due e.g as the price of membership. <i>The society dropped him for non payment of <b>dues</b>.</i>

<b>entitlement</b>	The fact of having a right to something. <i>Her annual leave <b>entitlement</b>.</i>
<b>exclusive right</b>	A news report that is reported first by one news organization.
<b>perquisite</b>	A benefit which one enjoys or is entitled to on account of one's job or position. <i>The <b>perquisites</b> of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>
<b>privilege</b>	A grant to an individual, corporation, or place of special rights or immunities, especially in the form of a franchise or monopoly. <i>He called on MPs not to abuse their <b>privilege</b>.</i>
<b>right</b>	Location near or direction toward the right side i e the side to the south when a person or object faces east. <i>Take a <b>right</b> at the corner.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Prerogative" as a noun

- *In some countries, higher education is predominantly the prerogative of the rich.*
- *Suffrage was the prerogative of white adult males.*
- *It's not a female prerogative to feel insecure.*

<b>abstention</b>	The trait of abstaining (especially from alcohol). <i>A resolution passed by 126 votes to none with six <b>abstentions</b>.</i>
<b>advantage</b>	Give an advantage to. <i>The experience gave him the <b>advantage</b> over me.</i>
<b>advocate</b>	A person who pleads for a cause or propounds an idea. <i>Solicitors may act as <b>advocates</b> in Crown Courts.</i>
<b>benefic</b>	Beneficent or kindly. <i>A <b>benefic</b> force.</i>
<b>beneficence</b>	The quality of being kind or helpful or generous.
<b>benefit</b>	Derive a benefit from. <i>For the <b>benefit</b> of all.</i>
<b>benevolence</b>	Disposition to do good.
<b>benignity</b>	A kind act. <i>His air of <b>benignity</b>.</i>
<b>bounteous</b>	Generously given or giving; bountiful. <i>The <b>bounteous</b> goodness of God.</i>

<b>clemency</b>	Leniency and compassion shown toward offenders by a person or agency charged with administering justice. <i>An appeal for <b>clemency</b>.</i>
<b>compassion</b>	The humane quality of understanding the suffering of others and wanting to do something about it. <i>The victims should be treated with <b>compassion</b>.</i>
<b>exemption</b>	A deduction allowed to a taxpayer because of his status (having certain dependents or being blind or being over 65 etc). <i>Vehicles that may qualify for <b>exemption</b> from tax.</i>
<b>favour</b>	An inclination to approve. <i>He <b>favours</b> his sore leg.</i>
<b>forgiveness</b>	Compassionate feelings that support a willingness to forgive. <i>She is quick to ask <b>forgiveness</b> when she has overstepped the line.</i>
<b>fund</b>	Accumulate a fund for the discharge of a recurrent liability. <i>The World Bank refused to <b>fund</b> the project.</i>
<b>gerrymander</b>	Achieve a result by gerrymandering. <i>An attempt to <b>gerrymander</b> the election result.</i>
<b>humane</b>	(of a branch of learning) intended to have a civilizing effect on people. <i>Regulations ensuring the <b>humane</b> treatment of animals.</i>
<b>humanitarianism</b>	The doctrine that people's duty is to promote human welfare. <i>A contribution made in the spirit of <b>humanitarianism</b>.</i>
<b>leniency</b>	The fact or quality of being more merciful or tolerant than expected; clemency. <i>The court could show <b>leniency</b>.</i>
<b>mercy</b>	(especially of a journey or mission) performed out of a desire to relieve suffering. <i>It was a <b>mercy</b> we got out alive.</i>
<b>mildness</b>	Lack of severity. <i>Even in the pulpit there are moments when <b>mildness</b> of manner is not enough.</i>
<b>partisan</b>	A fervent and even militant proponent of something. <i>The <b>partisans</b> opened fire from the woods.</i>
<b>perquisite</b>	A right reserved exclusively by a particular person or group (especially a hereditary or official right). <i>The <b>perquisites</b> of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>
<b>prefer</b>	Give preference to one creditor over another. <i>He was eventually <b>preferred</b> to the bishopric of Durham.</i>

<b>privilege</b>	Grant a privilege or privileges to. <i>I had the <b>privilege</b> of giving the Sir George Brown memorial lecture.</i>
<b>pro</b>	An argument in favor of a proposal. <i>A tennis <b>pro</b>.</i>
<b>qualify</b>	Attribute a specified quality to something; describe something as. <i>She felt obliged to <b>qualify</b> her first short answer.</i>
<b>reconciliation</b>	The restoration of friendly relations. <i>The <b>reconciliation</b> of his checkbook and the bank statement.</i>
<b>reward</b>	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>The police are offering a <b>reward</b> of up to one thousand pounds for information leading to an arrest and conviction.</i>
<b>sympathy</b>	A relation of affinity or harmony between people; whatever affects one correspondingly affects the other. <i>The special <b>sympathy</b> between the two boys was obvious to all.</i>
