Marked by excessive confidence. An arrogant and <b>cocksure</b> materialist.
Characteristic of those having an inflated idea of their own importance. An <b>egotistical</b> disregard of others.
In close friendship; intimate. Familiar ordinary objects found in every home.
Moving forward. Troops moved to the <b>forward</b> areas.
Not or no longer confined or imprisoned. A <b>free</b> choice.
Presumptuous towards someone, especially in a sexual way. <i>Fresh lettuce</i> .
Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. Mentioned several <b>impertinent</b> facts before finally coming to the point.
Not showing due respect for another person; impertinent. <i>The student was kept in for <b>impudent</b> behavior.</i>
Unrestrained by convention or propriety. The modern world with its quick material successes and <b>insolent</b> belief in the boundless possibilities of progress.
Excessively bold. Outlaws from the forests had grown <b>overbold</b> .
Excessively confident. Sarah s downfall came through being <b>overconfident</b> .
Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>No need to be <b>pert</b> miss.</i>

<u>impertinent</u>	Not pertinent to a particular matter; irrelevant. An <b>impertinent</b> question.
impudence	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. <i>His arrogance and <b>impudence</b> had offended many.</i>
impudent	Marked by casual disrespect. An <b>impudent</b> boy given to insulting strangers.
insolence	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. She was sacked for <b>insolence</b> .
<u>insolent</u>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. She hated the <b>insolent</b> tone of his voice.
<u>irreverent</u>	Not revering god. A certain <b>irreverent</b> gaiety and ease of manner.
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. A <b>pert</b> slightly plump girl called Rose.
pretentious	Tawdry or vulgar. A <b>pretentious</b> scholarly edition.
proudly	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. Pristine new office buildings stood <b>proudly</b> beside a large car park.
shameless	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. A <b>shameless</b> imposter.
temerity	Excessive confidence or boldness; audacity. No one had the <b>temerity</b> to question his conclusions.
<u>unashamed</u>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. An <b>unashamed</b> emotionalism.
unrepentant	Showing no regret for one's wrongdoings. <i>He was <b>unrepentant</b> and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
upstart	A person who has risen suddenly in rank or importance, especially one who behaves arrogantly. The <b>upstart</b> s who dare to challenge the legitimacy of his rule.
