<b>acumen</b>	A tapering point. <i>She hides a shrewd business <b>acumen</b>.</i>
<b>clairvoyance</b>	The supposed faculty of perceiving things or events in the future or beyond normal sensory contact. <i>She stared at the card as if she could contact its writer by <b>clairvoyance</b>.</i>
<b>clairvoyant</b>	Having or exhibiting clairvoyance. <i>He didn't tell me about it and I'm not <b>clairvoyant</b>.</i>
<b>discerning</b>	Quick to understand- Nathaniel Hawthorne. <i>A <b>discerning</b> critic.</i>
<b><u>discernment</u></b>	The ability to judge well. <i>An astonishing lack of <b>discernment</b>.</i>
<b><u>discriminating</u></b>	Showing or indicating careful judgment and discernment especially in matters of taste. <i>He became a <b>discriminating</b> collector and patron of the arts.</i>
<b>forecast</b>	A prediction about how something (as the weather) will develop. <i>Coal consumption in Europe is <b>forecast</b> to increase.</i>
<b>foresight</b>	The front sight of a gun. <i>He had the <b>foresight</b> to check that his escape route was clear.</i>
<b>insight</b>	The clear (and often sudden) understanding of a complex situation. <i>His mind soared to previously unattainable heights of <b>insight</b>.</i>
<b>insightful</b>	Exhibiting insight or clear and deep perception. <i>The chapter is <b>insightful</b> and suggestive of new perspectives.</i>
<b>intelligent</b>	Having or showing intelligence, especially of a high level. <i>Is there <b>intelligent</b> life in the universe.</i>
<b>judgment</b>	The act of judging or assessing a person or situation or event. <i>He was reluctant to make his <b>judgment</b> known.</i>
<b>knowing</b>	Highly educated; having extensive information or understanding. <i>Today's society is too <b>knowing</b> too corrupt.</i>
<b>perceptive</b>	Having or showing sensitive insight. <i>A <b>perceptive</b> observation.</i>
<b>percipient</b>	A person who becomes aware (of things or events) through the senses. <i>A <b>percipient</b> author.</i>
<b>perspicacious</b>	Mentally acute or penetratingly discerning. <i>Much too <b>perspicacious</b> to be taken in by so spurious an argument.</i>

<b>perspicacity</b>	The capacity to assess situations or circumstances shrewdly and to draw sound conclusions. <i>The <b>perspicacity</b> of her remarks.</i>
<b>politic</b>	Engage in political activity. <i>A <b>politic</b> old scoundrel.</i>
<b>prediction</b>	A statement made about the future. <i>A <b>prediction</b> that economic growth would resume.</i>
<b>sagacious</b>	Skillful in statecraft or management. <i>Observant and thoughtful he was given to asking <b>sagacious</b> questions.</i>
<b>sagacity</b>	The quality of being sagacious. <i>A man of great political <b>sagacity</b>.</i>
<b>sapience</b>	Ability to apply knowledge or experience or understanding or common sense and insight.
<b>sapient</b>	Wise, or attempting to appear wise. <i>Members of the female quarter were more <b>sapient</b> but no less savage than the others.</i>
<b>sapiential</b>	Characterized by wisdom, especially the wisdom of God. <i>I saw them as <b>sapiential</b> metaphors far more meaningful than their didactic pretext.</i>
<b>sensible</b>	Aware intuitively or intellectually of something sensed- Henry Hallam- E. <i>A <b>sensible</b> odor.</i>
<b>smart</b>	Intelligence; acumen. <i>He gave the dog a <b>smart</b> blow.</i>
<b>tactful</b>	Showing skill and sensitivity in dealing with people. <i>A <b>tactful</b> remark eased her embarrassment.</i>
<b>understanding</b>	Characterized by understanding based on comprehension and discernment and empathy. <i>I knew I could count on his <b>understanding</b>.</i>
<b>wisdom</b>	An Apocryphal book consisting mainly of a meditation on wisdom although ascribed to Solomon it was probably written in the first century BC. <i>Some questioned the <b>wisdom</b> of building the dam so close to an active volcano.</i>
<b>wise</b>	Evidencing the possession of inside information. <i>In no <b>wise</b>.</i>
