authority	Official permission or approval. <i>He hit the ball with authority.</i>
<u>celebrity</u>	The state of being well known. <i>He was a baseball celebrity.</i>
class	All of the college or school students of a particular year. <i>Flirting is not unknown in college classes.</i>
consequence	A result or effect, typically one that is unwelcome or unpleasant. <i>Abrupt withdrawal of drug treatment can have serious consequences.</i>

<u>distinction</u>	A grade in an examination denoting excellence. <i>There is a sharp distinction between domestic politics and international politics.</i>
eminence	A piece of rising ground. <i>The Lord Chancellor canvassed the views of various legal eminences.</i>
esteem	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>He was held in high esteem by colleagues.</i>
estimation	The respect with which a person is held. <i>In my estimation the boy is innocent.</i>
<u>fame</u>	The state or quality of being widely honored and acclaimed. <i>Winning the Olympic title has brought her fame and fortune.</i>
honour	(in whist) an ace, king, queen, or jack of trumps. <i>She passed with honours.</i>
<u>image</u>	A visual representation (of an object or scene or person or abstraction) produced on a surface. <i>A public image is as fragile as Humpty Dumpty.</i>
importance	The quality of being important and worthy of note. <i>The importance of a good education.</i>
influence	A person or thing with the capacity to have an influence on someone or something. <i>The institute has considerable influence with teachers.</i>
note	A written sign representing the pitch and duration of a musical note. <i>The Secretariat sent a diplomatic note to the embassy protesting about the sale of arms.</i>
prestigiousness	A high standing achieved through success or influence or wealth etc.
prominence	The state of being important, famous, or noticeable. <i>Radiographs showed enlargement of the right heart with prominence of the pulmonary outflow tract.</i>
rank	An analogous quantity in other kinds of group. <i>The entrance was guarded by ranks of policemen.</i>
regard	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>The court must have regard to the principle of welfare.</i>
renown	The state or quality of being widely honored and acclaimed. <i>Authors of great renown.</i>
reputation	The general estimation that the public has for a person. <i>His knowledge of his subject earned him a reputation as an expert.</i>

repute	The state of being held in high esteem and honor. <i>Pollution could bring the authority's name into bad repute.</i>
standing	Social or financial or professional status or reputation. <i>Their standing in the community.</i>
stature	High level of respect gained by impressive development or achievement. <i>An architect of international stature.</i>
status	Relative social or professional position; standing. <i>An improvement in the status of women.</i>
<u>superiority</u>	The state of excelling or surpassing or going beyond usual limits. <i>He attacked the media's smug superiority.</i>
<u>supremacy</u>	Power to dominate or defeat. <i>The supremacy of the king.</i>
<u>weight</u>	A system of units used to express the weight of something. <i>As he came upstairs the boards creaked under his weight.</i>

- capillarity** A phenomenon associated with surface tension and resulting in the elevation or depression of liquids in capillaries.

citizenship	Conduct as a citizen. <i>The refugees could be granted dual citizenship.</i>
commissioned	(of an officer in the army, navy, or air force) holding a rank conferred by a commission. <i>Those interested in pursuing careers as commissioned officers.</i>
creditable	(of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful. <i>The student's effort on the essay though not outstanding was creditable.</i>
deservedly	In the way that is deserved; rightfully. <i>They are top of the league and deservedly so.</i>
dignity	Formality in bearing and appearance. <i>It was beneath his dignity to cheat.</i>
eminence	An important or distinguished person. <i>The Lord Chancellor canvassed the views of various legal eminences.</i>
esteem	The condition of being honored, esteemed, or respected or well regarded. <i>I should esteem it a favour if you could speak to them.</i>
fame	The state or quality of being widely honored and acclaimed. <i>Winning the Olympic title has brought her fame and fortune.</i>
honor	The quality of being honorable and having a good name. <i>A man of honor.</i>
honorary	Of a person holding an honorary title or position. <i>An honorary degree.</i>
insignia	A badge worn to show official position. <i>A khaki uniform with colonel's insignia on the collar.</i>
juridical	Relating to judicial proceedings and the administration of the law. <i>Juridical days.</i>
merit	A pass grade in an examination denoting above-average performance. <i>Composers of outstanding merit.</i>
name	Of a person or product having a well-known name. <i>Hundreds of diseases had not yet been isolated or named.</i>
phenomenon	The object of a person's perception. <i>The band was a pop phenomenon just for their sales figures alone.</i>
position	A condition or position in which you find yourself. <i>The unpleasant situation or position of having to choose between two evils.</i>
rank	Assign a rank or rating to. <i>Rank jungle vegetation.</i>

reconfirm	Confirm again. <i>You must reconfirm your flight reservations.</i>
redound	Have an effect for good or ill. <i>Everything redounded to his glory.</i>
reputation	The beliefs or opinions that are generally held about someone or something. <i>He acquired a reputation as an actor before he started writing.</i>
repute	The state of being highly regarded; fame. <i>Pollution could bring the authority's name into bad repute.</i>
respectable	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>A respectable woman.</i>
riffraff	Disparaging terms for the common people.
status	Relative social or professional position; standing. <i>When I updated my status on Facebook yesterday I said I was seeking a sense of purpose.</i>
underdog	One at a disadvantage and expected to lose. <i>We go into this game as the underdogs.</i>
vassalage	The state of a serf.
wellness	The state of being in good health, especially as an actively pursued goal. <i>Company health and wellness programmes.</i>
