Prerogative as a Noun

Definitions of "Prerogative" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “prerogative” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A right reserved exclusively by a particular person or group (especially a hereditary or official right).*
- *A faculty or property distinguishing a person or class.*
- *The right of the sovereign, which in British law is theoretically subject to no restriction.*
- *A right or privilege exclusive to a particular individual or class.*

advantage	The quality of having a superior or more favorable position. <i>It turned out to my advantage.</i>
birthright	A right or privilege that you are entitled to at birth. <i>Free public education is the birthright of every American child.</i>
due	A payment that is due e.g as the price of membership. <i>The society dropped him for non payment of dues.</i>

entitlement	The fact of having a right to something. <i>Her annual leave entitlement.</i>
exclusive right	A news report that is reported first by one news organization.
perquisite	A benefit which one enjoys or is entitled to on account of one's job or position. <i>The perquisites of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>
privilege	A grant to an individual, corporation, or place of special rights or immunities, especially in the form of a franchise or monopoly. <i>He called on MPs not to abuse their privilege.</i>
right	Location near or direction toward the right side i e the side to the south when a person or object faces east. <i>Take a right at the corner.</i>

Usage Examples of "Prerogative" as a noun

- *In some countries, higher education is predominantly the prerogative of the rich.*
- *Suffrage was the prerogative of white adult males.*
- *It's not a female prerogative to feel insecure.*

abstention	The trait of abstaining (especially from alcohol). <i>A resolution passed by 126 votes to none with six abstentions.</i>
advantage	Give an advantage to. <i>The experience gave him the advantage over me.</i>
advocate	A person who pleads for a cause or propounds an idea. <i>Solicitors may act as advocates in Crown Courts.</i>
benefic	Beneficent or kindly. <i>A benefic force.</i>
beneficence	The quality of being kind or helpful or generous.
benefit	Derive a benefit from. <i>For the benefit of all.</i>
benevolence	Disposition to do good.
benignity	A kind act. <i>His air of benignity.</i>
bounteous	Generously given or giving; bountiful. <i>The bounteous goodness of God.</i>

clemency	Leniency and compassion shown toward offenders by a person or agency charged with administering justice. <i>An appeal for clemency.</i>
compassion	The humane quality of understanding the suffering of others and wanting to do something about it. <i>The victims should be treated with compassion.</i>
exemption	A deduction allowed to a taxpayer because of his status (having certain dependents or being blind or being over 65 etc). <i>Vehicles that may qualify for exemption from tax.</i>
favour	An inclination to approve. <i>He favours his sore leg.</i>
forgiveness	Compassionate feelings that support a willingness to forgive. <i>She is quick to ask forgiveness when she has overstepped the line.</i>
fund	Accumulate a fund for the discharge of a recurrent liability. <i>The World Bank refused to fund the project.</i>
gerrymander	Achieve a result by gerrymandering. <i>An attempt to gerrymander the election result.</i>
humane	(of a branch of learning) intended to have a civilizing effect on people. <i>Regulations ensuring the humane treatment of animals.</i>
humanitarianism	The doctrine that people's duty is to promote human welfare. <i>A contribution made in the spirit of humanitarianism.</i>
leniency	The fact or quality of being more merciful or tolerant than expected; clemency. <i>The court could show leniency.</i>
mercy	(especially of a journey or mission) performed out of a desire to relieve suffering. <i>It was a mercy we got out alive.</i>
mildness	Lack of severity. <i>Even in the pulpit there are moments when mildness of manner is not enough.</i>
partisan	A fervent and even militant proponent of something. <i>The partisans opened fire from the woods.</i>
perquisite	A right reserved exclusively by a particular person or group (especially a hereditary or official right). <i>The perquisites of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>
prefer	Give preference to one creditor over another. <i>He was eventually preferred to the bishopric of Durham.</i>

privilege	Grant a privilege or privileges to. <i>I had the privilege of giving the Sir George Brown memorial lecture.</i>
pro	An argument in favor of a proposal. <i>A tennis pro.</i>
qualify	Attribute a specified quality to something; describe something as. <i>She felt obliged to qualify her first short answer.</i>
reconciliation	The restoration of friendly relations. <i>The reconciliation of his checkbook and the bank statement.</i>
reward	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>The police are offering a reward of up to one thousand pounds for information leading to an arrest and conviction.</i>
sympathy	A relation of affinity or harmony between people; whatever affects one correspondingly affects the other. <i>The special sympathy between the two boys was obvious to all.</i>
