The **Present Perfect** tense has a number of uses. One of them is to express situations which started in the past and continue into the present. Here are some examples:

Meaning

We may use the **Present Perfect** to talk about actions or events that **started in the past** but **continue to the present** or to describe something we have done several times in the past and continue to do.

Consider the following examples:

- I'm a teacher.
- I started teaching ten year ago.
- I've been a teacher for ten years.
- (NOT: I am a teacher for ten years.
- NOT: I've been a teacher ten years ago.)
- My best friend's name is Gary.
- met him three years ago.
- I've known him for three years.
- (NOT: I know him for three years.



- NOT: I've known him three years ago.)
- I have a car.
- My Dad gave it to me a long time ago.
- I've had it for ages.
- (NOT: I have it for ages.
- NOT: I've had a long time ago.)

These examples indicate that the action began at a time before now. Additionally, these actions continue on into the present and will likely extend to the future.

Note: 'Be', 'know' and 'have' are <u>state verbs</u> so we don't usually use them in their continuous forms.

- be → been- know → known

With <u>action verbs</u>, we can use Present Perfect Simple or <u>Present Perfect Continuous</u>:

- I've learned English for five years. I've been learning English for five years.
- He has worked here since 2015. He has been working here since 2015.

Present Perfect structure

Let's revise how Present Perfect is formed.

Positive form

[subject] + have/has + Past Participle

- He **has written** three books and he is working on another one.
- I've played the guitar since I was a teenager.

Negative form

[subject] + haven't/hasn't + Past Participle

- I haven't seen my mother for 2 months.
- She **hasn't been** abroad for years.



Questions

have/has + [subject] + Past Participle

- **Have** they **lived** here all their lives?
- Has he known Julie for ten years?

Common signal words

We use:

Present Perfect & Past Simple

We use the Present Perfect to talk about a situation or action which is not finished.

We use the Past Simple when we talk about completed past actions.

Compare:

- Tom lives in New York. He **has lived** there for two years. (Present Perfect)
- Before that, he **lived** in San Francisco for a year. (Past Simple)
