<u>arrogant</u>	Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one’s own importance or abilities. <i>A typically arrogant assumption.</i>
assuming	Arrogant or presumptuous. <i>On a subject like this it would be too assuming for me to decide.</i>
assumptive	Of the nature of an assumption. <i>An assumptive person.</i>
audacious	Disposed to venture or take risks. <i>A series of audacious takeovers.</i>

bold	(of a person, action, or idea) showing a willingness to take risks; confident and courageous. <i>A bold design.</i>
<u>brazen</u>	Made of or resembling brass (as in color or hardness). <i>Brazen fire irons.</i>
cocksure	Marked by excessive confidence. <i>An arrogant and cocksure materialist.</i>
<u>egotistical</u>	Characteristic of those having an inflated idea of their own importance. <i>An egotistical disregard of others.</i>
<u>familiar</u>	In close friendship; intimate. <i>Familiar ordinary objects found in every home.</i>
<u>forward</u>	Moving forward. <i>Troops moved to the forward areas.</i>
free	Not or no longer confined or imprisoned. <i>A free choice.</i>
fresh	Presumptuous towards someone, especially in a sexual way. <i>Fresh lettuce.</i>
<u>impertinent</u>	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>Mentioned several impertinent facts before finally coming to the point.</i>
impudent	Not showing due respect for another person; impertinent. <i>The student was kept in for impudent behavior.</i>
<u>insolent</u>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. <i>The modern world with its quick material successes and insolent belief in the boundless possibilities of progress.</i>
overbold	Excessively bold. <i>Outlaws from the forests had grown overbold.</i>
<u>overconfident</u>	Excessively confident. <i>Sarah's downfall came through being overconfident.</i>
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>No need to be pert miss.</i>

- *I hope I won't be considered presumptuous if I offer some advice.*

daring	Adventurous courage. <i>The most daring of contemporary fiction writers.</i>
effrontery	Audacious (even arrogant) behavior that you have no right to. <i>One juror had the effrontery to challenge the coroner s decision.</i>
gall	A digestive juice secreted by the liver and stored in the gallbladder aids in the digestion of fats. <i>It galls me that we lost the suit.</i>
impenitent	Not feeling shame or regret about one's actions or attitudes. <i>Impenitent elitists.</i>
impertinence	Inappropriate playfulness. <i>They gasped at the impertinence of the suggestion.</i>

impertinent	Not pertinent to a particular matter; irrelevant. <i>An impertinent question.</i>
impudence	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. <i>His arrogance and impudence had offended many.</i>
impudent	Marked by casual disrespect. <i>An impudent boy given to insulting strangers.</i>
insolence	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. <i>She was sacked for insolence.</i>
insolent	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. <i>She hated the insolent tone of his voice.</i>
irreverent	Not revering god. <i>A certain irreverent gaiety and ease of manner.</i>
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>A pert slightly plump girl called Rose.</i>
pretentious	Tawdry or vulgar. <i>A pretentious scholarly edition.</i>
proudly	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. <i>Pristine new office buildings stood proudly beside a large car park.</i>
shameless	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. <i>A shameless imposter.</i>
temerity	Excessive confidence or boldness; audacity. <i>No one had the temerity to question his conclusions.</i>
unashamed	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. <i>An unashamed emotionalism.</i>
unrepentant	Showing no regret for one's wrongdoings. <i>He was unrepentant and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
upstart	A person who has risen suddenly in rank or importance, especially one who behaves arrogantly. <i>The upstarts who dare to challenge the legitimacy of his rule.</i>
