<b>estimation</b>	The respect with which a person is held. <i>In my <b>estimation</b> the boy is innocent.</i>
<b><u>fame</u></b>	The state or quality of being widely honored and acclaimed. <i>Winning the Olympic title has brought her <b>fame</b> and fortune.</i>
<b>honour</b>	(in whist) an ace, king, queen, or jack of trumps. <i>She passed with <b>honours</b>.</i>
<b><u>image</u></b>	A visual representation (of an object or scene or person or abstraction) produced on a surface. <i>A public <b>image</b> is as fragile as Humpty Dumpty.</i>
<b>importance</b>	The quality of being important and worthy of note. <i>The <b>importance</b> of a good education.</i>
<b>influence</b>	A person or thing with the capacity to have an influence on someone or something. <i>The institute has considerable <b>influence</b> with teachers.</i>
<b>note</b>	A written sign representing the pitch and duration of a musical note. <i>The Secretariat sent a diplomatic <b>note</b> to the embassy protesting about the sale of arms.</i>
<b>prestigiousness</b>	A high standing achieved through success or influence or wealth etc.
<b>prominence</b>	The state of being important, famous, or noticeable. <i>Radiographs showed enlargement of the right heart with <b>prominence</b> of the pulmonary outflow tract.</i>
<b>rank</b>	An analogous quantity in other kinds of group. <i>The entrance was guarded by <b>ranks</b> of policemen.</i>
<b>regard</b>	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>The court must have <b>regard</b> to the principle of welfare.</i>
<b>renown</b>	The state or quality of being widely honored and acclaimed. <i>Authors of great <b>renown</b>.</i>
<b>reputation</b>	The general estimation that the public has for a person. <i>His knowledge of his subject earned him a <b>reputation</b> as an expert.</i>

<b>repute</b>	The state of being held in high esteem and honor. <i>Pollution could bring the authority's name into bad <b>repute</b>.</i>
<b>standing</b>	Social or financial or professional status or reputation. <i>Their <b>standing</b> in the community.</i>
<b>stature</b>	High level of respect gained by impressive development or achievement. <i>An architect of international <b>stature</b>.</i>
<b>status</b>	Relative social or professional position; standing. <i>An improvement in the <b>status</b> of women.</i>
<u><a href="#">superiority</a></u>	The state of excelling or surpassing or going beyond usual limits. <i>He attacked the media's smug <b>superiority</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">supremacy</a></u>	Power to dominate or defeat. <i>The <b>supremacy</b> of the king.</i>
<u><a href="#">weight</a></u>	A system of units used to express the weight of something. <i>As he came upstairs the boards creaked under his <b>weight</b>.</i>

<b>esteem</b>	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>I should <b>esteem</b> it a favour if you could speak to them.</i>
<b>fame</b>	The state or quality of being widely honored and acclaimed. <i>Winning the Olympic title has brought her <b>fame</b> and fortune.</i>
<b>honor</b>	The quality of being honorable and having a good name. <i>A man of <b>honor</b>.</i>
<b>honorary</b>	Of a person holding an honorary title or position. <i>An <b>honorary</b> degree.</i>
<b>insignia</b>	A badge worn to show official position. <i>A khaki uniform with colonel s <b>insignia</b> on the collar.</i>
<b>juridical</b>	Relating to judicial proceedings and the administration of the law. <i><b>Juridical</b> days.</i>
<b>merit</b>	A pass grade in an examination denoting above-average performance. <i>Composers of outstanding <b>merit</b>.</i>
<b>name</b>	Of a person or product having a well known name. <i>Hundreds of diseases had not yet been isolated or <b>named</b>.</i>
<b>phenomenon</b>	The object of a person's perception. <i>The band was a pop <b>phenomenon</b> just for their sales figures alone.</i>
<b>position</b>	A condition or position in which you find yourself. <i>The unpleasant situation or <b>position</b> of having to choose between two evils.</i>
<b>rank</b>	Assign a rank or rating to. <i><b>Rank</b> jungle vegetation.</i>

<b>reconfirm</b>	Confirm again. <i>You must <b>reconfirm</b> your flight reservations.</i>
<b>redound</b>	Have an effect for good or ill. <i>Everything <b>redounded</b> to his glory.</i>
<b>reputation</b>	The beliefs or opinions that are generally held about someone or something. <i>He acquired a <b>reputation</b> as an actor before he started writing.</i>
<b>repute</b>	The state of being highly regarded; fame. <i>Pollution could bring the authority's name into bad <b>repute</b>.</i>
<b>respectable</b>	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>A <b>respectable</b> woman.</i>
<b>riffraff</b>	Disparaging terms for the common people.
<b>status</b>	Relative social or professional position; standing. <i>When I updated my <b>status</b> on Facebook yesterday I said I was seeking a sense of purpose.</i>
<b>underdog</b>	One at a disadvantage and expected to lose. <i>We go into this game as the <b>underdogs</b>.</i>
